50 Years Ago—May 30, 1904 J. E. Fitzgerald returned Tuesday from a trip to the Plains country. He reports good rains and fine grass out there.

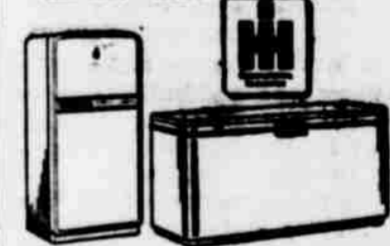

Those who helped assemble the high school news for the Free Press were: Editor-in-Chief, James Mulino; assistant editor, Martha Lou Rogers; society editor, Naomi Poteet; sports editor, Jerry Irby; assistant sports editor, David Smith; joke editor, Joe Short.

They put on plays twice that year. During the fall, "The Arrival of Kitty" was presented and on May 10th, 3-one act plays were given: "On Vengeance Heights," "In the Spring," and "Danger." Miss Elaine Mills was the director of these. She is now Mrs. Lloyd Kimsey and is teaching in the San Angelo schools. Concrete benches for the high school campus were purchased from the proceeds of these plays and some of them are still in use.

A Hallowe'en Carnival was held and G. W. Reynolds was chosen to reign as Queen. G. W. is now Mrs. M. W. Whitmire and lives on a ranch near Stonewall, Okla.

The football team was fairly successful, although Abilene beat us 89 to 6 during the season. Barton Welsh made the lone touchdown, and Joe Short, who suffered a number of bruises and scratches in the game, declared that he got them when the Abilene team chased him up and down the bleachers. Seniors who were Pep Squad leaders were: Geneva Golden, Naomi Poteet and Elsie Bradley. G. W. Reynolds was secretary of the Pep Squad organization.

Both boys and girls basketball teams had good records. Seniors who played on the girls' team were: Floy West, Elsie Bradley,

and Montie Singleton. The coach, Mr. Herman K. Henry, resides here in Haskell, and doesn't like to be reminded that some of his former pupils have gray hair or bald heads.

In those days, the high school had a baseball team in the Spring. Seniors who played on the team were: Ellis Medley, Barton Welsh, David Smith, Austin Coburn, Tom Patterson, Raul English, Orea McDonald, John R. Watson, Jr., and Walter Greene.

On March 5th a hiking club was organized with Mrs. George Wim-bish and Miss Elaine Mills as sponsors. Seniors who were charter members were G. W. Reynolds, Frances Porter, Irene Morgan, Thelma Therwhanger, Thurza Bowman, Geneva Golden, Erma Monke, Martha Lou Rogers, Naomi Poteet and Elsie Bradley. The name chosen for the club was "Gypsy Ramblers," and the organization was very active for several years. Many girl graduates of Haskell High School still have fond memories of the fun they had while members of the "Gypsy Ramblers."

The P-TA entertained the Seniors with a banquet on March 14, and the annual Junior-Senior banquet was held on April 18. The 1929 Seniors were the second class in the history of Haskell High

School to wear caps and gowns, and were the first class to have a Junior-Senior dance, sponsored by the school. They also played hooky on April Fool's Day that year, and had to attend "pink tea" for 45 minutes after school for eight days. Senior Day was also taken away from them. Their punishment would probably not have been so severe if they had not kidnapped two of the teachers, Miss Bertha Carmen and Miss Marguerite Stephens, and carried them to Scott's Crossing with them.

The Senior Class of 1929 congratulates the Senior Class of 1954 and wishes for them the same kind of happy memories in 1979 that this class has enjoyed.

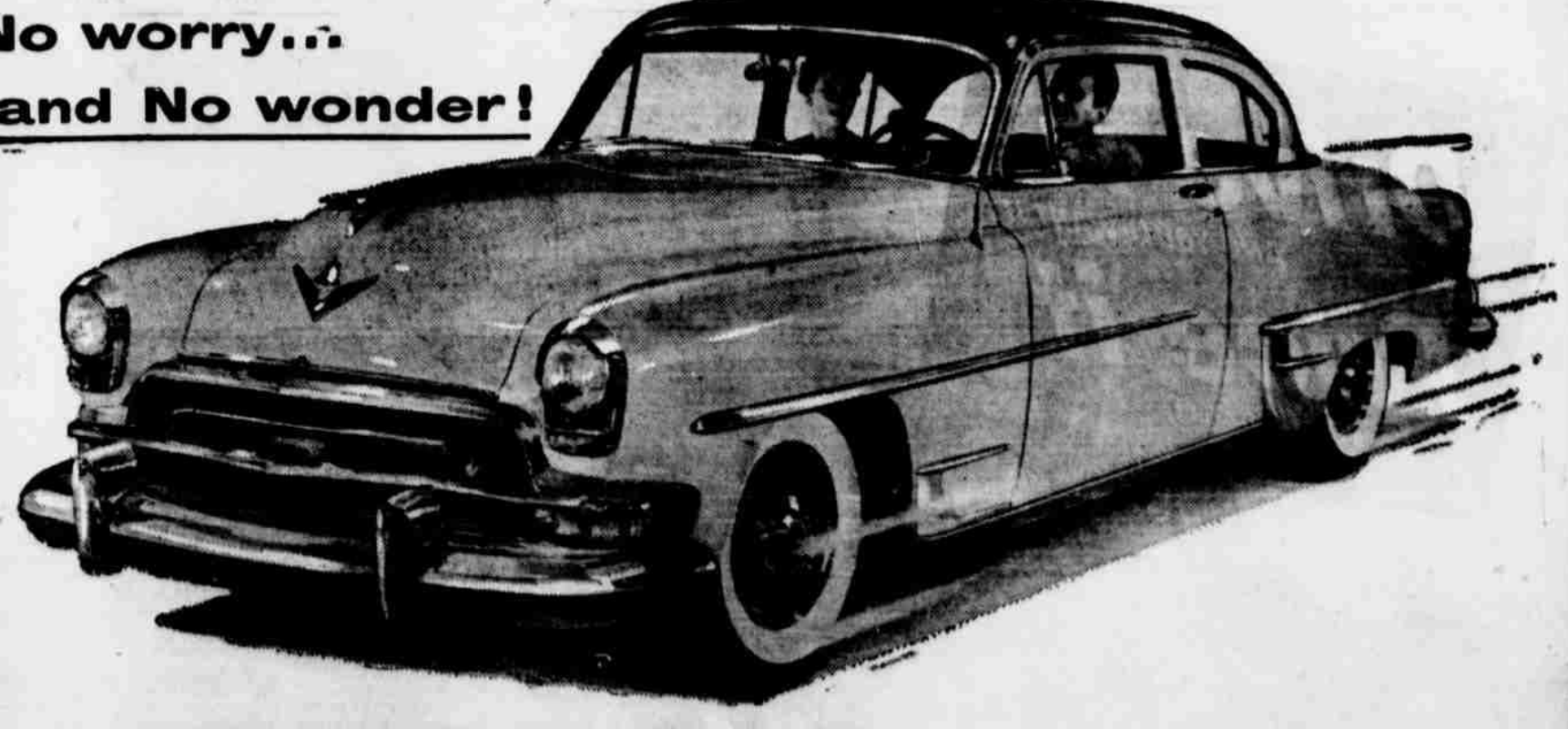

Singers to Meet In Stamford for All Day Program

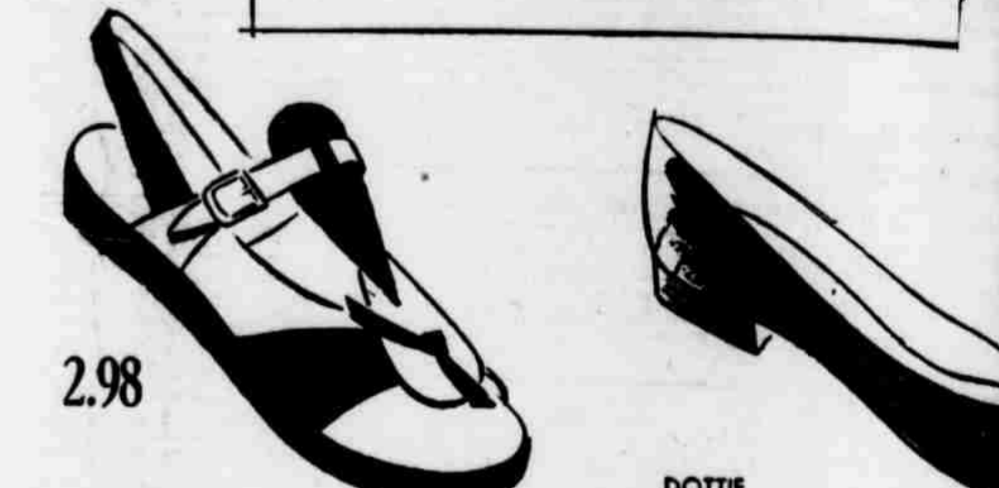
