First Political Rally Since '38 Scheduled Saturday Night

Haskell County's first political rally in 16 years, scheduled here Saturday night on the courthouse lawn, is expected to attract a record crowd, those in charge of plans for the event said today.

A well-rounded program of speaking and entertainment has been arranged, featuring political speakers and brief entertainment numbers. Speakers who have accepted invitations to address the gathering of voters include R. M. (Bob) Wagstaff of Abilene who will talk in behalf of the candidacy of Governor Allan Shivers. He will be introduced by Tom K. Epley, Abilene attorney.

Speaking in behalf of Ralph Yarborough for Governor will be Hon. Bryant Bradbury of Abilene, a former State Representative. Also speaking for Yarborough will be a prominent Wichita Falls woman. Equal time will be given representatives of both leading candidates for Governor.

Also, all local candidates have been invited to speak, and several have signified their intention of making brief talks. Master of ceremonies will be an out-of-town man, the rally committee has announced.

A small platform will be erected on the south side of the courthouse lawn, and a public address system installed for benefit of the speakers. Entertainment features during the evening will include specialty numbers by a quartet composed of Ray Lusk, Hubert Bledsoe and Mr. and Mrs. Otis Smith. Sandra Hadaway, talented young High School student, will present her pupils in a tap dancing exhibition. Betty Lynn Waldrip and several High School girls will give an exhibition of baton twirling, and Freddie Middleton will give a blackface pantomime number, "Mammy," by Al Johnson, interspersing the program will be hillbilly music by the Harris Family, well known musicians of this section.

Al Cousins, 71, Veteran Peace Officer And Former Sheriff, Dies Monday

Albert Joseph (Al) Cousins, 71, veteran West Texas peace officer and former Sheriff, died at 6:15 p. m. Monday in the Haskell hospital.

He suffered a heart attack at his home and a second attack at the hospital. He died immediately after the second attack. He was the father of Haskell County Sheriff R. M. (Bob) Cousins. Mr. Cousins came to Haskell County in 1898 from his birthplace near Waco, in McLennan County. He was born August 2, 1882, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Cousins, early settlers in Haskell County.

On Dec. 26, 1909, he married the former Miss Mabel Edwards and they made their home in the Weinert section for a number of years. Mr. Cousins was a member of the Baptist Church.

Almost a half century ago, Mr. Cousins served as deputy sheriff under the late Sheriff J. W. Collins.

He was elected Haskell County Sheriff in 1920. After serving one term, he retired for several years. In 1927 was appointed sheriff to fill a vacancy in that office. He served two years in that capacity.

Later Mr. Cousins was elected City Marshal of Haskell, an office he held for a number of years. During the war years he was assistant warden at the Huntsville State Prison for two years. He resigned that post to become Chief of Police at Walsh, Colo., where he spent several years.

The veteran Haskell officer was a first cousin of former United States Senator Tom Connally.

Immediate survivors are his wife, of Haskell; three daughters, Mrs. George Earnest of Richmond, Mrs. Wayland Baugh of Rule, and Mrs. Croft Laird of Springfield, Colo.; two sons, H. M. Cousins and Sheriff Bob Cousins of Haskell; ten grandchildren: three sisters, Mrs. J. R. Mitchell and Mrs. J. M. Diggs, both of Haskell, and Mrs. B. T. Bridges of Plainview; and one brother, H. H. Cousins of Little Rock, Ark.

Funeral service for Mr. Cousins was held at the First Baptist Church Wednesday at 2:30 p. m., with the pastor, the Rev. M. D. Rexrode officiating, assisted by the Rev. J. B. Thompson, pastor of the First Methodist Church of this city.

All offices in the courthouse were closed during the funeral service as a tribute of respect to the veteran officer.

Cow Prices Are Sharply Lowered At Fort Worth

Canners and cutters drew weak to mostly 50 cents lower prices at Fort Worth Monday and fat cows sold around 50 cents to \$1 lower.

The decline completely wiped out last week's advances and some besides. Bulls ruled steady. Fat steers and yearlings were fully steady to strong when good and choice plainer grassers were weaker.

Stockers and feeders were mostly steady, some spots higher and some lower in the uneven trade. A good many out-of-state buyers were on the yards and a good many of them were active in looking for stocker and feeder calves and yearlings. Slaughter calves were steady to weak, spots 2 1/2 to 50 cents off.

Butcher hogs of good and choice kinds sold at \$24.50 at Ft. Worth Monday, steady with the previous close. The less attractive kinds sold from \$22 to \$24.25. Sows were steady to 50 cents above the previous week's close at \$15 to \$19.

Northern market centers reported prices more stable Monday after the bad collapse of late last week when hog prices dropped mostly \$1 to \$2 per hundred or more.

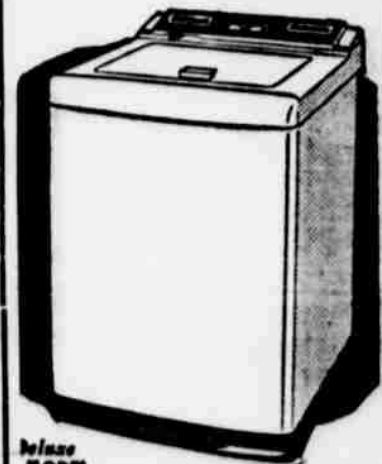

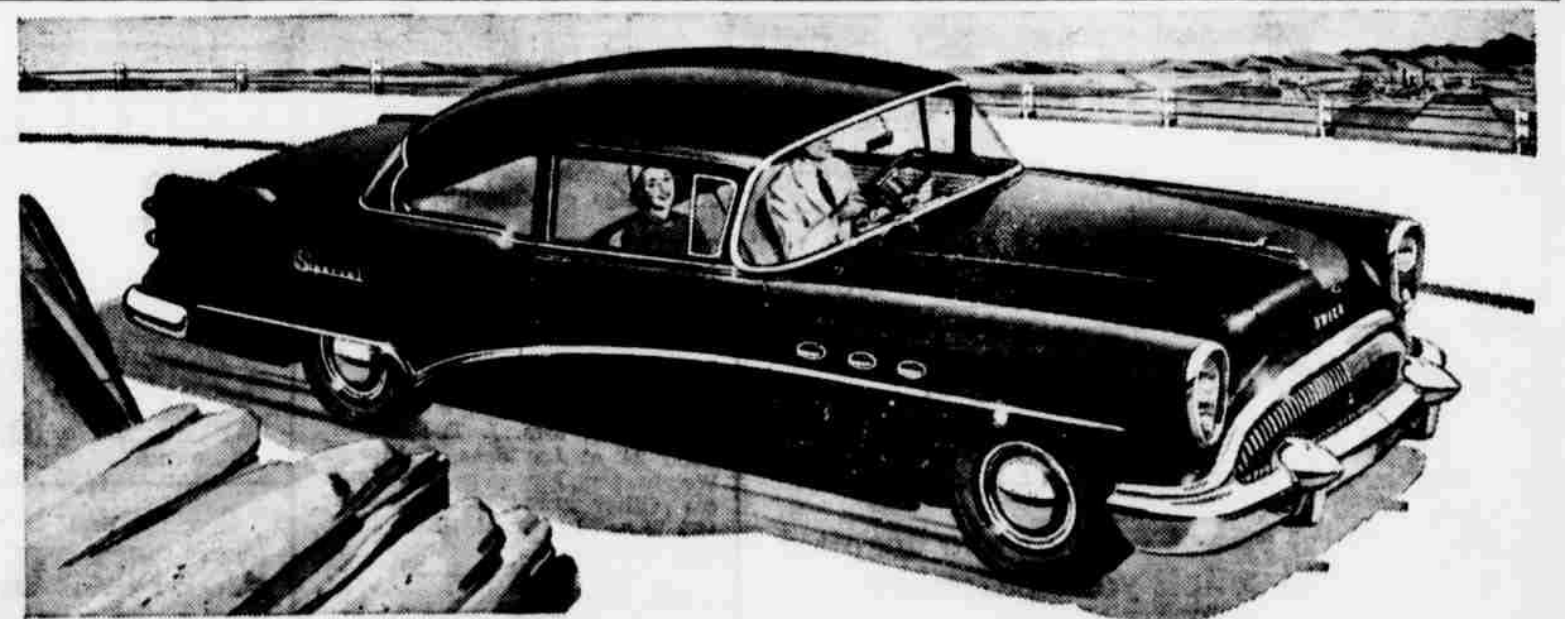

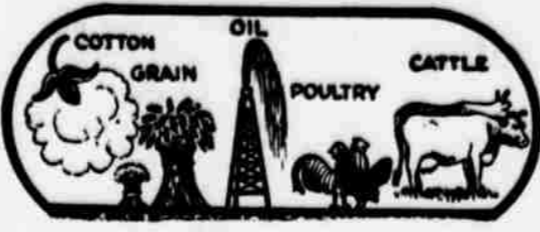

E. J. (Ed) Cloud Issues Statement To Voters

To The Voters of the 83rd Legislative District:

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From Your State Capitol

By VERN SANFORD

AUSTIN, Texas—Texas politicians turned to the grass roots trails, trying to swing undecided votes, as the campaign wound into its final days.

Most attention was centered on the governor's race, in which Allan Shivers and Ralph W. Yarborough flung charges and countercharges at each other in a dazzling exchange. Some of Shivers' contentions were:

That Yarborough was using "vile methods in an attempt to cover up his tie-in with CIO-PAC which was trying to take over the government of Texas."

That Yarborough campaigners had spread false rumors to the effect that Shivers wanted to abolish the orphans home in Corsicana.

Yarborough Retorts Yarborough came back with these accusations: That Shivers had tried to suppress an FBI investigation of the Gatesville school last year.

That Shivers is a "hyphenated Democrat-Republican."

That Shivers had not reported all of his campaign expenditures.

Positive Side Both candidates, stump speaking in the villages and towns, also had their positive statements to make, in addition to charges against each other, although the latter phase made the most headlines.

Shivers, saying that he was drawing surprisingly good crowds,

emphasized his record in office, pointing to more money spent for good roads, schools, and welfare programs.

Yarborough pledged improvement in the state government and more money for state services.

He also expressed interest in a state youth program to combat juvenile delinquency, and was critical of the slash in appropriations which wiped out the Community Services Division of the Youth Development commission.

"The field representatives of the commission who worked with local government and groups, and also as parole supervisors for youngsters released from state schools on parole, were eliminated," Yarborough commented.

Delegate Ruling Texas Supreme Court has been asked to determine how Democratic delegate strength shall be counted this year.

Significance of the question is that its solution will have a strong bearing in deciding control of party conventions.

Previously the State Democratic Executive Committee had called for computation of delegate strength by considering both Democratic and Republican votes that Shivers received as a cross-field candidate in 1952.

Anti-Shivers loyalists, backed by two lower court decisions, have argued that the convention strength should be based only on

Democratic votes recorded in the last state election year. It is the first time in Texas political history that the question has arisen.

Drouth Aid John C. White, the state commissioner of agriculture, went to Washington and asked that federal assistance be given to 27 Central Texas counties, hard hit by drouth.

White told federal authorities that Central Texas people face possibly the worst crisis in history unless help—in the form of money or rain—comes soon.

Receivership Into permanent receivership went the General American Casualty Company of San Antonio, so ordered by District Judge Jack Roberts of Austin.

Judge Roberts ordered the company's over 120,000 policies to be cancelled after stating that he had delayed the receivership move in the hope that the firm's officials could reorganize, but that they had been unable to raise the necessary financing for another try.

Red Law Texas' new anti-Communist ruling that outlaws membership in the Communist Party or any organization attempting to overthrow the government by force may not hold up in court, says Attorney General John Ben Shepperd.

Shepperd, who called the legislation the "most inclusive and far-sighted anti-Communist law in the nation," warned state lawyers that a former court ruling holding that control of sedition belongs exclusively to the federal government might render the law invalid.

Shepperd added that the ruling, handed down by a Pennsylvania court, might "knock out all state sedition and treason laws."

Duval County Suspended by the Supreme Court was an order halting the prosecution of Duval County political boss George Parr and several of his associates.

Attorney General Shepperd, hailing the ruling which clears the way for action on 28 indictments returned by a special Duval County grand jury, said it "clears the decks for prosecution of the indictments."

Wardens Answer On 'Party' Line Cost Fishermen

AUSTIN—The Director of Law Enforcement for the Texas Game and Fish Commission reported that some of the heaviest fines in the last arrest report were for stunning fish with old-fashioned hand-cranked telephone sets.

Top levy for the month, among 244 cases listed, was against a Houston man. It was for \$200 and court costs for using the once standard magneto-equipped phone set to shock fish so they rise to the surface.

Several such violations were detected in the Houston area. In addition to the \$200 fine plus costs, there were three for \$100 fines and costs. Smaller levies were made against others.

The report contained 22 cases for taking fish illegally. Most of these involved "telephoning fish." The largest fine outside the Houston area was \$100 plus costs

against a San Antonio man. Of the 244 cases in the arrest report, 118 involved individual fishermen's troubles. There were others affecting commercial violations.

The cost-price squeeze on agricultural producers is expected to continue during 1954. Reason—further declines for some farm commodities coupled with little or no expected changes in the cost of production items.

but rural life is improving, Assistant Professor Wilfred C. Bailey of the University of Texas declares. Latest U. S. census figures show only the irrigation-farming sections of the Texas Panhandle and Lower Rio Grande Valley recorded rural population gains. That means prosperity for all areas, Bailey says. Farming prospects in the Panhandle and Valley are improving. In other rural sections, farms have become larger and marginal lands have been turned into grazing pastures. Better roads and transportation have caused larger villages and towns to grow as shopping centers for the large farm owners, Bailey explains. Operators of small marginal farms have found better-paying jobs in the shopping centers. Only smaller villages have suffered from the changes, he says. With today's highways and motor vehicles, a purchaser who once had only time to drive 10 miles to a store now is willing to drive from 30 to 50 miles to shop. New industries in smaller cities also are improving living conditions in many rural areas, allowing farmers to work in factories also, Bailey pointed out. An anthropologist, Bailey has made many studies of changing social, economic and cultural conditions in rural areas.

Insecticides Boost Test Cotton Yields

Chemical insect control in cotton adds up to about a fourth larger crop on the average, according to entomologists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. More than 30 years of insecticide field trials at Tallulah, La., carried on by the Agricultural Research Service, have resulted in an annual average seed cotton yield of 1,826 pounds per acre. This is 371 pounds or 25.5 per cent more cotton than from untreated cotton plots, which average 1,445 pounds per acre. Since 1920 when these comparisons began, use of insecticides has always resulted in more cotton, although in 1924 the increase amounted to only 1.1 per cent and in 1944, only 1.5 per cent. In all years, the entomologists have compared several plots or more to reduce the chances of unrealistic production averages. Altogether 973 plots have been compared.
