Burglars Knock Knob on Unlocked Safe at Smitty's

Burglars who entered Smitty's Auto Supply on North First Street a block east of the square some time Monday night went to a lot of trouble in getting an unlocked safe open, but got little for their time and effort.

The knob was knocked from the safe in the office of Chas. E. Smith, owner of the concern, and the vault ransacked. However, the thieves overlooked a sum of money in an envelope in the safe. Also overlooked was the fact that the combination had not been locked and that the vault could have been opened without knocking the knob.

After opening the safe, the thieves ransacked the entire office thoroughly in their search for money.

An open cash register in the front of the building, and which contained approximately \$20 in change, was untouched, the thieves apparently being after a larger haul.

Only thing missing following a check Tuesday morning, was an electric razor, and "Smitty" said the heaviest loss from the unwelcome callers was damage caused to the safe.

Entry to the building was gained by breaking a small window in the rear of the store. Thieves left by a rear door which they unlocked from the inside.

Investigating officers believe that the burglars were looking only for money, as the culprits could easily have taken several hundred dollars worth of expensive tools or automobile accessories.

Many Pledges Being Received For Walking Blood Bank

Good response of pledges to the Haskell County Walking Blood Bank is reported by Harold Spain, county chairman of the project which is being sponsored by the Lions Club and local civic groups.

Purpose of the Blood Bank is to assemble a list of volunteer blood donors whose blood type has been correctly determined, and have this information immediately available when an emergency arises.

"The blood bank will serve as protection for you in case of an accident when you need blood," Chairman Spain pointed out. "It could save your life in case of an emergency. Also if a friend or neighbor needs blood and you are able to donate, it will save precious time and extra trouble if your blood type is known," he added.

Plans have been made to set up a Blood Center here on Friday and Saturday, Dec. 10 and 11 for mass typing of volunteer donors. The center will be located in the building three doors east of the Post Office. Blood typing will be under supervision of registered nurses and a physician.

All men and women between the ages of 18 and 55 who are in good health are eligible as blood donors under most circumstances.

Persons who already know their blood types are asked to list this information in a coupon published in this issue of The Free Press, and mail to Chairman Spain, Haskell, Texas.

Persons who do know their blood type, but are willing to cooperate as a volunteer donor to the walking Blood Bank, are asked to fill in the coupon provided for this purpose, and indicate what date they will report (either Dec. 10 or 11) to have their blood typed.

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State Draft Call In January to be For 1,249 Men
State draft headquarters at Austin last week received the biggest Texas induction quota in a year, Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said.
The monthly quota received last week, which called for 1,249 men in January, 1955, was the biggest since the January 1954 quota of 1,324 men, received in November of 1953.

With the exception of volunteers, the January call will be filled only with men who on January 1 are at least 20 years and one month of age, regardless of their local boards of jurisdiction.
At the same time the induction quota was announced, the state director of Selective Service announced that 2,697 men from 137 state draft boards will be sent for pre-induction examinations in January 1955.

Rochester Blanks Aspermont 13-0 For 7-B Title
The Rochester Steers horned their way into the Aspermont Hornets nest Thanksgiving Day to clinch the 7-B football title for a second year with a 13-0 victory.
Rochester was regional champion in the 1953 season.
The game, played at Aspermont, was witnessed by an estimated 700 fans from the two towns.
End John Glover gave Rochester its first TD in the second quarter. On a run around his left end, Glover packed the ball all the way from his own 28-yard line, through the Hornet defense, and across the goal line.
Halfback Donnie McNelly punched the extra point through right tackle.
The other score came in the fourth period. Taking the ball on downs at the 43 yard line, the Steers unleashed a series of ground plays to the Aspermont one-yard line. From there Halfback Billy Joe Hollingsworth took the ball through right tackle for the final score.
Rochester did not attempt a punt anytime in the play. Aspermont averaged 43 yards on four punts. The Steers racked up 304 yards rushing, compared to 160 for Aspermont.
Keeping passes to a minimum, the Rochester team completed three out of four attempts to gain 40 yards through the air. The other pass was intercepted by Aspermont. Aspermont completed only three of eight attempted passes, to gain 22 yards. One was intercepted.
Rochester made an even dozen first downs to nine for Aspermont. The Steers drew seven penalties for 55 yards, compared to three for 15 yards for Aspermont. Aspermont lost one fumble.

Indications Point To More Cattle On Feed

By TED GOULDY

Fort Worth—The suspicion is growing stronger among observers at the livestock market at Fort Worth that beef cattle on feed in the Southwest are well in excess of the numbers indicated by earlier estimates.

In recent weeks word here is that many mills processing cottonseed are refusing to contract cottonseed hulls for future delivery because of the current strong demand. They fear to contract for future delivery since they have been unable to pile up any reserves and are selling them as fast as they are made.

It is reported that at many mills trucks stand in line for half a day waiting to get a load. Experienced buyers and salesmen at Fort Worth say, "Those hulls are going into livestock somewhere. Every time we have this situation of fast disappearing cottonseed hulls it has developed that more cattle were being fattened than anyone suspected."

It is pointed out that no doubt a good many mother cows are being wintered with some hulls as roughage—but this does not dispel the theory of the old-timers. They expect more fat cattle in the first quarter of next year than earlier guesses indicated.

Popular opinion is that many of the cattle on feed are heifers. Reason is that heifers most of the late summer and fall sold around \$4 or more under comparable steers. This "spread" made feeding heifers look like a good bet to many even though when marketed the heifers would not sell as well as fat steers. The additional margin between cost of heifers against steers made them look after a safer bet to make money.

Post-Thanksgiving Cattle Trade Starts Off Well

There was the usual difference of opinion between salesmen and buyers at Fort Worth Monday, but when it was all over most cattle and calves sold at fully steady to stronger prices. Mature fat steers, cows and high grade calves were measurably higher. Few high grade stockers were on hand and order buyers indicated the supply of high quality stockers was far short of their needs.

Numerous loads of mature steers sold from \$21 to \$24, a few better cattle to \$24.50. Fat cows drew \$8.50 to \$11, some young cows of high yielding potential to \$12. Cannors and cutters drew \$5 to \$8.50, bulls cashed at \$8 to \$12.

Good and choice fat calves of all weights \$15 to \$18.50 with fancy baby beef types to \$19 to \$20 above. Choice stocker steer calves and light yearlings sold from \$17 to \$20. Replacement cows \$7 to \$12.

Prehistoric Skull Believed That Of Woman

"Midland Man," human remains found near the city of Midland, probably is a woman, University

of Texas anthropologists announced.

Careful measurements of the skull proportions, brow and mastoid formation, teeth and finger bones indicate the remains are those of an Indian woman who died about the age 30, Researcher Alex Krieger said. Her age was estimated by examining the closing of sutures, or anatomical cracks in her skull. The sutures in a person's skull knit together at a given rate as the person grows older.

Krieger and Dr. Fred Wendorf

of the New Mexico Museum also announced chemical tests support other archeological evidence that Midland Woman was one of the earliest known residents of the Southwest.

The tests of fluorine, nitrogen and other chemical contents in Midland Woman's remains match similar tests of elephant, horse, camel and giant wolf and bison bones found in the same excavation. Any approximation of the woman's total age must await tests by machines which measure radiation disintegration in artifacts.
