Haskell County History

20 Years Ago—Dec. 31, 1934

The new Ford V-8 for 1935 will go on display in the showrooms of the Haskell Motor Company today, according to J. D. Montgomery, manager of the local automobile concern. The 1935 model incorporates many new features, he says.

Texas Centennial 50-cent piece will go on sale after the first of the year, with first distribution of the new coins to be handled by the American Legion. The special coins were made possible by an Act of Congress, in recognition of the coming Texas Centennial.

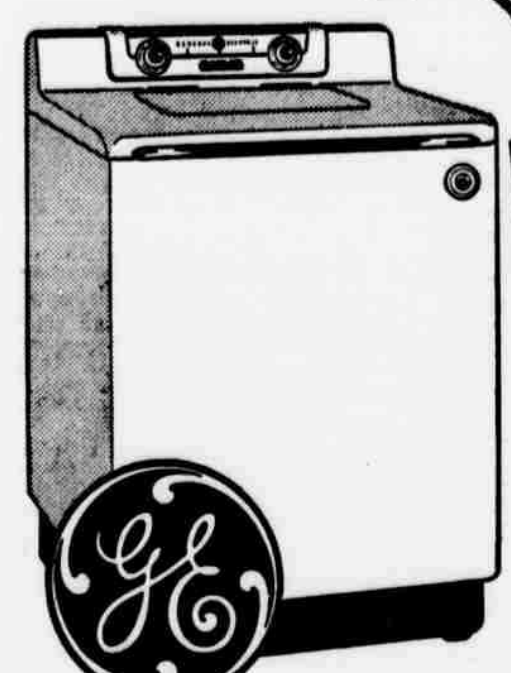

Most Livestock Lost Again in Past Year

Fort Worth—Livestock producers of Texas and the Southwest again felt the effects of the searing drought in 1954, and while there were some areas of improvement, most livestock lost ground again.

A comparison of prices this week with a year ago reveals fed steers selling to better advantage than a year ago, and fat lambs steady. Bulls also held steady. However, other kinds of livestock are at lower levels a check of prices at Ft. Worth revealed.

A year ago good and choice fed steers and yearlings topped at \$18 to \$23, and comparable cattle today sell from \$19 to \$24, a few to \$25. Lower grade steers and yearlings a year ago drew \$10 to \$17, and comparable kind are \$1 above that now.

Butcher cows at \$10.50 to \$13 a year ago and canners and cutters at \$6 to \$10 in December 1953, were around \$1 above current values on comparable kinds. Bulls at \$8 to \$13 a year ago command the same value today.

Slaughter calves of good and choice grades sold at \$18 to \$20 a year ago, and similar calves average around 50 cents under that with some fairly good kinds \$1 below last year's levels. Some additional discount in returns from calf sales this year can be charged to grubs which are much worse this year than last. Lower grade calves are fully \$1 under a year ago.

Most market improvement in the trade was in stocker and feeder cattle and calves. Choice feeder and stocker steer calves quotable at \$19 to \$21 at Fort Worth today, are \$1 to \$2 above a year ago, and feeder steers and yearlings quotable today at a similar range are \$1 to \$3 ahead of last year at this time. A supporting factor in the cattle and calf trade all this year was the strength in stockers and feeders and this class has averaged fully \$1 to \$3 and at times \$4 or more above the low periods in late summer and fall in 1953.

Quiet demand for stocker cows this year at prices somewhat above their slaughter value has been evident throughout the season, whereas in the late summer and fall of 1953 stocker cows demand was virtually nil.

Hogs Sharply Below 1953—Hogs topped Monday at Fort Worth at \$18.75, and all during November and December of 1954 swine have been selling at or near the lowest point in a couple of years. The last week in December 1953 hogs topped at \$26.25 to \$26.50, or \$7.75 higher than today's levels. Sows at \$22-\$24 a year ago, today sell at \$12 to \$16, or \$8 or more below last year's levels at this date.

Most packers in their year-end financial statements blamed smaller earnings on the high cost of hogs during the first three quarters of 1954. With an estimated 5 per cent increase in the Spring pig crop looming, prospects for substantial recovery of the losses of the past year seem rather dim, though some improvement early next year may be in the offering after the peak winter movement subsides.

Government Tax Booklet Will Be Available Soon

"Your Federal Income Tax, 1954," the official Government tax guide, will be ready for distribution soon after January 1, the Superintendent of Documents announced today.

Issued each year by the Internal Revenue Service, this helpful booklet is designed especially to aid tax payers in preparing and filing their individual returns.

This year's edition includes the important personal income tax provisions incorporated in the new Internal Revenue Code. Among the variety of subjects covered are—who must file a return; when and where; exemptions; deductions; and collections and refunds.

Although "Your Federal Income Tax" is still in press, orders are being accepted for future delivery by the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C. Price of the booklet is 25 cents a copy.

No Food Shortage On January Plentiful List

For the third consecutive month, meats dominate the plentiful food list. Included are heavy turkeys, beef, pork, halibut, haddock, shrimp and canned tuna.

January features for this area, however, according to USDA, are eggs, fresh and processed oranges, grapefruit and tangerines. Dairy products and rice remain in good supply. So do walnuts, almonds and filberts, raisins, lard, vegetable fats and oils.

The plentiful food list is based upon a survey made each month in the major trade areas of the state by the southwest food distribution division, Agricultural Marketing Service, Dallas. Foods shown to be in heavy enough supply are placed on the list. Raymond J. Totoro is in charge of the food area distribution division.

The Haskell banker was a director of the Haskell Telephone Company before the locally owned system was acquired by the General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

The following article, together with a picture of the Haskell man, is reprinted from "The Roundup":

"Haskell, Texas, has played an important part in the life of Director A. C. Pierson. It is his birthplace; its public schools helped to provide his education; and now he is the President of the Haskell National Bank. Mr. Pierson started working in the bank as a messenger in 1920. Four years later, he was elected cashier. In 1946, he advanced to the vice presidency, and the following year he became president.

"Our director, after completing his public school education in Haskell and San Antonio, entered Simmons College, now Hardin-Simmons University. From there he went into ranching in Stonewall County. It was four years later that he began working in the bank.

"Mr. Pierson had served as a director of the Haskell Telephone Company for a time before it was acquired by this company. Upon its transfer, he became a director of the present General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

"A member of the First Baptist Church, Mr. Pierson has served as Sunday School Superintendent there for 20 years. At present, he is also teacher of a young men's class, a deacon, and the chairman of the church finance committee.

Mr. Pierson is very active in civic groups, having served eight years on the City Council. Now a director of the Chamber of Commerce, he has been president of that group twice. In addition to these activities, he has served two terms as president of the Lions Club. He is currently a member of the Masonic Lodge, the Central West Texas Oil and Gas Association, and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Pierson maintains a vivid interest in sports, especially baseball, football, hunting and fishing. He keeps up with most of the major leagues and attends several Southwest Conference football games each season. Mr. and Mrs. Pierson have one daughter and one grandson."

Cotton Ginnings Gain in Area

An increase of slightly more than 50,000 bales over the same period last year is shown in a report on cotton ginned prior to Dec. 1 in 21 Texas counties in this area.

Up to that date 306,463 bales had been ginned last year compared to 356,516 for the same period in 1954. However, for the whole state, a 14,211 decrease in the number of bales ginned is shown. The report, released by the Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census, lists for the state 3,467,256 bales for 1954 and 3,481,467 for last year.
