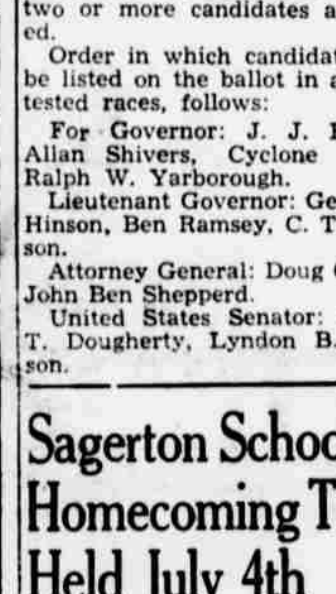
Haskell County Unit of CROP Organized At Meeting of Ministers Here Friday

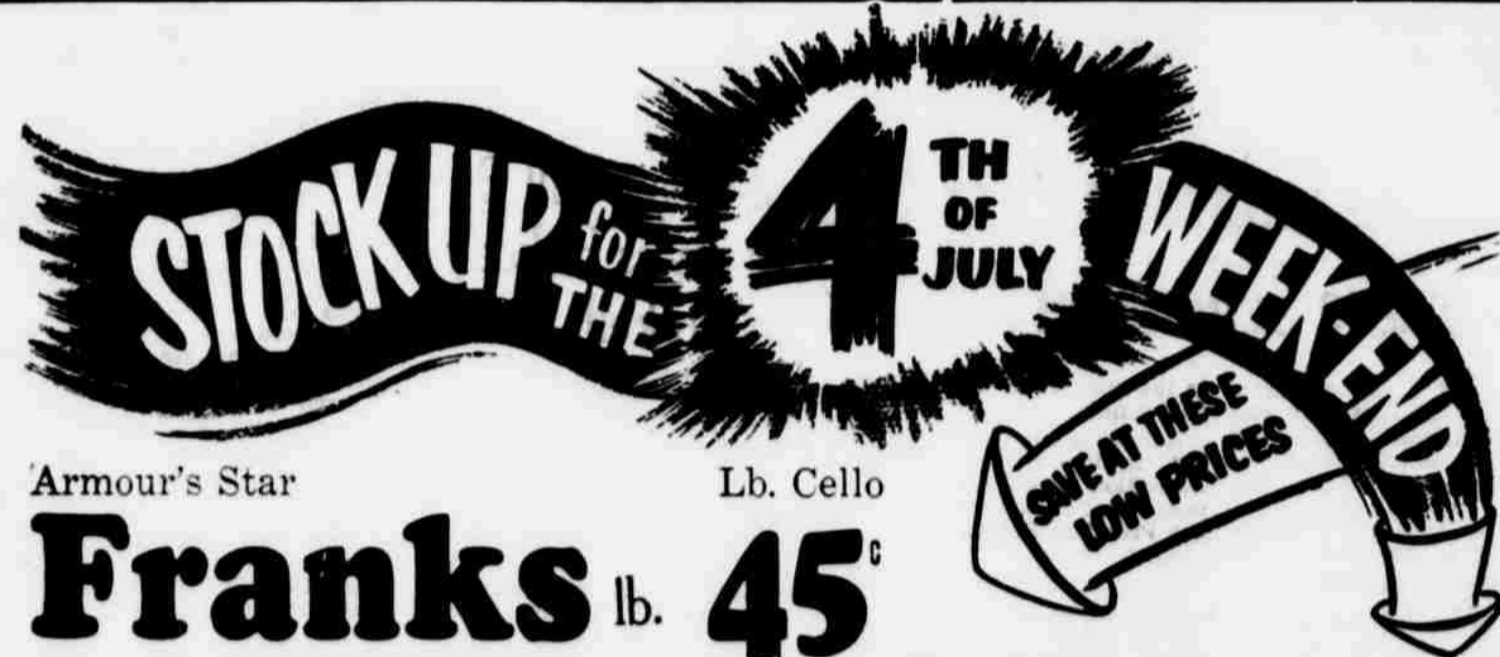

Agent Explains Why Tomato Blossoms Shed

Already the complaints are beginning to come in of tomatoes that have good vines and bloom in a normal fashion but shed the blossoms without setting any fruit. There are several conditions which may cause tomato blossoms shedding. Probably foremost among these are high temperatures. Standard varieties of tomatoes commonly planted in the early spring such as Rutgers, Marglobe, Stockdale and Fritchard will not set fruit under conditions of high temperature. For these varieties blossom shedding starts when temperatures reach 85 F.

There are two reasons why the fruit does not set under conditions of high temperatures. One is that the style which bears the stigma on which the pollen grain germinates elongates beyond the cone of anthers. When this happens the stigmatic surface may dry out so that the pollen grains do not adhere. Also, when temperatures go above 85 F the percentage of germination of the pollen grains is greatly reduced. One test has shown that only about 6 per cent of the pollen grains germinated in a 42-hour period at a temperature of 100 F.

In most gardens at this time onions and potatoes have been harvested leaving some idle space. Heat tolerant vegetables should be planted in this space such as Southern peas including Blackeyes, Purple Hulls, Creams and

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From Your State Capitol

AUSTIN—This year's campaign for the governorship of Texas is boiling down to an old fashioned political battle.

Governor Allan Shivers and his opponent Ralph Yarborough are touring the state and throwing punches.

Shivers called Yarborough the "hand-picked candidate" of the CIO political action committee.

Yarborough accuses Shivers of running an anti-labor campaign. Shivers replies that he is happy to learn that Yarborough is going to quit telling "untruths and run a clean campaign for a change."

Yarborough criticizes Shivers for seeking a third term and pictures him as a Democrat-Republican.

Shivers also drew a jab from the Texas Federation of Labor at its convention in Corpus Christi. The Federation urged his defeat for re-election and termed his record "obnoxious."

Shivers says his labor opposition is originating from the big party bosses and not the rank and file of workers.

The tempo will increase with the temperature as July 24 approaches.

Meanwhile Shivers will be using newspaper ads and radio time to get his message to the public. Yarborough, on the other hand, will concentrate largely on radio and TV.

Political Pot
Other state and political races, warming up now, saw these developments:

Dudley T. Dougherty, candidate for the U. S. Senate, pounded away at incumbent Lyndon B. Johnson's voting record, declaring Johnson "absolutely unfit to be nominated for Senator."

Dougherty listed nine counts to "indict Johnson before the bar of Texas public opinion."

Former Governor Coke Stevenson, who now is helping to mastermind Dougherty's campaign, reports that the response to his appeal to voters to help Dougherty "has been heavy."

Jabs at Vice
Doug Crouch of Fort Worth, candidate for Attorney General, charged that opponent John Ben Shepperd was going easy on his friends and prosecuting his enemies.

Crouch also lashed out at what he called flourishing vice organizations in Galveston and guaranteed that he would start his clean-up campaign of the Island City in 24 hours if elected.

Insurance Tangle
Meanwhile Shepperd and Insurance Commission Chairman Garland Smith tangled over an issue involving the General American Casualty Co. of San Antonio, latest insurance failure.

Smith held that the firm should include an unusual reason for its failure in the report to the commission—that an accusation by a political candidate had accelerated its bankruptcy.

Shepperd said he wasn't in favor of politics being injected into the issue.

General American directors, although not naming the source, had complained that many of their troubles arose when a candidate for governor had charged that a Texas Insurance firm was deeply in the red. This called unfavorable attention to their company and prevented the re-establishment of financial soundness, they said. A later check revealed that Yarborough had made a similar accusation on the date given by the company's directors.

High Court Candidates
Two Texas lawyers have been named as possible candidates, either by appointment or election, for the position of the late Graham B. Smedley on the state Supreme Court.

Chief Justice Clyde E. Grissom of the Eastland Court of Civil Appeals and W. N. Stokes, formerly on the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals, have been suggested.

Farm Safety Week Proclaimed From July 25 to 31

"More accidental deaths occur for each 100,000 workers, in agriculture than in any other major industry of the nation. Texas, with its widespread farming and ranching operations, is in a position to help reduce this accident toll," said Governor Allan Shivers in the proclamation he signed designating the week of July 25-31 Farm Safety Week.

Continuing the Governor said, "A disabling injury strikes some farm person in America on the average of every 26 seconds. The U. S. Department of Agriculture and the National Safety Council are cooperating in a campaign designed to reduce the huge number of avoidable farm accidents and I urge all Texans engaged in farming activities to exercise all possible caution in their work."

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety committee is the organization in the state through which cooperative efforts are being directed toward reducing the farm accident rate. Committee members represent the state ad federal agencies working in agriculture and home economics, farm organizations, pre- and radio, commercial, industrial and business concerns and individuals who are all interested in seeing the label, "Nation's most hazardous occupation," removed from agriculture.

Paul Walser of the Soil Conservation Service is chairman of the general committee and H. Walter Hammond, president, Texas Farm Bureau, is chairman of the Executive Board of the committee. E. C. Martin, state agriculture leader for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineer, serve as vice chairman and secretary of the groups.

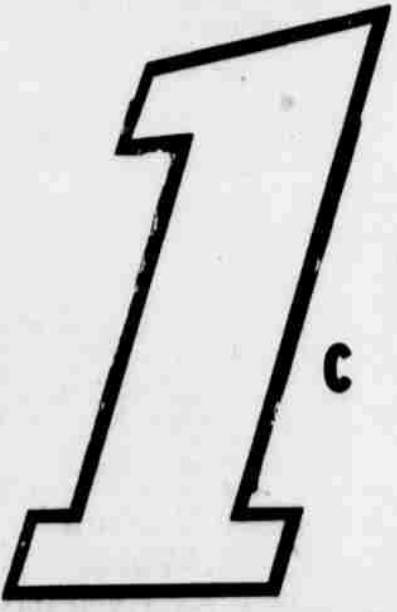

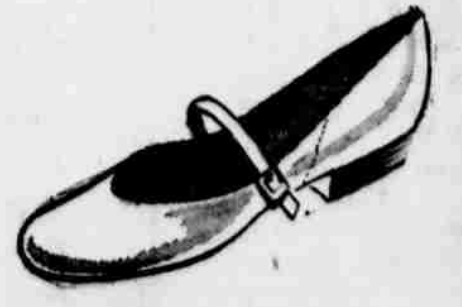

Summer Weather Requires Care in Handling Food

AUSTIN, July 1—Dr. Henry A. Holle State Health Officer, warns now that hot weather is here, everyone should be careful in handling and storing food to prevent food poisoning.

Knowing Range Grasses Necessary For Best Range Management

A knowledge of grasses is fundamental to the building of a successful range management program. There is a wide range of usefulness among pasture grasses and, according to A. H. Walker, extension range specialist, scrub grasses are like scrub animals, growing them doesn't pay.

In addition to less desirable grasses include brush, weeds and trees. These competitors rob the good grasses of needed moisture and plant food and make the struggle for survival a one-sided fight when overgrazing is practiced.

Pastures and ranges of the state have been hard hit during the past few years but have shown remarkable recovery in most areas, says Walker. His advice now is to give the key grasses a chance to build a root system and produce a seed crop. The roots are even more important to the plant than top growth for without a deep, well-developed root system, the key plants' chances of survival are reduced. A good seed crop is needed to hasten the rebuilding job and here is where the knowledge of grasses come into the picture.

Walker says local county agricultural agents have on hand material which contains suggestions and aids for identifying range plants as well as hints on how best to handle them for maximum returns.

Finally, the specialist points out, the key plants, they may be native or well established introduced species, are the best ones for any given area. They should be the measuring stick for judging proper range use. They produce more forage and are a basic resource of the state's range land and are of major importance in the economical production of livestock in Texas. Their survival and well being depends upon the treatment given them by the livestock producers of the state.

Governor Allan Shivers notes in his proclamation on Farm Safety Week, July 25-31, that agriculture is the nation's most hazardous occupation. Farm and ranch residents are urged by the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety committee to join with their friends and neighbors in a concentrated effort at reducing accidents.

Texas Longhorn Cavern Near Burnet Attracts Growing Number Sightseers

Burnet, Texas (Special)—Sightseeing Texans have "discovered" a spectacular scenic wonder within the state's own borders—Texas Longhorn Cavern, the third largest in the world.

A trickle of visitors to the giant cave became a flood last year. Manager H. H. (Hob) Galloway said, and a record number of vacationers, tourists and just folks driving by are expected this summer. Over a quarter of a million sightseers from all over the country already have explored the cavern.

Longhorn Cavern State Park and the adjacent Inks State Park are particularly beautiful at this time of year, when the wild flowers are in bloom. Mr. Galloway pointed out. The road to the cavern from U. S. Highway 281 is 6 miles of pavement that winds and dips through rolling fields of colorful daisies, black-eyed Susans, Indian paint-brush, gallardia, purple sage, yucca and cacti of various types.

The cavern country has likewise grown in popularity as a refreshing new vacation land. Galloway said. Four beautiful lakes have been created at an integral part of the Lower Colorado River Authority's flood control, irrigation and power system. Lake Buchanan, largest of the group, is 32 miles long, a sail-boater's delight and a fisherman's dream lake. Inks, Granite Shoals and Marble Falls lakes lie like jewels

in a lovely string among the wooded hills.

Hundreds of public vacation cottages are sprinkled along the shore lines. Boating and fishing equipment are available everywhere. The great scenic region offers almost every conceivable type of recreation.

Many tales of historic interest have their setting in Longhorn Cavern. Rusted revolvers, flattened bullets, human skeletons and Indian arrowheads have been discovered in the cave. It was reputed to be the hangout of the notorious bandit Sam Bass, and the stronghold of warlike Indian tribes. The Confederate Army used the huge 183-foot Main Room for manufacturing gun powder during the Civil War.

Guided tours leave the cavern's administration building every hour from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. and the cave is open every day of the year. Over two miles of the cavern have been cleaned out and dramatically illuminated. Eight miles of the cavern has been explored, but no end has ever been reached and cave experts have estimated that the cave runs for many miles more beneath the eraggy hills that surrounds the entrance.

Some of the rooms and passageways in the cavern are big enough to accommodate four-lane traffic. Every room is different—some with walls of crystallized calcite sparkling like diamond dust, others glowing red with the iron oxide embedded in them.

Directors Explain Costs Incidental To Free Ball Games

In order that softball and Kid baseball games may be played at Fair Park Field without admission charge to the public, it is necessary to take up voluntary collections from fans, occasionally, directors of the City Softball League explained this week.

The free games were made possible by the city assuming the cost of lights for the night games, the directors explained. However, expense of replacing burned-out lights, and costs of new balls provided for each League game is underwritten by the League. Since there is no income from admissions or any other source, fans are occasionally asked to contribute for this purpose. Cost of replacing only one light is \$7.50, it was pointed out.

"Fans have been extremely generous with contributions on the few occasions when we have 'passed the hat' to make up for these expenses," directors said. Directors and players alike feel that the effort to provide ball games as a program of entertainment and recreation is appreciated by the public, they added.

A colorful Western parade at 5 o'clock this afternoon will mark the opening of this year's Texas Cowboy Reunion in Stamford.

Hundreds of horses and riders, as well as chuckwagons, buggies, stagecoaches and decorated floats will comprise the picturesque procession through the business district.

The first of the five performances of the rodeo will start at 8 p. m. tonight and there will be performances all four nights (skipping Sunday, July 4) with an afternoon rodeo also on Monday, the final day.

American Foreign Policy Being Shaped By Two Events, Sen. Johnson Declares

The future of American foreign policy—the issues of war and peace—are being shaped by two separate events, declares U. S. Senator Lyndon B. Johnson in his Washington new letter of June 26. He explains:

One is the visit of Prime Minister Winston Churchill to America. The other is the Soviet Aggression against the Western Hemisphere which has exploded into civil war in Guatemala. At the time this is being written, we are still waiting for Churchill's visit and the civil war is still under way. But regardless of the outcome of either event, there are certain background considerations which must be taken into account in deciding our destiny.

Prime Minister Churchill is coming to the United States at a time when Anglo-American relations are under the greatest strain in decades. Prime Minister Churchill is a man of great charm and personality. But the American people are properly concerned about the actions of his government in the past few years.

Why the British government has persisted in keeping open certain trade channels to the Iron Curtain nations? Why the British government has persisted in keeping the Geneva talks going even when obviously they had reached the point of futility?

The American government has built up its system of post-World War II alliances for one reason and one reason only—to halt the pattern of communist conquest. In the post war world, there can be no other objective that deserves such a high priority. These alliances must be a two-way street! If Prime Minister Churchill is well advised, he will bring with him assurances that he personally has that understanding and that his government will act accordingly.

Use of Chemicals For Defoliation On Increase

The success or failure of the cotton defoliating job depends on several factors, according to County Agent F. W. Martin. Tests conducted by workers of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station last year at Weslaco, College Station, Temple, Lubbock and Ysleta indicate that important considerations are characteristics of the chemicals and the rate and volume applied; method of application; climatic conditions, especially moisture and temperature; cultural practices, such as fertilization and plant density and the varieties grown.

The chlorate-borate, SEX and Phillips defoliants were best in the tests at Weslaco; Endothal and Phillips at College Station; Endothal led the chemicals tested at Temple while Aereo Cyanamide soluble gave the best defoliation at Lubbock and Ysleta.

Amino triazole, trade name Amizol, and a newcomer to the defoliation tests showed up well at four of the test sites. When added to sprays made from Endothal, Aereo Cyanamide soluble, liquid Chemfrost and Shed-a-leaf, it not only gave a substantial increase in defoliation but was effective in holding back regrowth at Weslaco and in some tests at College Station and Temple for over a month.

Application tests made at College Station show that better defoliation was obtained by using a high clearance ground sprayer than from aerial application. The timing of application is of major importance and data from previous studies is available.

Many other tests were included in the state-wide program and all are covered in Progress Report 1680 released by the Texas Station available from the Agricultural information office, College Station.

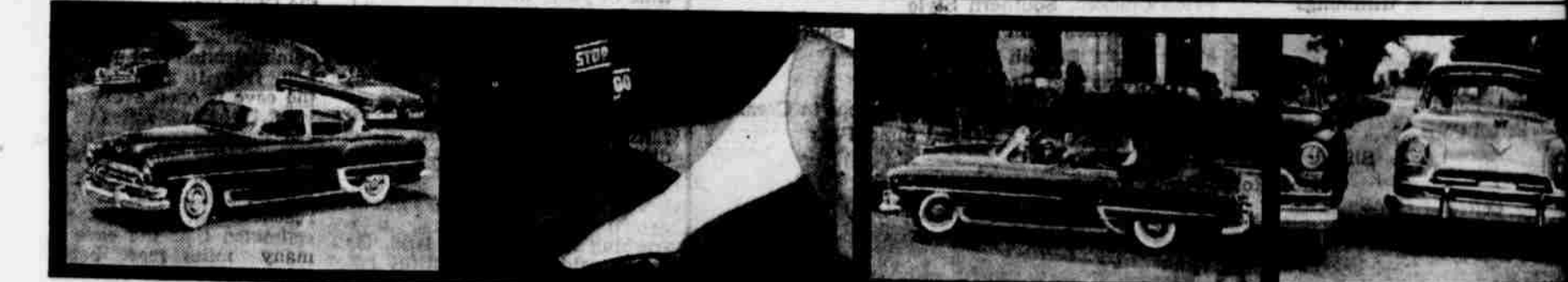

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Potter County, Texas, may become nationally famous.

In this county presiding Judge E. C. Nelson ruled Congress has no right to enforce union membership to hold a job; further stated Congressional powers to regulate interstate commerce do not encompass question of union membership.

Mississippi has a new law outlawing the closed shop, so does South Carolina; Kentucky considers one. Therefore it appears probable Potter County decision will reach U. S. Supreme Court.

Ensuing litigation could throw into limelight fact that not only has nation failed to solve problem of Big Labor, as well as that of Big Business, but that two are intertwined.

Many authorities hold labor legislation of past 22 years has evaded real basic problem.

Early New Deal legislation sought to force big corporations and holding companies formed by uncontrolled depression causing mergers to deal with labor.

Then followed legislation to restrain Big Labor power.

Today it appears Big Labor, allied with Big Business, has formed a production monopoly.

Thus, heads of entrenched leaders in any industry gather together with the leaders of Big Labor, and wages, hours, and conditions are agreed upon for entire industry. These terms are also based on the earnings and abilities of a few big corporations to meet agreed terms.

But these terms become binding upon the entire industry in the nation with almost as much iron clad tightness as if Congress had passed laws prescribing what wages, hours, and conditions shall prevail in that industry.

No account is taken of the fact that perhaps some small competing in a rural area where living costs are lower, and where labor would rather work for less per hour in order to live better, could by making a deal with his labor satisfactory to both sides, overcome advantages held by the big interests enabling him to compete with them.

Neither is there any latitude for deals between employers and labor, such as existed around the turn of century when workers would draw less money than existing rate, taking difference in an interest in the company. This method resulted in building many successful businesses, to mutual advantage of all.

There is another factor. Some of the firms who put up only token resistance to Big Labor demands, are most active in operating foreign plants with cheap labor, and promoting abolition of U. S. tariffs in order to bring their foreign production into the U. S. cheaply to undersell independent competitors.

It's a cozy game, that of dealing with Big Labor to peg domestic labor costs at a high level to the disadvantage of independent competitors, and then further cut the ground out from under them with foreign goods produced with cheap labor. Potter County, Texas, may be the first to protest against this unholy alliance between Big Business and Big Labor, sanctioned by 22 years of Congressional meddling, but there is bound to be other counties heard from.
