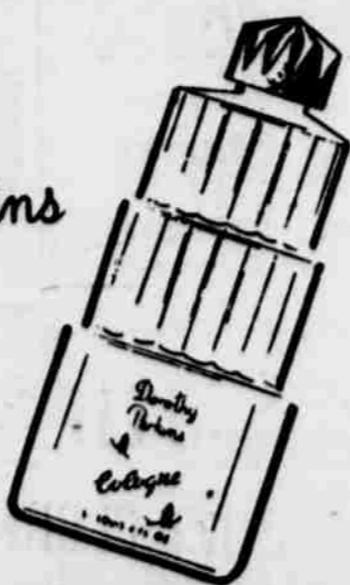

**4-H and FFA Rodeo**  
The 4-H and FFA Rodeo has become quite popular in a number of towns as an annual means of raising funds for club work and such an event has been planned to be held in Haskell on Labor Day, Sept. 6. The county agent and the instructors of FFA Chapters of Haskell County will be urged to enter teams in competition. The proceeds derived from the rodeo will be deposited in a bank and will be allocated as they see fit either for local or county-wide project shows.

Present plans call for a downtown street parade at 11 a. m. and a matinee performance at the rodeo grounds at 2 p. m. with the finals to be held at 8 p. m. All schools will be invited to participate by having their bands, pep squads, etc., in the parade and contestants in the rodeo.

**4-H and FFA Project Show**  
Several county instructors have indicated the desire that an annual show be held the latter part of September or preceding the State Fair in Dallas, in October. If this proves to be the general opinion of county instructors, such an event can well be staged in the Fair Grounds which at this time are in better condition than in the history of the Central West Texas Fair Association. Under the sponsorship of the riding club, the Exhibit Hall has been remodeled and new stalls built in the livestock barns. These facilities make the grounds ideal for 4-H

and FFA Livestock Shows and with our cooperation this event can easily be made an annual one which will create much interest in club workers and give added incentive to their work.

**Oil Progress Week**  
The National Observance of the oil industry is always held in October and with added population and income to Haskell which this particular industry has created in recent years, we should leave nothing undone to show our appreciation for oil which has rapidly gained a prominent place with our long time major industries of agriculture and livestock. The first annual observance was held in Haskell in 1953 and seemingly our efforts were feeble yet we were recipients of a plaque presented by the American Petroleum Institute in recognition of these efforts. Haskell was one of three towns in the State of Texas thus honored by the Institute in 1953.

Plans are now being formulated which will make the 1954 Oil Progress Week celebration better than 1953 and one which will pay tribute to the industry which has brought many new citizens and much additional business to the town of Haskell.

**Cotton Festival**  
Despite the cotton acreage allotments which has reduced by several thousand acres the amount planted in the county this year, additional rains could easily produce another major cotton crop which last year reached some 70,000 bales for Haskell County. The first annual "Cotton Festival" was held in October last year and much planning should be done to pay tribute to this major industry again this year by staging a much more elaborate "Cotton Festival."

**Homecoming**  
For the first time in the history of the Haskell Public schools a

Homecoming of ex-students and faculty members has been set for Nov. 12. While this project is directly under the supervision of the Superintendent of Schools and the Board of Trustees, every citizen should look forward to the event and be willing to help in any way called on to make it one of the most successful affairs to be staged this year in Haskell.


Many of the ex-students and faculty members will be returning for perhaps the first time since receiving their diploma or having secured similar employment as teachers in other towns and states. We know Haskell has improved greatly in recent years but these improvements are not so noticeable to those who live here as they will be to the returning citizens of another day.

It is also true that we need new industry to supplement the present payrolls and these many new civic improvements we have added will do much to make the town of Haskell ripe for industry seeking new locations. Statistics prove that business men interested in their town are the logical envoys to contact these new business industries. These homecoming students and faculty members should represent several hundred persons and quite a number of cities and states of the United States. It will be well to impress on them that we are interested in the location of new industry in Haskell and they can be of major importance as "contact men" in their own localities for any industry which might be seeking a new location.

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

Some of the schools, through choice, have made profitable use of the elementary supervisor. For the coming school year an itinerant teacher with special qualifications has been secured on a cooperative agreement, at no extra cost, to direct the study of public school music in the schools eligible and choosing to use her.

Thirty-four school buses transport, safely, approximately 1500 rural children to go to and from school. Ten school cafeterias provide nutritious lunches to a majority of the students. We have used initiative in the budgeting of local tax money so that extra teachers are hired above those provided by the State Minimum Foundation Program. The budget includes also increased purchase each year of library reference material, books and magazines, teaching supplies and equipment, and allows generous amounts for school building improvements and upkeep. The schools were never in better financial condition, and a greater spirit of cooperation never existed among school personnel in the county.

There are plans to make continuous improvement. Three school surveys were made in Texas the past school year covering every phase of school administration and instruction. As a result of the findings of these surveys, and the Supreme Court ruling on racial segregation, sweeping

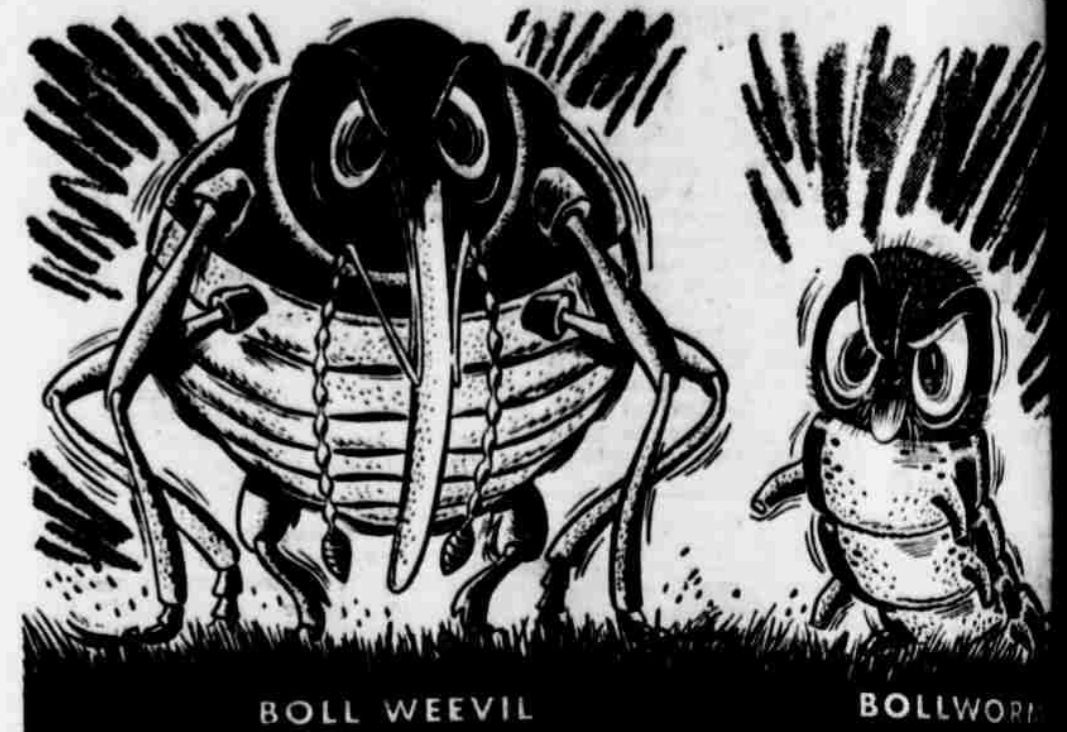

## Schools of County Receive \$477,389 During 1954

Austin, Texas, July 15—Haskell County school children are among those over the state sharing most impressive period of Texas Public Education in state history, a compilation of figures from 1949-1953 released in Austin this week shows:

The county received -477,389.05 for public education during the last fiscal year as its share of the giant 211 million total spent over the state, the Texas Education Agency report said. It also showed that money for the state's school children had increased from 145 million in 1949 to the present figure.

Interviewed this week, Gov. Allan Shivers noted that education funds were distributed through the Gilmer-Aiken formula to a wide variety of uses.

Largest amounts went for salary and operations. Fifteen thousand more teachers with average salary increases of \$1,000 in the last few years took a large percentage.

Shivers also explained that last year school administrations received more money to spend for needed improvements than ever before.

Figures also showed lesser known—but important—uses for funds. These included school buses that pick up children in rural areas and transport them safely to school.

## Abilene District Has Seven Traffic Deaths In June

Captain G. L. Morahan, Commanding Officer of the Abilene Highway Patrol District released the following activity report for June 1954 today:

Captain Morahan said, "Seven people were killed in the 13-county district last month as compared to 11 that were killed during the June of 1953."

The patrolmen investigated 91 rural traffic accidents, 26 of which 45 people were injured. The property damage from the 91 accidents was estimated at \$63,670.

A summary of rural motor vehicle accidents the first 6 months of 1954 revealed that 24 people have died in accidents where only one car was involved. A total of 38 dead has been recorded since January 1, 1954, as compared to 33 who died the first six months of 1953. Drinking drivers were involved in 9 of the fatal accidents, with speed and fatigue a major factor in a large portion of the accidents.

Captain Morahan said, "Patrolmen, in rural Traffic Supervision, made 1262 traffic violation contacts during the month, 1208 were for moving hazardous violations, and 54 were for non-hazardous and non-traffic. Of these 939 were issued warnings and 323 summoned to court. One hundred and fifty-three were charged with excessive speed, 24 for improper passing, 17 for DWI and 14 for stop sign violations. Fines were paid to the counties as a result of Patrol arrests as follows: Callahan \$1,537.60, Eastland \$510.45, Fisher \$88.25, Haskell \$460.10, Jones \$883.80, Mitchell \$615.00, Nolan \$124.00, Scurry \$1,029.00, Shackelford \$213.00, Stephens \$300.00, Stonewall \$144.00, and Taylor \$1,809.00.

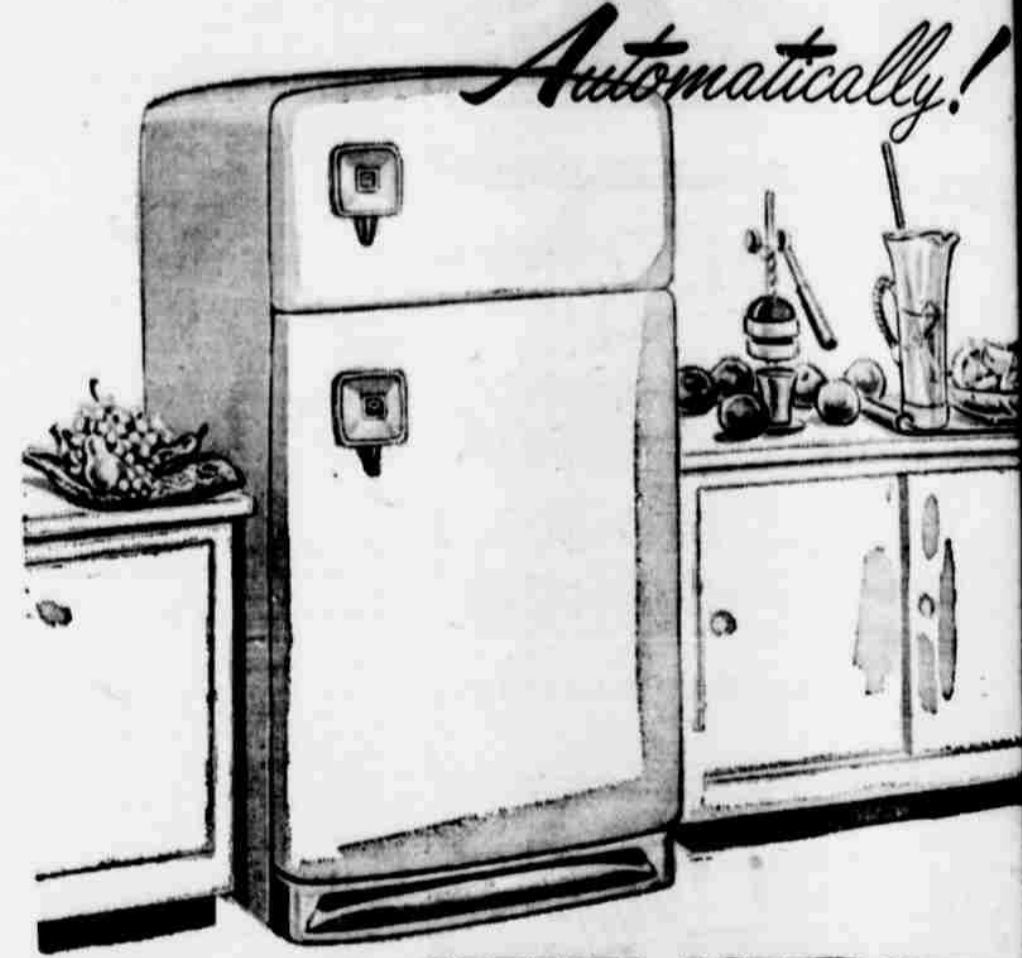

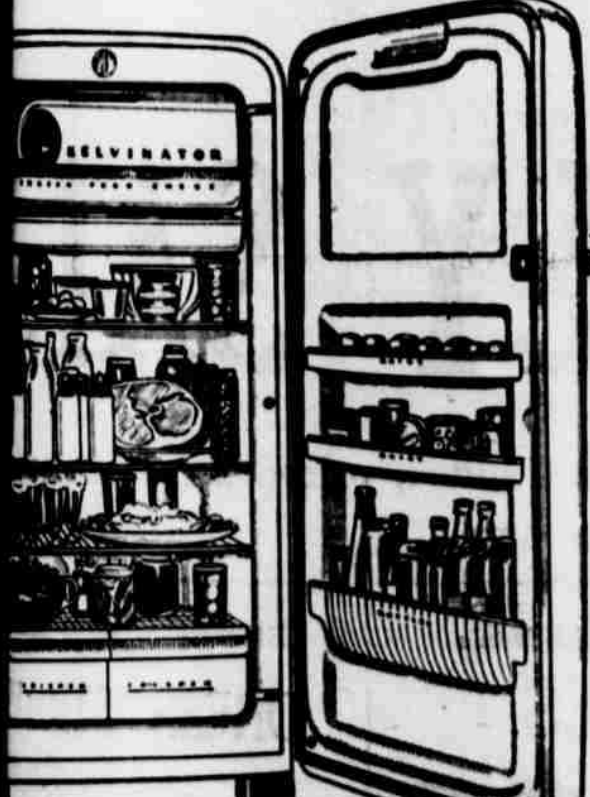

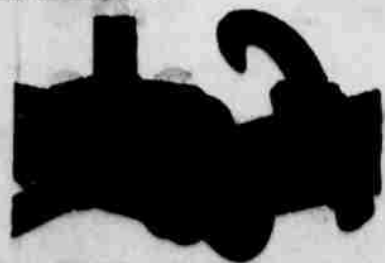
