HHS Band Wins 2 Trophies at Annual Meet In Memphis

The Haskell High School Band won trophies in two events at the annual Memphis Music Festival held in Memphis, Texas, Saturday, March 20. Twenty-four bands from Texas and Oklahoma took part in the events, which consisted of competition in concert playing, sight reading, and marching. The schools were grouped into three classifications, based on school enrollment, and the Haskell Band competed with 18 other bands for honors. Trophies were given for first, second and third places in each of the three events. The Haskell Band received a large trophy for first place in sight reading and a smaller trophy for second place in concert playing. Out of the sixteen entrants in Haskell's classification, no band won a first in both concert playing and sight reading, and the Haskell Band was the only one to receive both a first and second for these two events.

The HHS Band did not take part in the marching event, because, according to Director Merlin Jenkins, "The second semester of school should be used to stress the importance of musicianship in relation to concert playing and sight reading." Director Jenkins explained that he believes that "Two hours or more per day rehearsing on the football field, such as the band did all of last semester, is enough of that phase of public school music. A good band should be efficient in all phases of music, and with the time required to spend on marching during the first semester, football games, parades, rodeos, etc., the other type of music should be stressed during the second semester."

Aspermont Voters Approve Contract On Water Supply

Aspermont voters Friday approved by 105-to-4 margin a contract between the city of Aspermont and the Stonewall County Water Control Improvement District No. 1.

The contract calls for the city to pay \$1,400 monthly for water the district will furnish. The contract has already been signed by the city but had to be approved by voters.

N. E. Springer, president of the water district board of supervisors, stated that approval of the contract in Friday's election was the last barrier before work can be started on drilling and testing two wells in the vicinity of Rule from which an eight-inch pipeline will be laid to Aspermont. Western Drilling Company of Garden City, Kans., was given the

contract to drill and test the two wells on a bid of \$8,315. Springer said upon approval of the contract by voters, an order would be sent to the drilling company to start work immediately.

Under the contract, Western Drilling Company has 90 days to complete the work. Freese & Nichols of Fort Worth are engineers on the water project.

Some months ago voters approved a \$390,000 bond issue of the district for drilling and testing of the wells and bringing the water to Aspermont. The Reconstruction Finance Corporation agreed to buy 80 per cent of these bonds. The other 20 per cent have been pledged locally.

The water district includes the area within the City of Aspermont.

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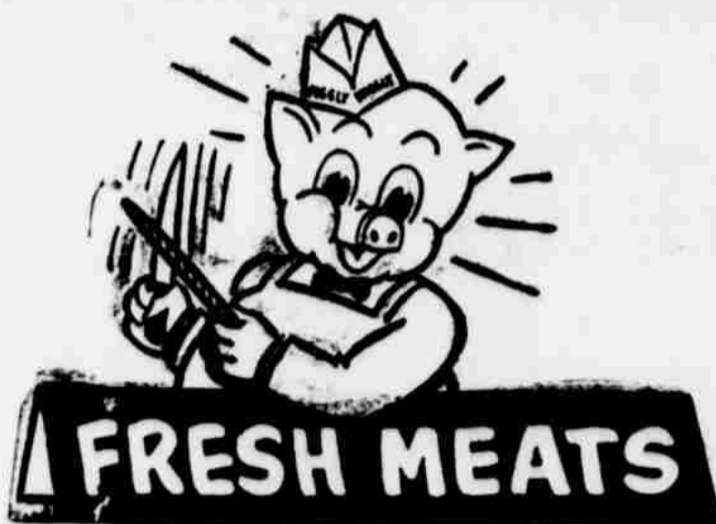

Heavy Sheep Run, Uneven Cattle Trade Reported on Ft. Worth Market Monday

By TED GOULDY
Fort Worth—The largest run of sheep to arrive this season was on hand Monday, and the run was the biggest since June 1953. Orders for sheep and lambs from all parts of the country were reported during the day and trade was active after a rather slow start. Prices were favorable despite an offering of nearly twice as many sheep around the major marketing circles as last Monday. Milk fat lambs were strong to 50c higher, and the top of \$29 was \$1 above the best so far this season. Shorn old crop slaughter lambs were about steady with the close of last week in a very uneven trade. Yearlings were strong to \$1 higher and topped at \$19, a new high for the class for the season. Older sheep were fully steady.

Cattle trade was again highly uneven, with trade slow and prices steady to weaker on most kinds. It was another session in which the buyers were apparently under no pressure for supplies and there were some soft spots in the prices of virtually all kinds.

Butcher hogs were 50 to 75c higher and topped at \$26.50 to \$26.75, while sows were steady to 50c lower at \$23 downward.

Good and choice milk fat lambs cashed at \$23 to \$26 and cull to medium offerings cashed at \$16 to \$22. Shorn old crop fat lambs bulked at \$19 to \$21.50 when good and choice, while one lot of lambs with No. 1 pelts topped at \$22. Cull and medium kinds sold from \$12 to \$18.50. Yearlings and 2-year-old wethers sold from \$14 to \$19, and old wethers sold from \$11 to \$14. Slaughter ewes sold from \$6.50 to \$9.50, a few higher. Old bucks sold from \$4 to \$6.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$18 to \$22, and individual club calves topped at \$24 to \$25. Common and medium slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$13 to \$17, with some cutter grades down to \$10.

Fat cows cleared at \$10.50 to \$12.50, a half load of outstanding high yielding cows at \$13.50. Canners and cutters cashed at \$7 to \$10.50. Bulls sold from \$10 to \$14.50, odd head to \$15.

Good and choice slaughter calves cleared at \$16 to \$19, with a few fancy fat calves to \$20. Common and medium offerings sold from \$13 to \$16, and culls sold from \$10 to \$13.

Good and choice stocker steer calves and stocker steer yearlings cashed at \$16 to \$19, and heifer calves and heifer yearlings sold around \$2 to \$3 under comparable steers. Stocker cows cashed at \$10 to \$13.

Good and choice butcher hogs weighing 190 to 260 pounds sold from \$26.50 to \$26.75, while lighter and heavier kinds sold from \$24 to \$26.25. Sows cashed at \$21 to \$23.50.

To the Citizens of Haskell:

The City Council of the City of Haskell, Texas, in session this the 22nd day of March, 1954, have read and studied a letter, from a Reader of the Free Press and published Thursday, March 18, 1954.

This City Council appreciates the interest shown by this reader in the affairs of the City and the eight questions propounded in this article are certainly good questions, and should be of interest to all good citizens.

This article states that it should be the responsibility of the City Council to present to the people in detail, a complete statement of the assets and liabilities, together with the receipts and disbursements of all City Funds.

In this connection we invite your attention to the Haskell Free Press under the date of June 11, 1953, in the center of page one

and continued on page ten, you will find all the Tax information and a detailed account of all receipts and disbursements and the Cash Balances of all the different Funds of the City. All this information was published from the Annual Audit prepared by a Licensed Public Accountant. This Audit covered all entries in the City Records from April 1, 1952 to April 1, 1953, which is the end of the fiscal year.

This City Council has considered the matter of publishing the Annual Audit each year, but owing to its bulk, it would be quite expensive. The Free Press published the information referred to as a Public Service without cost to the City and it is accurate, complete and informative.

We have always extended a Cordial Welcome to anyone interested, to attend our Council Meetings, and we invite letters such as was published in the Free Press last week. The eight questions asked are answered below:

How much is the total indebtedness of the City including bonds and warrants?

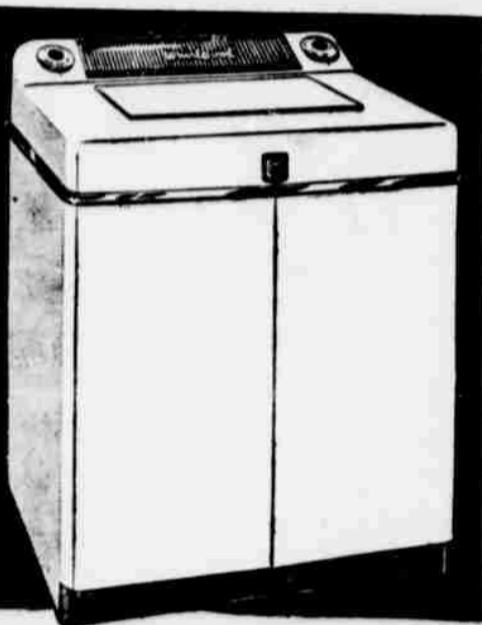
