Friday night's meeting, a booster program for the current membership campaign, was highlighted by the queen contest with the principal speaker at the banquet being Lois D. Barbour, District 3 Director of the Texas Farm Bureau.

With the primary objective of the organization being representation, Barbour discussed current farm legislation with the large group of members and guests from surrounding farm groups.

In addition, Gene Leach, Field Organization Representative of Lubbock, congratulated the Haskell County Farm Bureau on their success in the present membership drive. A quota of 700 members was set by the organization of which 80% has been obtained. With only 62% of Haskell County farmers holding membership, the drive was extended for two weeks in order to possibly exceed the established quota.

School Ranks As Big Business, Allen Tells Group

"The Teacher as a Connecting Link Between School and the Community" was the topic of an address given by C. D. Allen, superintendent of Haskell public schools, to teachers and board members at a general faculty meeting Monday night.

Allen stressed that the school is probably the largest business in Haskell. He said that the books were closed August 30 ending the 1953-1954 fiscal year and showed that approximately a quarter of a million dollars had been disbursed throughout the Haskell community.

"Since the school is a big business, and the only representative between the public and the school is the school teacher, teachers should establish good relations between themselves and parents of the pupils," Allen stated.

High School Has Enrollment Gain; Elementary Down

Haskell public schools opened for classwork Wednesday with an enrollment in the high school and junior high that exceeds the average total attained last year, but shows a slight drop in the elementary school.

Superintendent C. D. Allen, who is in his second year as head of the Haskell schools, announced Wednesday that 249 students are enrolled in the high school while 242 have entered junior high. The high school enrollment shows an increase of 32 over the 1953 total of 217 and only 10 above last year's 232 students that attended junior high.

Students attending the elementary school totaled 440 compared to a high of 517 reached over the preceding school term. Superintendent Allen attributed the drop to the small number of Latin-Americans who began elementary training Wednesday. He stated that there would probably be a steady rise in the Latin-American enrollment that is expected to rise above last year's mark.

With the opening of the 1954-55 school year, eight new teachers began their initial terms with the local school system. They are: T. O. McClung, assistant coach and general math; Hubert Bell, science; Mrs. Hubert Bell, music; Sammy Spratt, junior high coach, health and physical education; Mildred Lane, junior high social studies; Mrs. Iva Palmer, 4th grade; Anna Beth Perkins, 2nd grade; and Mrs. Artia Burkett, supervisor of instruction.

Bids on Aspermont Water Line To Be Opened Sept. 22

Contractors bids for the laying of an eight-inch water pipeline from near Rule to Aspermont will be opened Sept. 22 at the office of Stonewall County Water Control and Improvement District, in Aspermont, according to N. E. Springer, president of the district.

The line will be approximately 16 miles.

The district created within the boundaries of the City of Aspermont, was set up for the purpose of furnishing the city with a permanent water supply. It has leased a piece of property just north of the City of Rule. Three or four wells have been dug and tested, which are to furnish water for Aspermont. The town has been using as its water supply Lake Sellers, situated approximately one and one-half miles southwest of Aspermont.

A sum of \$390,000.00 in bonds was voted by the resident property tax-paying voters of the district some two years or more ago. The Reconstruction Finance Corporation has agreed to buy 80 per cent of the revenue-bearing bonds, with the other 20 per cent to be purchased locally.

A board, consisting of Springer, S. G. DuBose, Jas. H. Robertson, Raymond Marr and Elwood Freeman, is in charge of the water district.

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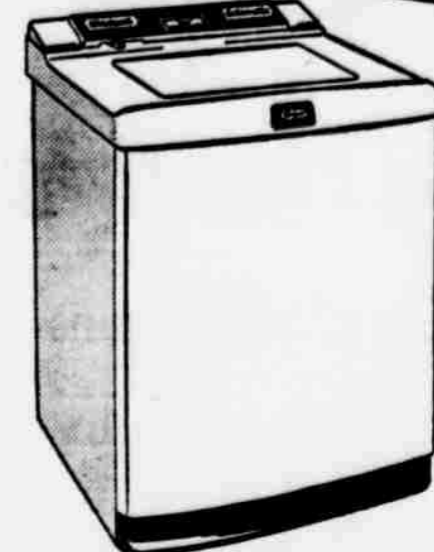

Cpl. Alton Peiser Named Fort Hood's "Soldier of the Week" Recently

FORT HOOD, Texas—A Haskell soldier of the Fourth Armored Division received the "VIP" treatment for a day when he was named "Soldier of the Week" recently in competition with the thousands of other contenders assigned to the division. He is Corporal Alton G. Peiser, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alton A. Peiser of Route 1, Haskell. A radio operator in Battery G of the 197th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, Cpl. Peiser was selected by a board of division officers as "Aide-for-a-Day" to the commanding general of the Fourth, Major General Thomas J. M. Trappell.

In selecting the Haskell youth, the officers queried him on basic military subjects pertaining to his job, key civilian and military leaders, current events, military courtesy, soldierly bearing, and ability to execute basic march-

ing orders in competition with others.

As "Aide" to the division commander, Cpl. Peiser toured the firing ranges and "Jeeped" through the division area with Gen. Trappell. He rode over the reservation in a Fourth Armored helicopter, and also took a ride in an M-48 tank and an L-19 observation plane.

In addition, he was presented a letter of commendation from General Trappell and was given a 3-day pass as a reward for the high standards he has established for himself.

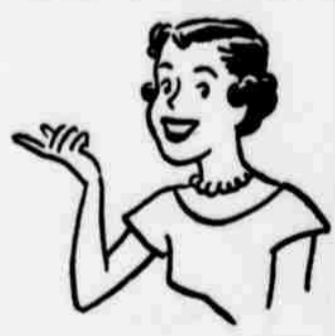

Army to Enlist Entire Platoon Of West Texans

Captain Don L.
