hension of the pupils. The consultant assists teachers by suggesting professional reading on certain, aspects of teaching which the teacher happens to need at the moment. While there is no established library of this type in Haskell County, Miss Studen has collected Stueber has collected many professional books, periodicals, and other materials which she lends to any teacher who desires to study.

Another way in which the con-sultant helps to improve teaching is through an in-service curriculum program, in which teachers study, plan together in groups, and perhaps set up a guide in a certain field. During the spring of 1952, the first and second grade teachers of the Haskell Elemen-tary School participated in such a study in the field of arithmetic. Sagerton School faculty has used the services of the consultant in studying the subject of reporting to parents and also in a short study of child development. These are small beginnings, and the schools of Haskell County need to do much more in the field of in-service education for teachers.
