563 Bales Cotton Ginned to Date From New Crop

Gathering of the 1954 cotton crop got under full headway in the Haskell vicinity this week.

At 4 p. m. yesterday, 563 bales from the new crop had been processed by the three local gins operating this season. They are the two Co-Op plants, and Duncan Gin Co. The Haskell Gin, formerly Sanders Gin, has not been placed in operation.

Drouth has cut deeply into the county's cotton yield this year, and estimates of the total crop range around the 30-35,000 figure.

One favorable factor, cotton men point out, is that the 1954 crop, although short, has been produced at the lowest expense in a number of years. Usual expense for hoeing and poisoning has been non-existent in connection with the crop, they explained.

Local Farm and Ranch Groups Ask That County Be Included In Drouth Program

The Haskell Drouth Committee, meeting here Friday, with G. C. Carothers, Jr., a member of the State Drouth Committee, voted to ask that Haskell County be reinstated in the drouth disaster area. This would make benefits of the emergency livestock feed program available to distressed farmers.

Carothers, who lives in Stamford and operates a farm in Haskell County, outlined the benefits available to farmers and ranchers under the program. According to Carothers, these benefits include:

1. \$1.00 per 100 pounds off on all grain bought through local dealers and used to feed foundation herds.
2. A maximum of \$10 per ton on transportation off on the purchase of hay.

The full committee, composed of representatives from farming and ranching organizations, approved the request that the program be made available to Haskell County farmers and ranchers.

Indians Exhibit New Offense Strength In Blanking 4AA Hamlin 14-0 Friday

An improved offense developed by the Haskell Indians since their opener with Stamford paid off for the Tribe Friday night when they took vengeance on another foe in the District 4AA and blanked the Hamlin Pied Pipers 14-0 on the Piper's home field.

Indian tailback Jimmy Love sparked the Redskins scoring punch when he broke loose for two jaunts of 26 and 80 yards to lead his teammates to a well-earned victory over the higher-bracketed Pipers.

Offense power of the Indians was revealed in the game statistics, which gave the Warriors 223 yards gained rushing, to 83 for their opponents, while the Indians marked up 10 first downs to 5 for the Pipers, and recovered two enemy fumbles.

Neither team was able to score during the first half, although Haskell's Indians drove to Hamlin's nine yard line just before the half ended.

With nine minutes gone in the

third quarter, Haskell tackle Wayne Conner blocked a punt on the Hamlin 26 yard line and the ball was recovered by Haskell guard Wayne Harris to give the Indians their first scoring chance.

Quarterback Glenn Kreger showed a handoff to Jimmy Love who scooted 28 yards around left for the first TD.

On the first play of the last quarter, another handoff from Kreger was taken by Love who cut around right end and raced 80 yards for the final tally of the game.

Both extra point kicks were good by Wendell Jones.

Kenneth Hewitt, Hamlin halfback, suffered a broken arm in the tilt when he attempted to tackle Kreger. He was sent to Abilene for treatment.

The Indians have an open date this week. Their next game takes them to Seymour Friday night, Oct. 1, for a non-conference contest.

Capt. Thomas E. Willson, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Adams of this city, was pilot of an Air Force C-46 transport plane which crashed in flames near Los Angeles, Calif., Monday.

Capt. Willson, two other crew members, and 15 Civil Air Patrol chaplains parachuted safely to earth just before the big craft crashed. News dispatches related that Capt. Willson was the last to leave the plane by parachute.

The Air Force reported the transport plane had taken off from Lockheed Air Terminal on a trip to McClelland Air Force Base near Sacramento. The huge plane, trailing smoke and with one engine afire, crashed minutes later, 17 miles from the air terminal.

Solomon says it came from the nest of a one-year old laying hen. He has a flock of 30 hens and they are consistent layers, producing 20 to 26 eggs daily.

Solomon describes the Hybrid Hyline as a relatively new poultry strain, and believes they are the best all-purpose chicken he has found.

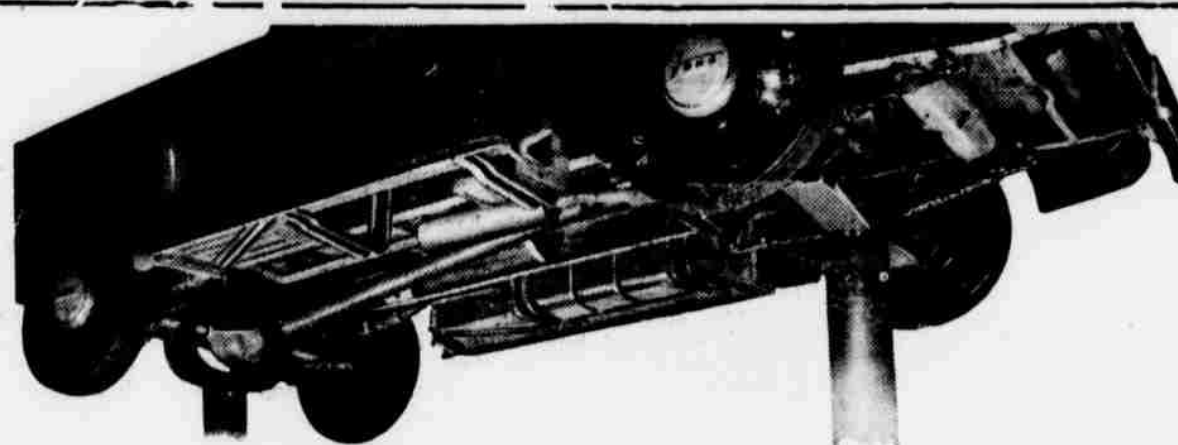

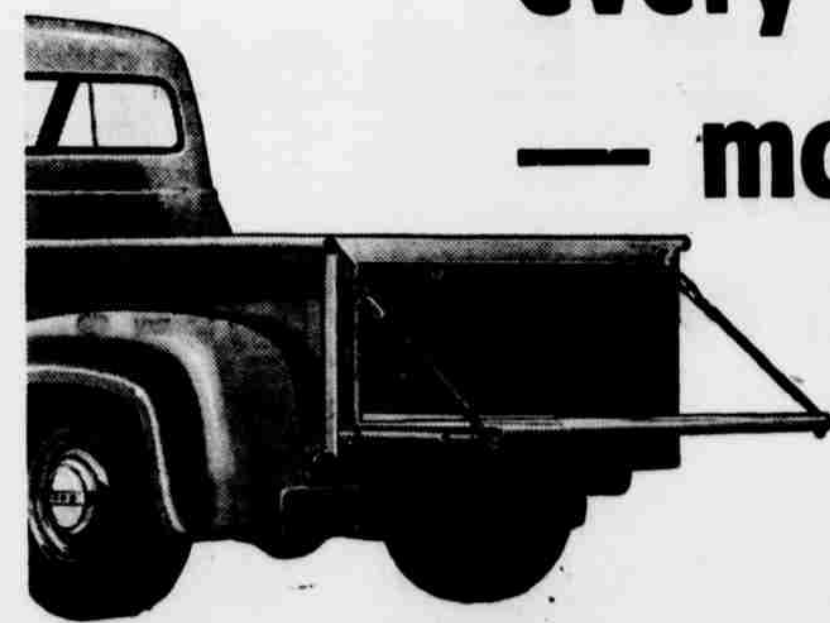
