HOME FOR CONFEDERATE WIDOWS.

BAIRD, TEXAS, Aug. 5, 1905. W. E. GILLILAND, BAIRD, TEXAS.

DEAR SIR:—There appeared in your issue of the 27th ult. what purported to be by authority and direction of Camp Albert Sidney Johnston, a comment on my card in your issue of June 29th and in which I commented on as an unjust and scurrilous attack on Governor Lanham in the shape of a resolution by this Camp for vetoing House Bill No. 387 providing for the construction and maintenance of a home for widows and wives of the Ex-Confederate Soldiers and Sailors, and in this comment W. C. Powell avers that the Camp "asked" him to reply. Now he it remembered, from information, there are between fifty and sixty members of this Camp in good standing, and in all seventy-five to one hundred, and be it further remembered, that on certain days the trumpet sounded and of this camp there assembled eight or ten with some not voting, and some voting against the adoption of two resolutions, in one of which, W. C. Powell "was asked" to reply. Now, W. C. Powell neglected to advocate the camp, engaged in "tittle-tattle, the cud chewed by human cattle," and opened his malignant visals long pent up, but saying he referred not to Governor Lanham and myself personally, but only as officials. His own words and expressions deny this as will be hereafter seen. Now it makes no difference whether these resolutions are the productions of the pessimist, the populist, the recalcitrant Democrats, Republicans or "what not." They are founded on prejudice and cunning, the authors paying no regard to merit, but to the mimic of reason, if they ever knew, forgot, that a true and fair investigation is the fondest friend of truth. It was the duty of that camp to have made a fair investigation as to the reasons for vetoing that bill, and then to have acted accordingly. There are Constitutional lawyers in the state, one of whom is our Attorney General, who would have willingly given their opinion as to the validity of this bill. "A man that studieth revenge, keepeth his own wounds green, which otherwise would heal and do well." The act on the part of this immortal eight or ten, less those not voting and voting against, ought not to be taken as reflecting the sentiments of the entire camp, nor even of all the signers of those resolutions, for there are many there who are fair and want no man condemned for doing his duty. There is only one question, and that is, is the bill unconstitutional? and if so, was it the duty of the Governor to have vetoed it, and this citizen W. C. Powell, says nothing. I might have alleged many reasons why the Governor should have vetoed the this bill. But why allege the river past fording as cause why the Def't was not present, when he died before court convened, and any attempt to show the river fordable would be as much in the bounds of reason as is citizen W. C. Powell, when he comments upon the reasons given by me other than the invalidity of the bill. Now, if his reasons are those entertained by the suspected authors of the resolutions, to-wit: "That the Governor should have signed it,

even if unconstitutional," then the old lady was right when she said, son make a living honestly if you can, and if not, make it anyway. Now, if that be a correct principle, "Great let me call him (citizen, W. C. Powell) for he has conquered me." In order to show how unjust, unfair and misleading to the uninformed, citizen, W. C. Powell, I answer that part of his effusion, wherein he refers to this bill as follows: "But this Confederate Governor could see it no public calamity, but vetoed it without any comment." This unfounded assertion shows that neither he (citizen, W. C. Powell) nor the noble eight or ten, less those not voting and those voting against, were guided by reason, and the contention that the bill was unconstitutional and the falsity of such assertions by citizen W. C. Powell are shown by the records of the Secretary of State in the reasons given by the Governor and attached to the original bill and are as follows: "I give notice and publically proclaim that I object to this bill, and it is hereby vetoed for the following reasons; it is in conflict with Sec. 51, Art. 3 of the Constitution. This is made manifest by reference to the original section 51, as incorporated in the Constitution of 1876 in connection with an amendment thereto, adopted in 1894, and the one adopted in 1898." Now which is deserving of credit, citizen W. C. Powell or the record. That is the reason, who can deny it? Furthermore, in order to make it so plain that "Wayfaring men, though fools, shall not err therein," and seemingly anticipating many like the immortal eight or ten, less those not voting and voting against, he sets out unquestioned reasons for the unconstitutionality of this bill and he writes as follows: "The original section mentioned reads as follows: "The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided that this shall not be so construed as to prevent the grant or aid in the case of public calamity. Afterwards, when it was proposed to grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors, it was found necessary to adopt the amendment of 1894; still later when desired to further provide for a pension for such soldiers and sailors and their widows in indigent circumstances; it became necessary to adopt the amendment of 1898." It will be observed that the amendment of 1894 authorized the Legislature to grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a Home for indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors and their widows in indigent circumstances; providing that the same shall not exceed \$8.00 per month; this clearly refers to pensioners who were afterwards provided for the Legislature by virtue of this amendment. This section 51, article 3 of the Constitution as now amended, expressly authorizes the granting of pensions to such soldiers and sailors and their widows, and also expressly authorizes the legislature to grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors—these provisions are exceptions to the general inhibition, that the legislature has no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals municipal or other corporation whatsoever. It will be seen that there is no expressed authority for the grant of aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for the wives and widows of the Confederate soldiers and sailors; but there is by clear implication a denial of such authority. This bill proposes to create, establish, maintain and make an appropriation for a Confederate Woman's Home, not only for the indigent widows, but for the wives of ex-Confederate soldiers and sailors of Texas." Old Confederate soldiers and sailors, had you seen or known of these reasons would you have voted for any such resolutions? You who are ever ready to acknowledge an error and fought for principle,

who sacrificed all save honor, would you condemn your Executive for doing that which his knowledge of the laws of his country, his conscience, his fidelity to his trust and oath of office required him to do? I have shaken hands with a few old members of this camp who discourage and now repudiate any such resolutions as those passed by these noble eight or ten, less those not voting and voting against. I propound the following questions which citizen W. C. Powell must answer or his silence condemns him. First:—Is this Bill unconstitutional? Second:—If unconstitutional is it right for the Governor to sign it? Third:—If unconstitutional give reasons, or "hold the peace." Now, "upon what meat doth this our Caesar feed, that he is grown so great?" When cunningly he substitutes "tittle-tattle, the cud chewed by human cattle" for logic, for instance, he (citizen W. C. Powell) asks, 1. "Does he, (F. S. Bell) not know that these taxes, great or little, are carried by corporations in their expense account, etc, and their tariffs are increased accordingly—you increase the tax on banks and they raise the interest to cover it. 2. The Dallas News advised the abolishment of the offices of Secretary of State and Revenue Agent. 3. How about the nepotism and anti-free pass bill, they were both in the platform. 4. Where was the deficiency when he (the Governor) approved the "District Judge grab?" All these expressions were given as reasons against my card of June 29th. Now I submit to any fair minded man, if these are "legal reasons or reason of facts answering my card or showing that Governor Lanham was wrong in vetoing this Bill. But do they not show a bellicose disposition and a spite and spleen on the part of the author? It is a waste of time to refer to such, but as his malignity towards Governor Lanham and myself, is only equalled by their absurdity, just bear with me a moment. There was constitutional authority for the Judge's Salary Bill. It was demanded by the Democracy in Convention, and passed by the legislature, which body, he praises for passing the bill under discussion. Does not citizen, W. C. Powell, know that passenger traffic is regulated by Statute and cannot be changed except by legislative enactment, or possibly by the Railroad Commission and that freight tariff is regulated by said Commission. Does not citizen, W. C. Powell, know that Governor Lanham in his message recommended the consideration of all platform demands, particularly Nepotism and anti-free pass matters, (see Journal 29th Leg.) In reference to what the Dallas News says about the abolishment of the offices of Secretary of State and Revenue Agent, it says; That its "Librarian can find no such issue." Now who is right? The only reason to be given for his (citizen, W. C. Powell) thinking so is that, in reference to the Revenue Agent, his "wish was parant to the thought." Does not citizen W. C. Powell, know that the office of Secretary of State is created by the Constitution, and the legislature has no authority to abolish it. His head may be gray but not from the summer of sixty years, but possibly from the knowledge of the constitution. Does not citizen, W. C. Powell know that the House Committee on Revenue and Taxation of the 29th Legislature unanimously reported a bill increasing the authority of the Revenue Agent, the importance of the office requiring such. In reference to the increased tax on banks, and their exacting a higher rate of interest to meet the same, he ought to know about this as he is an ex-official of a National Bank, but my recollection is that the law fixes the highest rate and no bank can legally go beyond it. It is a rare exception when such banks lend at less than ten per cent per annum. Now in conclusion a word to the fairminded members of this Camp; those of you who do good and eschew evil, those who never condemn without cause and who are ever ready to afford an opportunity for an explanation, do you approve such course as pursued by the eight or ten, except

those not voting and voting against? Will your body submit to their "false tale, delusive, vain and hollow," to malign our Governor who is "statesman, yet friend to truth, of soul sincere, in action faithful, and in honor clear." The Governor is my friend, I am surely his, I appreciate his kindness and friendship, and be it now known I shall defend his administration at all times and particularly against such unmanly, untimely, unfounded and calumnious attacks, and stand ready to make good my assertions, so "Lay on Macduff and damned be he, who first cries, hold, enough."
