

W. H. McCANDLESS W. H. McCandless Retiring Dec. 31 As NFLA Head

W. H. McCandless, veteran secretary-treasurer of the Haskell County National Farm Loan Association, has announced his resignation from the organization effective Dec. 31.

Mr. McCandless has served the association for 36 years, having been elected secretary and treas-urer January 8, 1918. From that date until the present time the association has closed over 1,400 loans in the gross amount of \$4,500,000. During the depression period it was necessary for the association to acquire a few farms, but through the capable supervision and ultimate resale of these

farms by Mr. McCandless, the association suffered no loss. During his long service with the oan association. Mr. McCandless has made an outstanding record, particularly from the standpoint of developing sound, safe loans. This is especially evident from the fact that the Haskell County National Farm Loan Association has gone through periods of war and depression with little or no







Recently, a group of scientists and engineers was asked to predict what's next.

Now that we have electrified farms, factories and homes, is that the end? The answer appears to be no, that the electrical industry is a "giant boy" with its great growth still ahead. Here are some of the predictions.

Take a personal thing first. Millions of homes will have heat pumps to heat and cool automatically-using electricity for fuel.

You can expect to cook food someday by electronics-in seconds. Electrical incinerators will consume your waste paper and waste food. Dust will be taken from the air electrically. The day may come when TV screens hang like pictures on the wall, with only a tiny wire to the set.

Nuclear fuels are on the timetable of the scientists. Energy from the atom will eventually be a major source of power, regardless of whether fossil fuels are seriously depleted. By century's end, most new plants generating electricity will operate with atomic (fission) fuel. Aircraft, battleships and the like will measure fuel consumption in grams.

Storing heat from the sun is another long-range project of scientists, with billions in savings as the potential result.

The year 2000 looks big and distant. Actually it is only 47, years away. By then, any puny prognostications made today will have been rewritten many times. But larger. Electricity has always been a field where each new fact generates many more things new. The years should be interesting to watch

Germans First Lighted Christmas Tree Here


German immigrants, homesick for the traditions of their native land, were the first to decorate Christmas trees in their homes in the United States, according to

Dr. Moore was an aloof profes-sor of Greek and Oriental literature in the Espiscopal Seminary in New York. He wrote the poem on Christmas Eve 1822 and read it to his seven children.

He had not planned for the poem to go further than his own family, but a relative who was visiting the Moores put a copy in her diary. The next year the relative's father sent it to a newspaper.

Other newspapers printed the jingles and they quickly became known all over the country. The dignified Dr. Moore was embar-rassed and considered it beneath to be the author of children's jingles. a man of his scholastic standing

Twenty-two years later, how-ever, he finally publicly admitted authorship of the jingles and it was published in book form under his name for the first time.

Most Beloved Carol Is "Silent Night"

The most beloved carol of the many that are sung in all parts of the world is "Silent Night" that simple and tender German song. Its origin was unknown for many years. Recent research, however, disclosed that it was writ-ten by Joseph Mohr, an assistant priest in Oberndorf in South Germany. The melody was composed by a schoolmaster, Franz Gruber.

The poet and the composer were part of the choir that sang the carol for the first time on Christmas Eve in the Oberndorf church in 1818.

The night it was sung the small church's organ was out of order and the choir sang to the accompaniment of a guitar.

Since then the carol has been sung to the tune of almost every musical instrument in the world and in the languages of nearly all men.

Bankers Solidly **Behind Future** Of Agriculture

The nation's commercial bank-ers have confidence in the future of agriculture and expect to continue furnishing a large share of credit needed for farm production, says J. Wheeler Barger, professor of agricultural economics, Texas A&M College.

Barger recently attended the National Agricultural Credit Conference in Chicago sponsored by the American Bankers Association. More than 400 bankers participated.

"Bankers are not unduly alarmed about the decline in price of cattle and other farm commo-dities," says Barger. Although current price reductions are painful to the producer, they are adjustments that stem from over expansion in the cattle industry and a decline in farm exports due largely to curtailment of foreign aid programs.

"Bankers believe severe immediate adjustments have passed and agriculture's net income in 1954 will be within five per cent of this year's farm income," the

professor says. They realize, however, he adds, that wartime and postwar profits in farming have needs and farmers and lending agencies must be more cautious hereafter. Applications will be examined more closely to determine whether the borrower is a competent manager, has an economic size unit and a sound production plan. If these requirements are met, Barger concludes, bankers may be ex-Barger pected to supply adequate credit.
