## Abilene Colored High School Band To Be Added Feature of Annual T-O Classic

The 75-piece Woodson High School Band of Abilene will accompany the Woodson Eagles to Haskell for the Texas-Oklahoma Colored Classic on Nov. 18, it was announced following the meeting of the Quarterback Club Tuesday night.

The Woodson Black Eagles and Frederick, Okla., Wildcats will renew their gridiron rivalry in the fifth annual T-O Classic, and the Eagle Band will be featured in half-time activities.

The 75-piece band will also take part in a parade Saturday afternoon preceding the game, along with pep squads from the two colored high schools and the two football squads.

Frederick and Abilene football teams are rated among the strongest colored grid squads in the Southern Oklahoma and West Texas area and both teams have made impressive starts in early season play this year.

Advance tickets for the Nov. 18 Classic will go on sale during the coming week, and advertising material will be distributed over the area within the next few days.

At the Tuesday night meeting, members of the Q-B Club saw films of the Haskell-Stamford and the Haskell-Hamlin games, along with brief comments by head football coach Jess Stiles.

An effort will be made to have a 100 per cent attendance at next week's meeting of the Club, as a prelude to the Indians' next game with Seymour here Friday night, Sept. 30.

## Burglary and DWI Indictments Voted By Grand Jury

Two Haskell men were named in indictments returned Friday by a 39th District Court Grand Jury when the investigating body made its final report to District Judge Ben Charlie Chapman.

Intent to murder was alleged in a burglary indictment in which E. R. Lowe, prominent Haskell farmer and stockman was named principal.

Named in the second indictment by the investigating body was Randall E. McNeill of Haskell, charged with second offense of driving an automobile while intoxicated.

The two indictments returned Friday concluded the Grand Jury's work for the term, the body having been recalled Friday to complete investigation of matters carried over from a previous session on August 18. A new Grand Jury will be empaneled at the beginning of the next district court term late this month.

The indictment against McNeill charges him with driving an automobile while intoxicated on July 27 this year. A prior conviction for DWI is alleged on Sept. 22, 1954, in the County Court of Jones County.

The indictment against Lowe alleges that on or about last June 17 the principal "by force, threats and fraud break and enter a house occupied and controlled by Nord Boone, and with intent then and there with malice aforethought to murder Duren Boone by shooting her with a shotgun."

Mrs. Duren Boone is the wife of Nord Boone, and is Lowe's daughter. The Boone's live on a farm two miles southeast of Haskell.

Lowe had been under bail bond since last June 23, pending grand jury action on the burglary complaint. He had also been under \$10,000 peace bond set at that time.

## Burglars Get \$88 Sunday Night at Service Cleaners

Approximately \$88 in currency and change was taken in a burglary of the Service Cleaners and Laundry sometime during the weekend.

The money was taken from the cash register of the establishment after entrance had been gained by forcing a lock on the front door of the building.

A locked compartment in the register was pried open, and \$50 in currency taken. Remainder of the money was change which had been left in the register.

The thieves went through the safe in the office, which was left unlocked, and scattered contents of the vault on the floor in their search for money. A desk in the office also was ransacked.

Apparently, the thieves were only after money. Hallie Chapman and Bill Lane, owners of the establishment, said that check did not reveal any clothing or other merchandise missing.

Sheriff Bill Pennington and city officers investigated the burglary.

## New Term of District Court Will Begin Here Monday

### No Women Listed On Grand, Petit Jury Panels

Jury commissioners who drew the list of prospective grand jurors and petit jurors for the district court term which begins Monday, were considerate of the women-folks.

No women were included in the 16 persons listed on the grand jury panel nor the 36 prospective petit jurors drawn for the first week.

A new term of 39th District Court will begin Monday, Sept. 26, with a new Grand Jury being sworn in at 10 a. m.

Only jury case set for the coming week is a \$35,000 damage suit which is set for hearing Tuesday, Sept. 27.

The court session will be the beginning of what is termed the September, or Fall term of district court under the old schedule when three terms were held annually. The upcoming session will continue through the remainder of the year, with a new term beginning in January. The new Grand Jury will be

**Damage Suit Set**

No cases are listed for hearing on the first day of the new term. Scheduled for trial Tuesday before District Judge Ben Charlie Chapman is a suit for \$35,000 damages, plus hospital and doctor bills, based on a traffic mishap in December, 1952.

Style of the case is J. M. Henslee vs. C. C. Westfall, et al. In his petition, the plaintiff Henslee seeks damage in the sum of \$35,000 for permanent disability, and approximately \$1,818.40 for hospital bills, for injuries received when a truck he was driving was in collision with a Mistletoe Transit truck owned by the defendant, C. C. Westfall.

At the time of the collision, Henslee was operating a truck hauling cottonseed for the Lorenzo Gin Company, his petition declares. The accident happened on or about Dec. 14, 1952 at 1:30 a. m. on Highway 277 about six miles north of Stamford, the petition states.

A panel of 36 petit jurors has been summoned for Tuesday morning, from which a jury to hear testimony in the case will be selected.

## Dedication of New Gym and Classrooms To Be Feature of Homecoming Program

Dedication program for Haskell's new High School gym and the new additions to the high school plant and elementary school will be an added feature of the second annual Haskell School Homecoming to be held here Oct. 7-8.

The Homecoming sessions will be held in the new gym, which has just been completed, and will be the first public use of the large modern structure, School Supt. C. D. Allen and president Hill Oates of the Homecoming association pointed out.

Final plans for this year's Homecoming were reviewed at a meeting of the executive committee of the association Tuesday. With the exception of only a few numbers, program for the event has been completed, the committee reported.

Based on pre-registration figures and replies received from ex-students and teachers from points throughout Texas and a number of adjoining states, attendance at the 1955 Homecoming will easily eclipse that of last year's initial Homecoming.

W. O. Holden, in charge of invitations, said that between 400 and 500 replies had been received, with dozens more coming in daily.

More than 150 ex-students in Haskell and vicinity have already registered for this year's Homecoming and chuck wagon supper, association president Hill Oates said Wednesday.

In addition to the Homecoming program, class reunions are being planned by local exes which will include students and former teachers in Haskell schools at the turn of the century, or earlier.

## Story of Oil is Told in Film Shown Lions

The story of oil, from the first stages of exploration to locate underground sources to its final refined state was interestingly portrayed in a film shown members of the Lions Club Tuesday at their regular meeting and luncheon in the club room of the Texas Cafe.

A guest at the meeting was Charles Richison of Cism, Ill., music leader in a revival in progress at the First Christian Church.

The film, "The Birth of an Oil Field" was furnished as a courtesy of Shell Oil Company and was shown by Brooks Middleton of the local Gulf oil dealership.

Beginning with seismograph sub-surface exploration, the film showed the two methods of drilling for oil, the cable tool rig and the rotary rig. Other operations portrayed included lifting oil by pressure or pump, plotting of the oil field, and finally the refining of the crude oil into various petroleum products.

Another point to be made is that the industry, through careful conservation and research, is saving much more oil and obtaining greater benefits for the consuming public than ever before.

Service Pipe Line Co. has been operating in West Central Texas for four years. The Company transports crude oil from some 27,000 oil wells to refineries in the Rocky Mountain and mid-west areas. In the first home game of the season the Haskell Indians took a one-sided 31-6 win over the Hamlin Pied Pipers Friday night. For the Pipers, of Dist. 4-AA, it was the second defeat of the season, the Jones Countians having lost the previous week to Winters.

The Indians used two quarterbacks alternately in gearing up for the victory in the non-conference contest before a crowd of more than 2,000 fans. Reserves on the Indian squad also saw plenty of action in the fray.

Following a quiet first quarter, the Tribe cut loose with three tallies in the second. After Fullback John Pitman recovered a Hamlin fumble, reserve Quarterback Rob Starr hit Right End Jim Byrd with a 31-yard aerial and the fleet wingman dragged two tacklers across the goal line to put the Indians in front 6-0.

Byrd's try for point was wide with five minutes remaining in the half.

On the ensuing kickoff, Haskell recovered a short boot, and Starr immediately tossed to Left Halfback Don Mullins, who twisted

ed and spun for 30 to the Piper nine. An offensive holding penalty pushed the ball back to the 24 but starting Quarterback Glenn Kreger swept left end for 10, and then returned with a sweep to the right for the second marker. (Continued on Page 12)

W. A. Bettis of Walnut Springs, who has considerable interests in this county, has come out to spend some time on his place in the northern part of the county.

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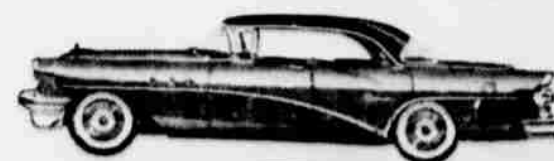
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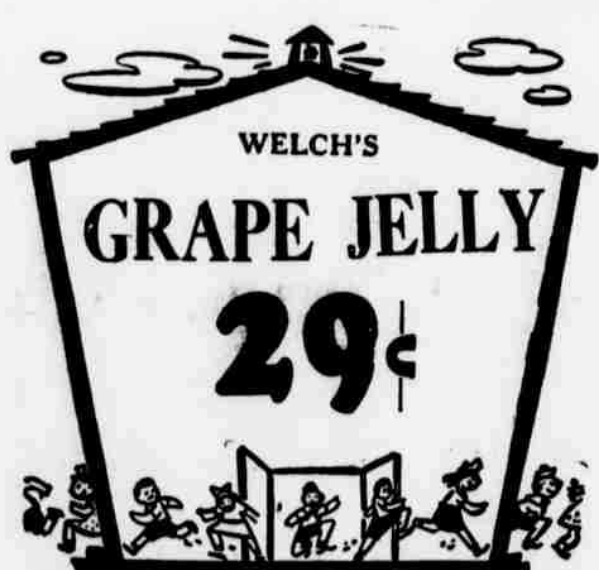

### 100 New Families Have Big Impact On Town Budget

What happens when a hundred new families arrive in a medium-sized city? To begin with, it means about 450 new people, including 100 children, 67 in grammar school, 33 in high school. This calls for 2.2 new rooms in grade school and 1.63 new rooms in high school, which will cost about \$120,000. Four new teachers will have to be hired. The 100 families will add about \$30,000 a year to the school operating budget.

Besides teachers, the city will need four fifths of a new employee in the police department and two-thirds of a new fireman, upping the police budget by \$4,510 and the fire department budget by \$2,820. Allsorts of extra jobs will have to be done from collecting taxes to collecting garbage. Add four new city employees at a total price of \$12,000 to \$15,000.

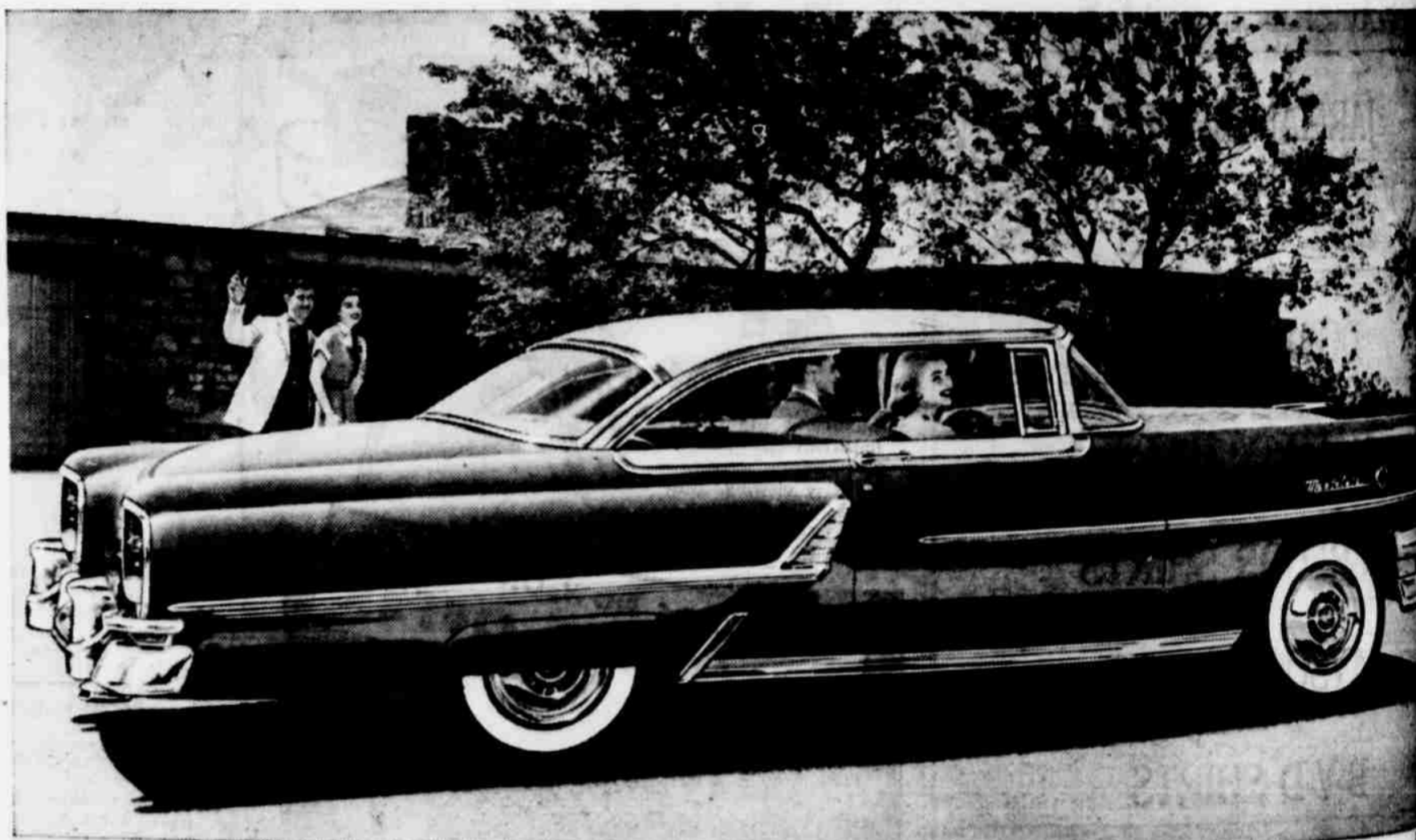
