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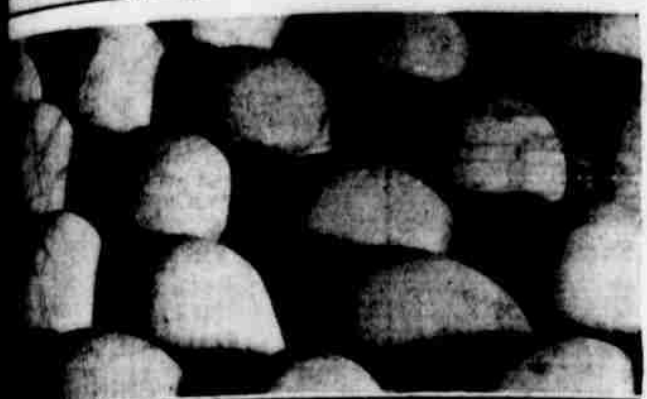

**HHS Seniors Visit Austin, Houston and San Jacinto Battleground on Annual Trip During Easter Holidays**

On Friday, April 16 at 4:00 a. m., 31 sleepy-eyed seniors accompanied by three sponsors, left Haskell by chartered bus for three and one-half days of fun and enjoyment. The first stop was at Buchanan Dam, one of the largest in Texas and the site of one of the largest electric power plants. Some of the students viewed the lake and dam through a telescope while others walked out on the dam. The next stop was Longhorn Caverns, the third largest cave in the world. The 2-mile trip through the caverns was both educational and enjoyable.

Continuing their trip, the seniors arrived in Austin about 2 p. m. and had lunch at the Chicken Shack. After lunch they visited the University of Texas campus. There they saw the \$3,000,000 Littlefield Memorial, Gregory Gymnasium, site of the annual state basketball playoffs, Texas

University stadium, and Texas Museum of Natural History. The group then went to Barton Springs where some of them went swimming. The park is very beautiful, and the pool is fed by natural springs. After their visit to the park, the class ate dinner at Hill's Steak House, where reservations had been made for steak dinner for each of the party. And what steaks! For entertainment that night, the group divided into two smaller groups. One group went to a movie and the other to the Tower, a night club where the University students dance. The next morning the group visited the capitol. A guide showed the class many interesting things there. Among them were the Criminal Courts of Appeal, where Judge Woody spoke to the group, the Senate Chamber, the House of Representatives, and the Treasury Department. The group saw and touched the Bible used in inauguration of Texas governors.

at Stuart's, one group went to an amusement park, and the other set out for the ice arena. Finding it closed, they returned to the amusement park. After an early breakfast the next morning, the entire class traveled to San Jacinto Park, where they enjoyed such things as the museum and an elevator ride to the top of the 459-foot memorial. Later the bus carried them through the Washburn Tunnel, which runs under the Houston ship channel. Then the class visited the Battleship Texas, where they enjoyed walking through the ship and seeing such things as pictures, trophies, and old relics in the officers' lounge.

Leaving the park about noon, they traveled to Hempstead for lunch. Afterward they journeyed to Waco where they saw a movie, had a late dinner, and finally settled down for the night. Some of the group went shopping down

town the next morning while others chose to sleep late. About 11 o'clock the class assembled and started home. They ate lunch in Eastland and arrived in Haskell about 5 o'clock.

Everyone had a wonderful time and enjoyed the sights of the trip, but perhaps the best of all was when they arrived back in Haskell after what they called a magnificent trip.

**Haskell Co-Op Gin Pays \$61,168.05 Dividends from 1953 Operations**

All officers and directors were re-elected at the annual stockholders meeting of the Haskell Co-Operative Gin, and patronage dividends amounting to \$61,168.05 were paid to 268 stockholders representing profits from last season's operations. It was announced following the meeting.

The plant had one of the biggest seasons runs from the 1953 crop since the gin was built more than 20 years ago. Manager Weldon Turnbow reported. The plant ginned 6,280 bales from the 1953 crop, the manager said. Turnbow, also re-elected as manager, has held that position since 1944.

Officers and directors re-elected are: H. H. Sego, president; Ed Hester, vice president; R. C. Couch, Jr., secretary; John Thomas, John P. Perrin, M. S. Walker, A. R. Hannsz, Robert Drinnon, Felix Klose, directors.

Total dividends of \$61,168.05 represented approximately \$10 per bale. Dividends were computed on the basis of 25 cents per 100 pounds of seed cotton ginned, and 50 cents per 100 pounds of cottonseed sold to the gin. Turnbow explained.

In addition to the dividends, the amount of \$10,000 was retained in the treasury to be spent for new machinery and repairs in readying the plant for the coming ginning season. Turnbow said. Gin records show that during the 1953-54 season the plant processed 14,063,758 pounds of seed cotton and purchased 5,201,730 pounds of cottonseed.

Largest individual dividend check went to a Haskell farmer who ginned 270 bales from his 1953 crop. A number of stockholders ginned 100 bales or more during the season, Turnbow reported.
