be held Saturday, May 15.

The proposed bond issue will be used to expand school facilities to meet the steadily increasing enrollment in elementary grades, and to provide badly needed enlargement in the junior high and high school departments.

Action of the trustees in calling the election followed a meeting held Friday night in the elementary school building. Attending the meeting were approximately 80 businessmen, farmers, and property owners of the district. The \$350,000 bond issue would

be used to build an eight-class-room addition to the present ele-mentary school building, a gymnasium for the high school, and a three class rooms - administrative office building connecting the high school and junior high school buildings.

Also, a part of the bond money would be earmarked for use in providing adequate school facili-ties for colored students in Central Ward School and expansion of the school plant as needed.

The bonds would mature over 35-year period and would be redeemable at the option of the poard after 15 years.

Present enrollment in the elementary grades (one through five) is 534. Superintendent of Schools C. D. Allen reported that two additional classrooms will be needed at the beginning of the 54 term, and at least one additional room will be needed each year for the following four years. He estimated enrollment would reach 728 in the elementary grades by
