The answer lies in complete publication of the minutes of county commissioners' court meet- In Henrietta ings. This is not unreasonablelocal officials have just been granted four-year terms by Texas voters, and in return the public is entitled to a more thorough knowledge of the actions of our grass-roots government, There is now in the legislative

hopper at Austin a bill (HB 12) which will provide for the publication of such proceedings. It deserves the support of every free-thinking citizen.


