have different limitations for different uses. Some soils will absorb water quickly while others hold water tightly. A septic tank may cause many problems if it is built in a soil that releases water slowly.

In the yaers past, developers may not have paid much attention to the soils they built on. Ethetton feels the trend is reversing as developers, engineers and contractors are constantly seeking information about the suitability of certain soils. Soil surveys conducted by the Soil Conservation Service point out limitations of different soils. The survey will show the location and suitability of certain soils for building foundations, locating septic tanks, determining the effect a soil will have on the corrosion of pipes, and will even alert builders to areas that are frequently flooded. posed by the Texas Animal Health Commission so that Texas will be able to move toward a "Certified brucellosis free status," and thereby be able to comply with the standards of other states to which cattle are shipped.

The major changes in the brucellosis testing program are: 1. Testing of all animals two years of age and over at local auction markets rather than just testinf those that termin-




