Joe S. Harper, Former PMA Secretary, Named To Farm Loan Association Post

Joe S. Harper, Haskell County PMA secretary since 1941, with the exception of time spent in the Army Air Force during World War II, has been elected secretary-treasurer of the Haskell County National Farm Loan Association, it was announced today.

Harper succeeds W. H. McCandless, who is retiring to private life after serving as executive head of the farm loan organization for 36 years. Mrs. Ruby Smith, assistant secretary-treasurer of the loan association, will remain in that capacity.

Harper has been identified with the Production and Marketing Administration (now the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service) since 1934, when he joined the government agency after completing two years work in Oklahoma A&M College. He was assigned to Hardeman, Foard and Knox Counties before being transferred to Haskell County as PMA secretary in 1941.

During his administration of the affairs of the government farm agency, outstanding achievement has been accomplished in furthering a stabilized agricultural program in the county. In leaving the government agency, Harper said, "I appreciate the fine cooperation of the farmers and people of Haskell County in the PMA program, and look forward to being of service to our farmers in my new position."

Harper is a member of the Board of Stewards of the First Methodist Church. He and his wife have one son, Steven.

Successor to Harper in the Haskell office will be Wm. L. Feemster, executive head of the Stoneham County PMA office for the past two years, and who has been with the government farm agency for the past five years.

Mr. and Mrs. Feemster and their two children plan to move to Haskell next week and he will assume his duties here Jan. 11.

New Term District Court Begins Jan. 4

A new term of 39th District Court for Haskell County will begin Monday, Jan. 4, when a Grand Jury for the term will be sworn in by District Judge Ben Charles Chapman at 10 a. m.

Docket for the new term is fairly heavy, consisting principally of civil cases carried over from the Fall term. Very few jury cases were heard during the fall months due to the fact that farmers and other prospective jurors were busy with crop harvesting.

In addition to the cases carried over from previous terms, several new civil cases and divorce actions filed in recent weeks are listed on the docket.

Very few criminal cases are pending on the docket for the coming term, although several are likely to be developed through Grand Jury investigation, court officials indicated.

Complaints listed on the Grand Jury calendar for investigation include five for burglary, three for forgery, and several swindling and theft charges, District Attorney Royce Adkins said.

No petit jurors have been summoned for the first week of the term, with jury cases likely to be scheduled the following week.

Aunt of Haskell Man Dies Dec. 23 In Coryell County

Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Curd and sons Charles and James, and daughter Leola B., were called to Turnersville, Coryell County, Wednesday night following the death of Mr. Curd's aunt, Mrs. Jane Clark, 96, member of a pioneer Coryell County family and widow of an early-day Baptist minister.

Mrs. Clark died at her home in the Panake community, near Turnersville, Wednesday afternoon.

"Aunt Jane" the name given her by her friends many years ago, was born in Morgan County, Tenn., June 11, 1857. Her father, the late William Curd, brought his family to Texas in 1866, and to Coryell County in 1869. Deceased was married to the Rev. H. L. Clark, a Baptist minister, in 1894, and he preceded her in death in 1912. During his lifetime their home was a haven for Baptist preachers.

Mrs. Clark was a member of the Panake Baptist Church and was active in church and Sunday School until failing health prohibited.

Rule Man Is Fatally Burned In Oil Field Fire Near Old Glory Saturday Afternoon

Crede Jackson Caddell, 46, of Rule was burned to death about 4 p. m. Saturday when an explosion and flash fire occurred on the Lloyd H. Smith Oil Company lease at the A. A. Pumphrey No. 1 about three miles north of Old Glory in Stonewall County.

Parties at an adjoining lease about 400 yards away related that there was a terrific explosion followed by flames which shot upward 15 to 20 feet.

Caddell was alone operating a steamer truck at the two 500-barrel crude oil storage tanks when the accident happened. (A steamer truck is used to raise the temperature of oil by circulating oil through a heating unit on a truck.)

Bill Guinn, farmer and rancher who lives nearby, was quoted as saying he had just left the lease before the explosion occurred.

Caddell's body was discovered by J. R. Watson of Graham, production superintendent of the Smith Oil Company. Watson said that he was on his way to the location and was about 300 yards away when the explosion took place. Watson called an ambulance from Rule and also summoned the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department.

Justice of the Peace J. L. Chenuit of Aspermont returned an inquest verdict of death from accidental burns.

Indications are that Caddell ran about 30 feet with his clothes on fire, fell and burned to death. The steamer truck was totally burned when firemen from Haskell arrived.

The ground was blackened from flames for about 15 feet to 20 feet around the truck. Both of the tanks caught fire but the fire was put out in a short time with chemical foam.

The intense heat buckled one of the tanks, bursting the reams. Officers who investigated were Stonewall County Sheriff Warren Frazier and Deputy Frank Poore.

Body of the accident victim was taken to the Gauntt Funeral Home in Rule. Mr. Caddell had lived in Rule for about 15 years and had formerly operated a service station there. He was an Army veteran of World War II, and served overseas in the European theater.

He is survived by his wife and three sons, John Ted, 3, Sammy, 6, and David, 4 years old, all of Rule; four brothers, Clifton and Lealand Caddell of Ralls, Preston and Perry Caddell of Levelland; two sisters, Mrs. Wanda Gilbert and Mrs. Roy Miller of Levelland.

1954 March of Dimes to Raise a Minimum \$7,000 Quota in Haskell County

The 1954 March of Dimes to raise a minimum \$7,000 quota in Haskell County will be launched Monday, Jan. 4 and plans have been made locally to raise Haskell's share of the county quota in an intensive two-day campaign Monday and Tuesday.

Frank Campbell of Rule has been named March of Dimes chairman for the county and he has organized community drives in each town in the county to be launched simultaneously next week.

In pointing up the importance of enlisting wholehearted support of the 1954 March of Dimes, Mayor Courtney Hunt, chairman of the county chapter, announced today that the chapter's total income for 1953 was \$5,404.15. The chapter has paid in full all expenses for care and treatment of 11 polio cases during the year. Current bills for continuing treatment total more than the cash on hand in the chapter treasury, Hunt explained.

"The 1954 quota of \$7,000 represents about 30 cents from each resident in the county," the chapter chairman pointed out.

W. O. Holden will serve as March of Dimes community chairman in Haskell, and he has announced the appointment of District Attorney Royce Adkins as head of the drive in the business district.

The Junior High School and Elementary School P-TA organizations are cooperating in the "Mother's Drive" to be conducted Tuesday evening.

The campaign in the business district will be conducted Monday, Chairman Adkins announced. He named block chairmen who will canvass eight blocks in the business section in an intensive campaign to complete the drive in one day.

Tommy Davis, Alton Middleton and Brooks Middleton will canvass the block on the north side of the square, Adkins announced. Other chairmen in their respective blocks in the business section are R. A. 39th Court Ruling In Kent Election Dispute Upheld

A 39th District Court ruling in the Kent County courthouse election contest has been upheld by the 11th Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland.

As a result of the higher court's ruling, Jayton will become the county seat of Kent County on the basis of an election held in that county in March, 1952, on the question of moving the county seat from Clairmont to Jayton.

The 1952 election favored retaining the courthouse at Clairmont. Jayton parties contested the election, alleging invalid votes, and the case was heard by a Haskell County jury in 39th district court here in March of this year. The jury found more than the required two-thirds of the legal votes cast in the election favored Jayton as the county seat.

Street and block leaders will be named in each precinct, who will endeavor to contact every resident of the city during the one-hour drive.

Mr. Ellis was born in Eastland County April 2, 1878. He came to Haskell when a young man, and on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 28, 1901, he married Miss Bertha Fitzgerald in Haskell. They lived here for five years, during which time Mr. Ellis was employed in a dry goods store. Then they moved to Rule, and Mr. Ellis became cashier of the First National Bank there, a position he held until 1913.

In the fall of 1913 Mr. Ellis purchased a grocery business in Fort Stockton, where he was active in operation of the business until 1946. During his long residence there, he was active in civic affairs and business circles, and expanded his holdings to include considerable business property and real estate. He was a stockholder and director in the former First National Bank in Fort Stockton, and served as its president for a time in the 20's.

He was an active member and officer of the Presbyterian Church for much of his life, being one of the organizers of the Rule Presbyterian Church 45 years ago and was an elder in the First Presbyterian Church of Fort Stockton for 40 years, and had been one of its trustees since 1926. Mr. Ellis was generous in support of his church and its agencies. He took particular interest in the work of the Texas Presbyterian Home and School in Itasca, and was a trustee of the institution for a number of years. He was also a Mason and a Shriner.

Funeral services for Mr. Ellis were conducted Monday afternoon, Dec. 21 at the First Presbyterian Church in Fort Stockton, with the pastor, Dr. Thomas Brewster officiating, assisted by Dr. Nelson R. Hawkins of Itasca, president of the Texas Presbyterian Home and School. Burial was in East Hill Cemetery in Ft. Stockton.

Mr. Ellis is survived by his wife; a brother, John Ellis of Haskell; a niece, Mrs. C. H. Breazeale of San Angelo; and a nephew, Fred Ellis of Fort Stockton.
