





R. E. (Ed) Ellis, Member of Early-Day Haskell Family, Dies In Ft. Stockton

R. E. (Ed) Ellis 75-year-old re-tired Fort Stockton business leader and property owner, former resident here and member of an early-day Haskell family, died Dec. 19 in Ft. Stockton Memorial Hospital following a prolonged ill-ness. He was a brother of John Ellis of Haskell, and will be re-membered by many friends in this

Death of the Fort Stockton man came slightly more than two years after he and his wife had celebrated their 50th wedding aniversary, and after 40 years of esidence in Fort Stockton.

Mr. Ellis was born in Eastland County April 2, 1878. He came to Haskell when a young man, and on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 28, 1901, he married Miss Bertha Fitzgerald in Haskell. They lived here for five years, during which time Mr. Ellis was employed in a dry goods store. Then they moved to Rule, and Mr. Ellis became cashier of the First National Bank nere, a position he held until

In the fall of 1913 Mr. Ellis purchased a grocery business in Fort Stockton, where he was ac-tive in operation of the business until 1946. During his long resi-dence there, he was active in civic affairs and business circles, and expanded his holdings to include considerable business property and real estate. He was a stock-holder and director in the former First National Bank in Fort Stockton, and served as its president for a time in the 20's
