Voters who cannot come to their

Voters who cannot come to their regular voting box are being reminded that they should procure an absentee ballot from the office of the County Clerk.

Changes in the election laws specify that election officials will not be permitted to carry ballots to houses or hospitals for voters unable to come to the polls. However ballots may be taken from the polling place by an official when the voter is unable to leave his car after being transported to the place of voting.

The changes are believed to be responsible for the unusually heavy absentee voting for the the July 28 primary. According to Deputy Allie Belle Smith of the County Clerk's office, 180 ballots have been mailed to absentee voters. Of these, 77 have been returned and are in ballot boxes.

O'Daniel Predicts 'No Run-Off' In Campaign Talk Here Friday

Texas in the early 40's who is again seeking nomination for Governor in the Democratic primaries addressed a crowd estimated at more than 2,000 people here Friday night. Although O'Daniel had lost none

of his political adeptness in making a crowd-pleasing campaign talk, his audience gave frequent scattered applause but there was none of the enthusiastic response given the former flour salesman in his first political appearances when he was swept into the Gov-ernor's office on an avalanche of

O'Daniel's Hillbilly Band, how-ever, seemed as popular as ever with the crowds cheering for en-

ores.
O'Daniel described his campaign for Governor as "Not much of a race because there is not much opposition. There's nobody running against me that amounts to much." he said. Continuing, he admitted "Oh, there are three or four, but not 12 like the gang of professional politicians we beat the first time yet elected me your Governor."

W. Lee O'Daniel, ex-Governor ["The little Junior Senator from and former U. S. Senator from Texas," whom he did not call by name. Discussing the Land Board scandals, he told his audience that the Attorney General, Governor and Land Commissioner all were members of the Veterans Land Board. "One of them has been sent to prison, and it's all being hushed up," he said. "The people want me to go down there and look into this mess and find out who stole what, and how much." A cash bonus for Texas war

A cash bonus for Texas war veterans equal to that paid by any other state, higher old age pensions, a huge and almost fantastic water develoment program for Texas, and continued segregation were pledged by O'Daniel if elected. "As long as I am Governor we will continue to have segregation just like we have always had."

Political campaigning is ex-pected to reach its peak this week end as candidates enter the final days remaining before the first primary balloting. And despite the fact that there has been but relatively little interest eviden-ced on the part of voters to date, a heavy vote turn-out is being predicted.

This forecast is based on unusually large number of ab-sentee ballots cast since July 8, with applications for ballots continuing to come in daily. The number is expected to exceed any previous year, deputies in the County Clerk's office believe.

Although this year's ballot is shorter than usual, due to the change from two to four year terms for officials, contests in four county-wide races will result in a full turn-out of voters. observers believe. For added interest voters have two contested races for County Commissionerin Precincts 1 and 3-and for Constable in the Haskell precinct which takes in all of the city and the southeast section of the coun-

At State level the ordinarily "hot" Governor's race has failed to generate the usual partisan interest of the past so far as outspoken support of voters

concerned. Visit of Candidate O'Daniel to Haskell last week served to spark some interest in the race for Governor but the political atmos-phere is still far below the comparative period two years ago during the torrid Shivers-Yar-

borough campaign.

district and county races.
