She was the former Fannie Von Tress, born Dec. 6, 1862, in Georgetown, Texas, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ed. ward H. Von Tress. She married J. D. Roberts Feb. 21, 1882, in Georgetown, and a short time later they moved to Shackelford

County to make their home. Mr. and Mrs. Roberts moved to Haskell County in 1887 from Albany, settling in the northeast part of the county where Mr. Roberts was a prominent farmer and stockman for more than 50 years. The rural community of Roberts and a school and church there were named for the family, and the early day Vontress post office in that section was named for her son, Von Tress Rob-

erts, who died in 1929. Since the death of her husband in 1941 Mrs. Roberts had been making her home with her son and family. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

helped pile up a bigger surplus. "There was a 450 per cent acreage increase in 10 years in that area, while in Central and East Texas, the 1955 allotment amounted to only 70 per cent of the 1945 plantings. Why the difference?'

Stiles said. He also said the state committee permitted West Texas growers huge acreage credits "on intent to plant" in drouth years. "All of Texas has had a sevenyear drouth. Why is one area avored over another-" he asked.
