## Saturday Post Office Closing Ordered Here

Beginning Saturday, April 13, the Haskell Post Office will be closed all day Saturday and on Sunday as previously, in accordance with instructions received Wednesday by Postmaster Harold Spain.

Instructions curtailing postal service were based on orders of Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield who has told Congress unless the Post Office department can get deficiency appropriations, service must be curtailed.

Also effective April 13, all city and rural delivery service will be discontinued on Saturdays, except special delivery.

Special deliveries include: No third class mail, except certain medical items, will be accepted, effective April 29.

Window service at post offices will be limited to 8 1/2 continuous hours per day beginning April 15. The issuance of money orders will be suspended at all offices of the first and second class effective April 29.

## Two Aldermen Begin New Terms on City Council

Two incoming members of the City Council, Myron Blard, newly-elected Alderman, and Byron Frazier, who was re-elected, were administered the oath of office at the regular meeting of the City Council Tuesday night.

The meeting marked the beginning of a new fiscal year for the city, and Mayor J. E. Wall-

ing announced commission assignments after induction of the two Council members.

Alderman Blard, who succeeds Chas. E. Smith on the Council, was named Commissioner of Sanitation, post formerly held by Smith, while Frazier was re-assigned as Park Commissioner. Other Aldermen also retaining

## Senate Approves Bill To Create Area Municipal Water Authority

Legislation authorizing the creation of the North Central Texas Water Authority was passed by the Texas Senate Tuesday morning and the bill will become law after signing by Governor Price Daniel.

State Senator George Moffett, who sponsored the bill jointly with Representative Ed Cloud, stated in a telephone conversation Tuesday that Governor Daniel would likely get the bill Thursday and that it would be signed immediately.

The bill will enable the towns of Haskell, Munday, Goree, Knox City, Seymour, Rule and Rochester to proceed toward developing a joint municipal water project on Millers Creek.

Final development of the project must be authorized by a majority vote in each of the towns, in separate elections.

Next step in advancing the project will be a mass meeting to be held in Munday at an early date, for representatives from each of the interested towns, local advocates stated.

## Hester and Herren Named Trustees In Light Voting

In light voting Saturday, with a total of 81 votes being polled, Ed Hester and C. H. (Bud) Herren were re-elected members of the Haskell School Board for the ensuing three years. Hester, a candidate for re-election, received 74 votes. Herren, who will replace Gaston Hattox, whose term has expired, polled 70 votes. Hattox was not a candidate.

In a light flurry of write-in voting Joe S. Harper received 10 votes, R. A. Harris four votes, Roy Wiseman, Douglas Lees and Fred Brown, one vote each.

Also at this meeting, Miss Nettie McCollum was elected secretary of the county organization.

Mrs. C. V. Payne gave a report of the meeting of the Texas Tuberculosis Association at Fort Worth April 4-6, when some of the nation's outstanding health specialists addressed the gathering.

One point stressed at the Fort Worth meeting was the plea to Texas sportsmen that they donate the hides of deer killed during the hunting season to the patients in State TB hospitals. The hides are converted into moccasins, bill folds, purses, etc., and provide patients a worthwhile work hobby. State hospitals are located at San Antonio, Kerrville, San Angelo, Harlingen and Tyler.

Plans were also discussed for the annual Christmas Seal sale, and Mrs. Payne said the speaker emphasized the fact that "Christmas Seals fight tuberculosis."

## WERE THEY WHOOPERS? . . . Haskell Man Curious As to Identity Of Flock of Huge Cranes Seen Here

Lloyd Conner, Haskell contractor, is wondering about the identity of a flock of huge, snow-white cranes he observed one day last week on Lake Stamford, southeast of town. "They were large enough to be those widely-publicized whooping cranes which are supposed to be almost extinct," Conner said.

Mr. and Mrs. Conner and Wayne Tidrow, also of Haskell, counted 48 of the cranes from a distance of about 200 yards. Some of the big birds were wading and feeding in the shallow water, while others were resting on the surface. "They were as large as a big turkey gobbler, their legs were at least three feet long and they had a wing spread of seven or eight feet," Conner declared.

The ones swimming or gliding along on the water resembled pictures he'd seen of swans, Conner said, and all were snow white. The flock was across a strip of the lake from the Haskell people, and the birds apparently were unafraid of that distance.

"They may not have been whooping cranes, but I'd sure like for some one who knows to tell me what species of wildfowl they are," the Haskell man said.

20 Years Ago—April 9, 1897

Only 46 votes were polled in Tuesday's city election in confirming the two candidates whose names appeared on the ballot, as Aldermen for the ensuing two years. John S. Rike, incumbent, and J. D. Montgomery, local Ford automobile dealer, were elected without opposition.

Two men convicted of theft and now being held in jail at Level-land will be returned to Stone-wall County next week where they will face trial for stealing 10 bales of cotton from the Asper-mont cotton yard.

Audit of the city finances for the fiscal year ended March 31 was started this week by R. V. Robertson, local accountant. He is being assisted by Joe Brooks. The work is expected to require a week or ten days.

Fourteen Haskell County youths were accepted for enrollment in the Civilian Conservation Corps this week and will be assigned to CCC camps in Oregon and California. Composing the group are A. B. Campbell, Carlton D. Ross, Orville Allison, John T. McAda, Marlow H. Elliott, Thomas Wright, Milton Yarborough, Leon Biffle, Glen Yarborough, James C. Yarborough, Hollis Bell, Zane G. Franklin, Paul Allen, Rueben Lee Cumba.

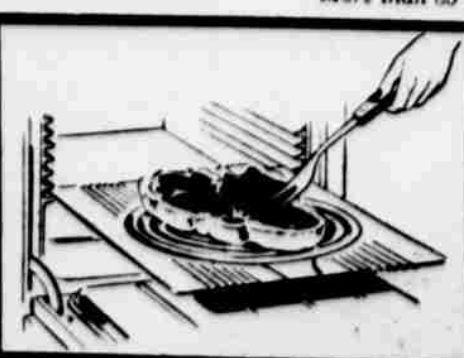

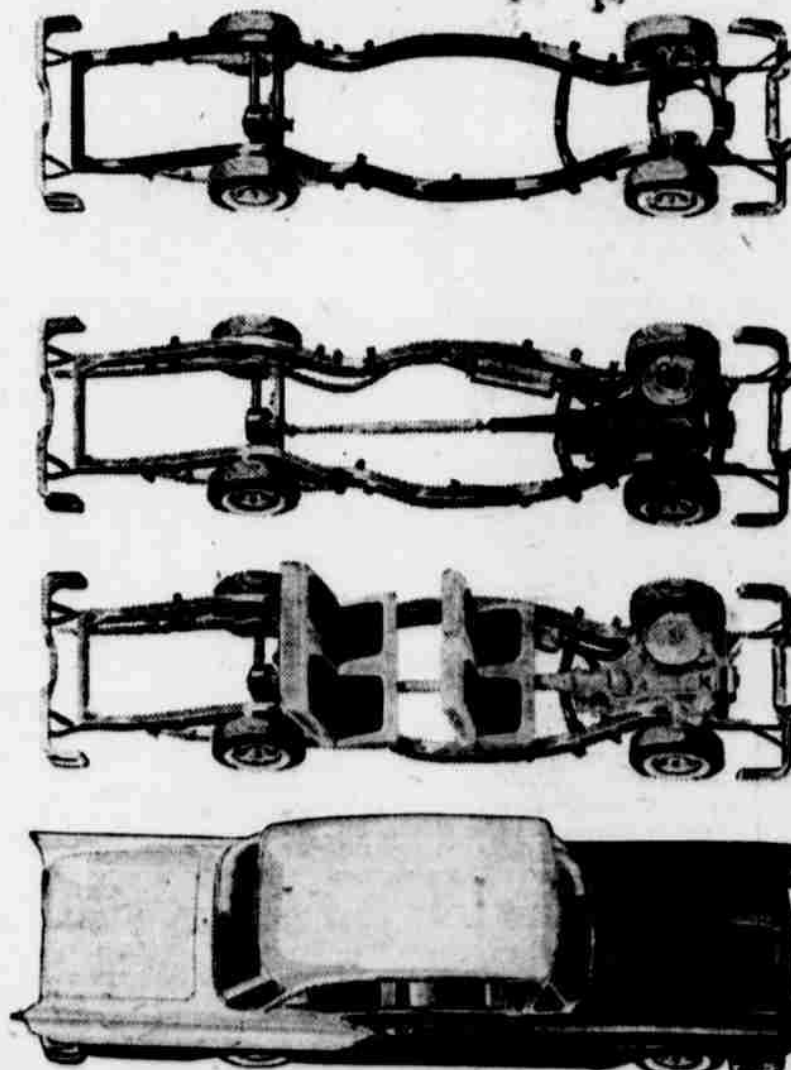

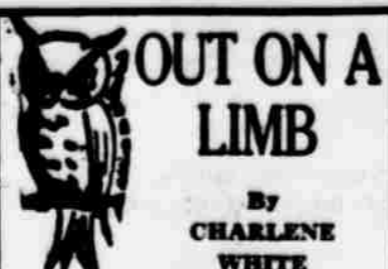

Officiating was the Rev. Bill Crafton, pastor of Trinity Baptist Church, and the Rev. Calvin Knight, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church. Burial was in the Hobbs Community Cemetery. Mr. Butler was born March 24, 1915, in Sweetwater and moved to Stamford from Roby in 1954. He married Hattie B. Davis on Aug. 30, 1954, at Lovington, N. M. He is survived by his wife.

A veteran of World War II, he served with the 19th Infantry Division from June, 1939 until September, 1945.

Officers assisting Sheriff Pennington in investigating the death were State Highway Patrolman Oscie Renfrow and Stamford Police Chief Jack Tidwell.
