



Professional Food Manager Certification Training Course offered

Statistics indicate that foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, one in six Americans will become sick, 128,000 will become hospitalized, and 3,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

Texas Food Establishment Rules state that each food establishment is required to have one certified food manager on site.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in Taylor, Jones and Haskell Counties, is offering a professional food manager certification training course. This two day program will be offered for \$125.00 on May 22 and March 23 at the Taylor County Extension Office. Cost includes training, materials, and the ServSafe food manager certification examination. The food manager's certification will be valid for five years.

Registration deadline is May

This program is designed to not only prepare hazardous foods and foodservice managers to pass the certification handling examination; it will provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food. Almost 50 cents of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied.

Foodborne illnesses are estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance, and medical bills. With these statistics, knowledge of how to prevent foodborne illness is essential. The benefits of improved food safety include:

•Increased customer satisfaction

•Improved relationships with health officials

 Prevention of bad publicity and law suits due to foodborne illness

By attending the course,

foodservice managers will learn about:

 identifying potentially common errors in food

preventing contamination of food

 teaching and encouraging personal hygiene for employees

When students apply to the university, their applications are processed through a matrix to look for the three pillars of a Terry Scholar: high leadership, high scholarship, and high financial need. There is a committee at Texas Tech, led by the Terry Coordinator, who reviews the applications and submits a select few to the foundation for an in person interview. This year there were over 700 applications for 30 interview spots and only 15 Terry Scholarships awarded to incoming freshmen at Texas Tech for 2017.

The Scholarship is a "last dollar" scholarship so that each scholar is awarded the cost of attendance. In addition, the foundation has graciously added an additional semester of funding to be used towards study abroad programs. For Terry Scholars attending Texas Tech, this means that their scholarship award will be worth well over \$100,000 over the course of 4 years.

The Terry Foundation Scholarship is more than a scholarship; it's a program. The program is designed to encourage student success and retention. With a dedicated program coordinator and a host of resources at the disposal of the scholars, success is highly anticipated.

With 700 applications, the chance of making it through the entire process is slim, so two of those fifteen chosen for Texas Tech University coming from the same high school would indeed be rare. It certainly shines a positive light on the scholastic ability, character and leadership of these two young men. We look forward to all you


