Rice Springs Roundup Opens Today for Three-Night Run

Parade Route

The Roundup Parade at 4 p. m. today will travel the following route: Assemble at Roundup Grounds, then west on South Second to Avenue D, North to South First, then west to Avenue E, North to North First, then east to Avenue E, South to North First, east to Avenue D, North to North Second, east to Avenue C, South to North First, west to Avenue D, South to South First, then turning east for return to grounds.

Everything is in readiness today for the opening of the third annual Rice Springs Roundup this evening for a three-night run under auspices of the Saddle Tramps riding club. Sponsors, enthusiastic over the cooperation of the entire citizenship in advance plans for the event, confidently expect this year's show to eclipse the previous two Roundups in point of attendance and outstanding performances to be presented in the arena. Supporting the outlook for a record list of contestants, entries were coming in rapidly the first of the week, and Tuesday afternoon approximately 90 contestants had filed entries for the various events. First truckloads of bucking stock to be used in the rodeo arrived Tuesday afternoon and the remainder of the stock came in Wednesday. This year's rodeo will be produced by Morris Stephens of Silverton, Texas, who has staged some of the larger shows in Oklahoma and the Panhandle during recent years. Stephens said Wednesday that the stock in the bronc and Brahma bull riding events would be used for the first time in the Haskell show. Seven major events will be staged nightly, Thursday through Saturday. Included will be both bareback and saddle bronc riding, calf roping, cowgirls barrel race, Brahma bull riding, double mugging, and cutting horse contest. More than \$2,000 in cash awards will be paid winners. Other special events will be a Junior Cutting Horse Contest on

a jackpot basis for four winners, and on Saturday night an Old Timers Calf Roping contest for cowboys 55 years old or older. More than \$2,000 in prize money and awards will go to the winners in the main rodeo events. In addition to \$500 prize money in the ribbon roping, and \$500 offered in the calf roping contest, a shopmade saddle will be presented the champion roper of the show. This award will go to the roper making the best combined time on four head of stock, two head from each roping event.

Opening Day Parade at 4 P. M. First event in the 1956 show will be the opening day parade at 4 p. m. today. Among the headline units in the parade will be the colorful Santa Rosa Palomino riding club and the famed Cowboy Band from Hardin-Simmons University. The Haskell High School Band also will furnish parade music for the dozen or more visiting riding clubs and hundreds of cowboys and cowgirls taking part in the parade. Other sections of the colorful procession will include several decorated cars and floats, along with new model automobiles displayed by local dealers. Units and their order in the parade will be: Police Car, H-SU Cowboy Band, Old Timers, Pitman Motor Company, HHS Indian Band, Santa Rosa Palomino Club, Burton Chevrolet Co., Ector County Sheriff Posse, Bill Wilson Motor Co., Palo Pinto County Sheriff's Posse, Richey-Strain Motor Co., Seymour Remuda Club, Perry Motor Co., Stonewall County Sheriff's Posse, Smith Oldsmobile Co., Vernon Riding Club, Kindergarten Float, Olney Riding Club, Fisher County Sheriff's Posse, Lynn County Sheriff's Posse, Haskell Saddle Tramps, Contestants. Judges of the parade will be Mrs. Cecil Eager and Broady Humphrey of Stamford and A. C. Pierson of Haskell. Grand entry opening the first show Thursday will be led by the Santa Rosa riding club, with some 10 or 12 other groups taking part in the colorful spectacle. Rex Felker will be announcer for the events, and a public address system will be installed in the arena as a courtesy of Fred Gilliam, consignee of the Texas Company. Show officials will include Arena Director John Wallace; Fred Albright of Paducah and W. A. Fitzcock of Aspermont, judges; timekeepers, Ray Overton and Duke Montgomery. Producer Stephens will also work the arena as show supervisor, and will appoint pick-up men and other helpers necessary to stage the events.

Candidates Assessed \$3,398 As Costs of Two Primaries

Candidates for county, district, and precinct offices in Haskell County will pay total assessments of \$3,398 as ballot filing fees to cover cost of holding the two Democratic primaries this year. Expenses for the two primaries was estimated at \$3,400 by the County Democratic Executive Committee in session here Monday. This estimate includes all costs of holding the two elections—ballots, election supplies, and salaries for election judges and clerks. For the 20 voting precincts, the committee estimated 125 clerks and judges would be required. Assessments Range From \$18 to \$600.00 All costs of holding the two

Democratic primaries are paid by the candidates, with the bulk of these levies being against those seeking county offices. Assessments against individual candidates were based on the salary of the office involved, and in each instance represents 12 per cent of the annual salary. Where more than one candidate is listed, total assessment was divided by the number of office seekers. For State and legislative offices, the filing fee is fixed by statute. These include a \$10 assessment each against candidate for Congressman, State Senator, and Representative. Individual assessments against all other candidates were set by the committee as follows: For District Attorney, 39th Judicial District, \$187.50 each against two candidates, for a total of \$375. Assessor-Collector, \$192.00 each against three candidates, total \$576.00. Sheriff, \$187.50 each against three candidates, total \$562.50. County Attorney, \$600.00 against one candidate.

Commissioner, Precinct 1, \$170.00 each against three candidates, total \$510.00. Commissioner, Precinct 3, \$102.00 each against five candidates, total \$510.00. Constable, Precinct 1, Haskell, \$18.00 each against five candidates, total \$90.00. Constable, Rule, \$75.00 against one candidate. Public Weigher, O'Brien, \$30.00 each against two candidates, total \$100.00. Notices of the individual assessments will be mailed to each candidate, and Saturday May 19 is deadline for payment of the assessment.

Service to the rural patrons of the Haskell exchange of General Telephone Company became a reality Friday, when a new telephone in the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Thurman Howeth southwest of Haskell was connected and placed in service.

Construction is now underway to extend telephone facilities southeast and northeast of town, and the final section to be built will serve the area northwest of this city. As recipients of the first telephone in the rural extension program, Mr. and Mrs. Howeth held informal open house Friday afternoon, when Haskell Mayor J. E. Walling, Jr., talked with General's Division Manager Mills Roberts in Memphis, Texas, in the first long distance call over the new rural installation.

"We've been without telephone service so long that it's hard to realize we can now call any of our friends in town or over long distance," Mrs. Howeth told the group at the brief ceremony. Until moving to their present home in January this year the Howeths lived on the Dennis P. Ratliff farm six miles southwest of town for 13 years. Memorial Honoring Dr. Kimbrough Being Discussed

At the invitation of County Judge Alfred Turnbow, a group of Haskell citizens met in the District Courtroom Tuesday afternoon to discuss the possibility of establishing a memorial honoring the late Dr. E. M. Kimbrough. Judge Turnbow, chairman, said that several projects had been suggested by individuals. These included the establishment of a chemistry laboratory at the high school and the mounting of a plaque in Haskell County Hospital. Judge Turnbow stated that consideration was also being given to the proposal to change the name of the hospital to Kimbrough Memorial or Doctor's Memorial. He said that the proposal to change the hospital's name had been under discussion for some time. It is believed that by doing so, many of the charity cases would be eliminated, as well as paying tribute to the late Dr. Kimbrough. Judge Turnbow pointed out. A nominating committee composed of Mrs. Ira Hester, Wallace Cox and T. G. Cahill selected a committee to meet with the school board to discuss the possibility of the memorial laboratory. The committee members are Dr. Joe Thigpen, Mrs. Bill Ratliff, and Art McMillin. As soon as the committee can meet with the board, a second meeting will be called for their report.

Filing Deadline Bars Benjamin Man From Ballot

The name of a last-minute candidate for State Representative from the 83rd District will not appear on the Haskell County ballot, according to a decision of the County Democratic Executive Committee Monday. The application of Bill Sams of Benjamin for a place on the ballot was not properly filed prior to the May 7 deadline, the executive committee ruled Monday. County Committee Chairman Chas. M. Conner said the application was received May 8 in a special delivery letter postmarked May 7 at Benjamin. Mailing of the application by special delivery did not comply with the election code, the executive committee ruled. The 83rd District is composed of Haskell, Knox, Baylor and Throckmorton Counties. State Representative Ed J. Cloud of Rule is now serving his first term in office, and is a candidate for a second term. Based on poll tax and exemption certificates issued, Haskell County has 3,373, or approximately 40 per cent of the 8,383 potential votes in the four county district. Knox County has 2,228, Baylor, 1,651, and Throckmorton, 1,131.

Constable Marlow In Hospital at Fort Worth

Constable Bob Marlow is a patient in Harris Hospital, Fort Worth, after being hospitalized when he became seriously ill while on his way from Haskell to Huntsville Sunday. Mr. Marlow underwent surgery Tuesday morning, and was reported improving nicely Wednesday. The Haskell officer has a son, June Marlow, and a daughter, Mrs. J. E. Vanders, living in Fort Worth and as soon as he is able to leave the hospital will be removed to the home of one of his children. Constable Marlow was accompanying Deputy Sheriff Garth Garrett in transferring two men convicted here to the State Prison at Huntsville Sunday. Feeling slightly ill when they left Haskell, Marlow became seriously ill. He stopped at the home of a sister at Brandon, Texas, and later was removed to Fort Worth.

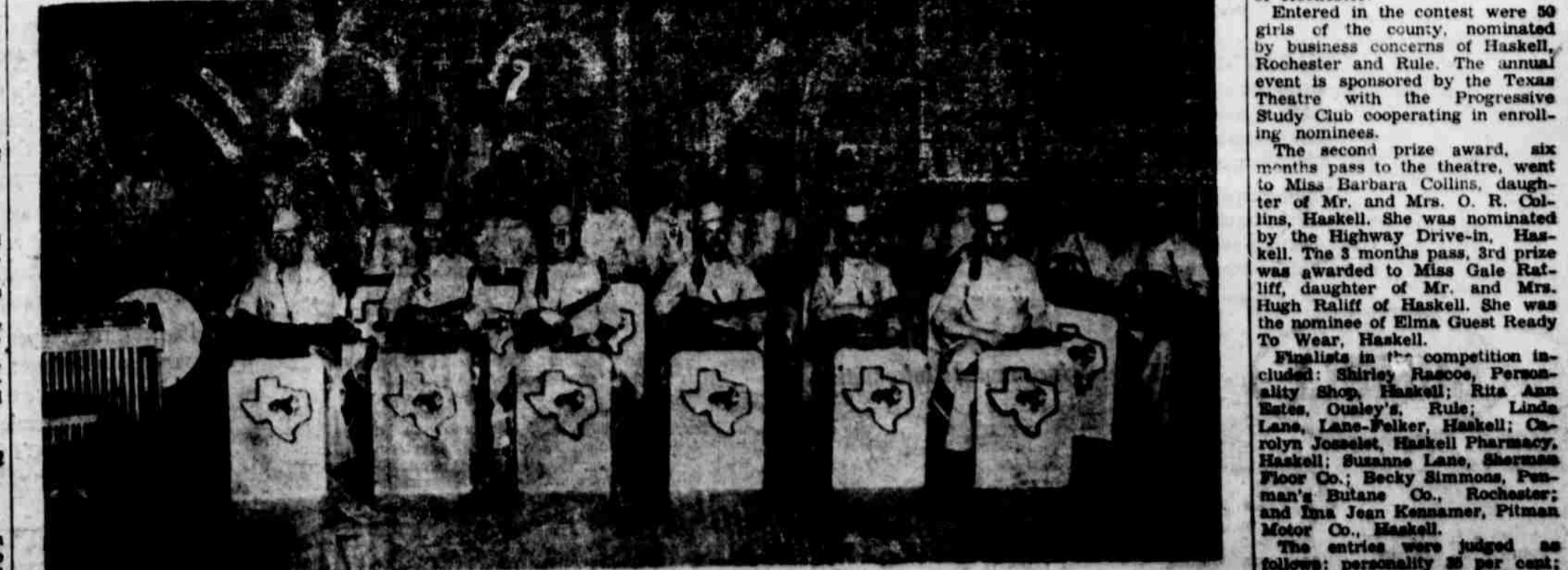


Library Given Books In Memory of Late Dr. Kimbrough

30 Years Ago—May 11, 1906

A fine of \$200 and costs, heaviest ever assessed here for a liquor law violation, was imposed by County Judge Chas. M. Conner Monday against a farmer living north of town who was charged with possession and transporting liquor.

Two Abilene youths were apprehended by Deputies Mart Clifton and Ollie Kitley Tuesday after local officers had been notified of theft of an automobile in Seymour. After questioning by officers, the young men said they had also taken an automobile in Breckenridge which they had abandoned near Seymour where they "appropriated" the car they were driving when arrested.

A 76-year-old O'Brien woman, who was found brutally beaten in the small home where she lived alone last Friday, died Thursday at the home of a sister, where she had been removed from the Knox City Hospital. Two men charged with the slaying are being held by officers and an early trial is being sought by prosecutors. District Attorney Ben Charlie Chapman and District Attorney Henry Grindstaff both state they will ask the death penalty against the two accused men.

In an election at Carney April 28, the proposition to incorporate a public school district carried by a vote of 34 for and only 9 against.

We are informed that Haskell is to have a brick making plant soon. It is understood that when the plant is in operation brick made here can be sold at a price that will greatly reduce the cost of building.

Thursday morning the two big grading machines on the Wichita Valley Railroad extension drove down the line and to a point one block north of the depot site in Haskell, each machine cutting a great furrow on the side, elevating the dirt and depositing it in a continuous stream in the center of the roadway. Contractors say that by next week they will be working between Haskell and Stamford and will probably reach the latter town by the middle of June.

Cafe Owner Stanley Furrh First Victim Of "Western Week" Kangaroo Court

The first occupant of the Saddle Tramps jail was Haskell cafe owner Stanley Furrh. He was captured Friday morning after a tussle with the Saddle Tramps law enforcement officer, Shelley Roy-all.

The mock "arrest" officially opened Western Week in Haskell, whereby all residents are required to wear Western Clothing during the Rice Springs Roundup celebration or suffer the consequences at the hands of the Saddle Tramps riding club.

Furrh was "injured in battle" prior to the "arrest" and later verbally attacked the arresting officer as "unfair" and "prejudiced." However, after much consultation, it was decided that the scratch on his left arm would not require a band-aid.

While Furrh's defense attorney, Dale Condon, was thinking up eloquent wordage, the imprisoned man stood piteously begging assistance from passersby. No aid was forthcoming.

Brought before Judge John Ivy, the charge was announced as "indecent exposure." The defendant pleaded "not guilty," but his attorney pleaded, "guilty." Whereupon, Furrh said, "Your honor,

I demand another lawyer. How many am I allowed?" Questioning by prosecuting attorney Cliff Berry brought out in the trial the fact that Furrh did not believe he was guilty of indecent dress. "Ain't a dress, it's britches!" He was referring to his attire of Bermuda shorts and sports shirt.

After due deliberation, Judge Ivy pronounced the verdict of guilty. The sentence imposed, as suggested by the prosecuting attorney, was that Furrh eat one of the hamburgers from his place of business. It was also declared that the hamburger must be eaten without beverages.

Brooks Middleton, however, refused to see any man so tortured and put a lawn sprinkler in the jail with the accused man. He thoughtfully remembered to turn the water on full force.

The guilty man finished the soggy hamburger and was released with a warning from Saddle Tramp Bob Herren that any further difficulty and he would be shackled with handcuffs as well as serve a jail sentence.

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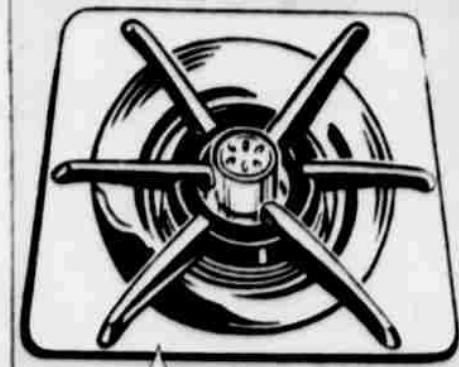

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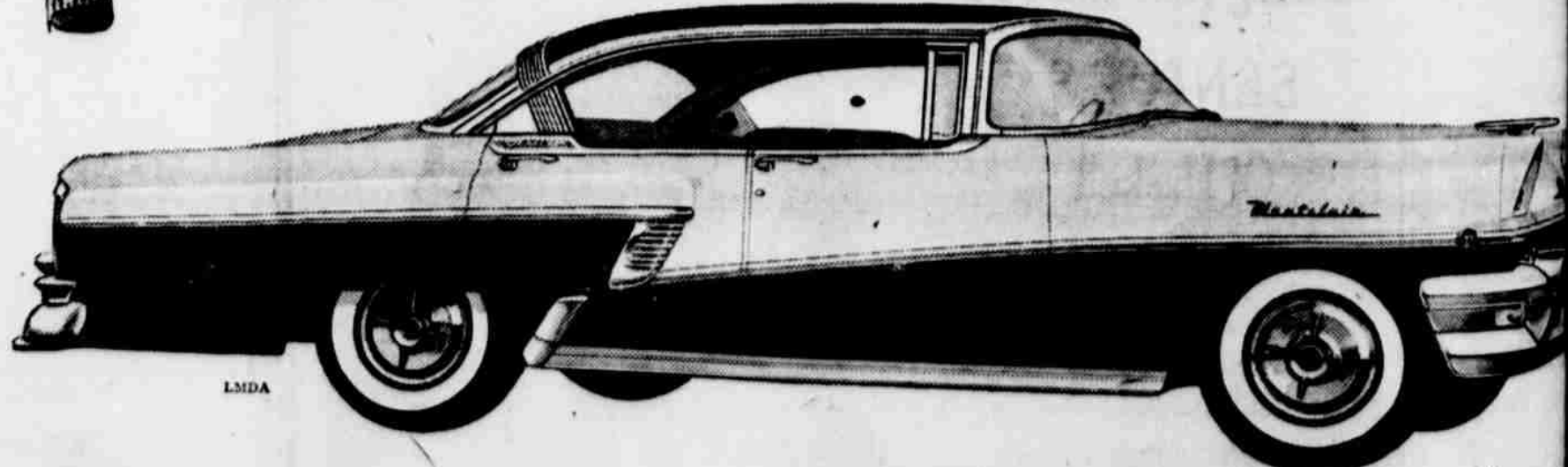

She finished by applying a combination of linseed oil and turpentine and polished the chair with a woolen cloth.

Gunplay, Attempted Bribery Spark Trial In Judge Roy Bean's Western Week Court

By CHARLENE WHITE The Wild and Woolly West returned to Haskell with a vengeance Saturday afternoon when Judge Roy Bean's court took on the prosecution of R. L. Burton, for "maliciously and wilfully refusing to wear western clothes during Western Week."

An additional charge was made that Burton also "wilfully and maliciously tore the knees out of Deputy Myrom Biard's jeans while resisting arrest," according to "Judge Bean" impersonated by Jetty V. Clare, president of the Saddle Tramps.

The kangaroo court trials are being held in connection with the Rice Springs Roundup, May 17, 18, and 19 in Haskell.

"Jailed" on the courthouse lawn Burton cheered his attorney Ross Hemphill as he fervently stated the defense. In a voice quivering with emotion Hemphill said, "Your honor, the officers went into his place of business and arrested him, placing him in jail, handcuffing him as a criminal. He was taken by force, mind you!" At this point, Royce Adkins, prosecuting attorney muttered, "Only way we could take him!"

Glaring at the D. A., Hemphill continued, "Your honor, it is your duty under Statute No. 56, revised, to grant my client a permit to carry concealed weapons as he deems necessary for protection and to wear such clothes as he wants to wear." Someone reminded the defense that they hadn't been charged with carrying concealed weapons but it was a point to remember. Concluding his plea to the 6 man jury, Hemphill said, "My client ain't guilty of nothin'!"

Mr. Adkins hastily grabbed the microphone to charge that the defendant was at that moment bribing the jury. The judge decreed that two of the jurors be placed in jail on charges of bribery. They were Tom Roberson and C. E. Phelps. Other jurors were Lon Pate, Brooks Middleton, Virgil Brown, and Jay Weaver.

Sheriff Shelby Royall and Deputy Bob Herren testified for the prosecution that the defendant had violently resisted arrest. According to Herren, "Also, yesterday he pulled a gun on me and had ME thrown in jail!" That clinched the case.

The jury retired for all of 35 seconds and returned a verdict of "guilty on all counts." The judge sentenced the guilty man to a pacing horse around the town square each day of the rodeo and further, he must be wearing a ten gallon hat and a big, black mustache.

Upon release from jail, Burton pulled out a six shooter (loaded with blanks) and proceeded to chase Sheriff Royall around the jail. He "shot" the man and the sheriff lay prostrate on the lawn until he heard the deputy chase after another victim. He then recovered with amazing alacrity.

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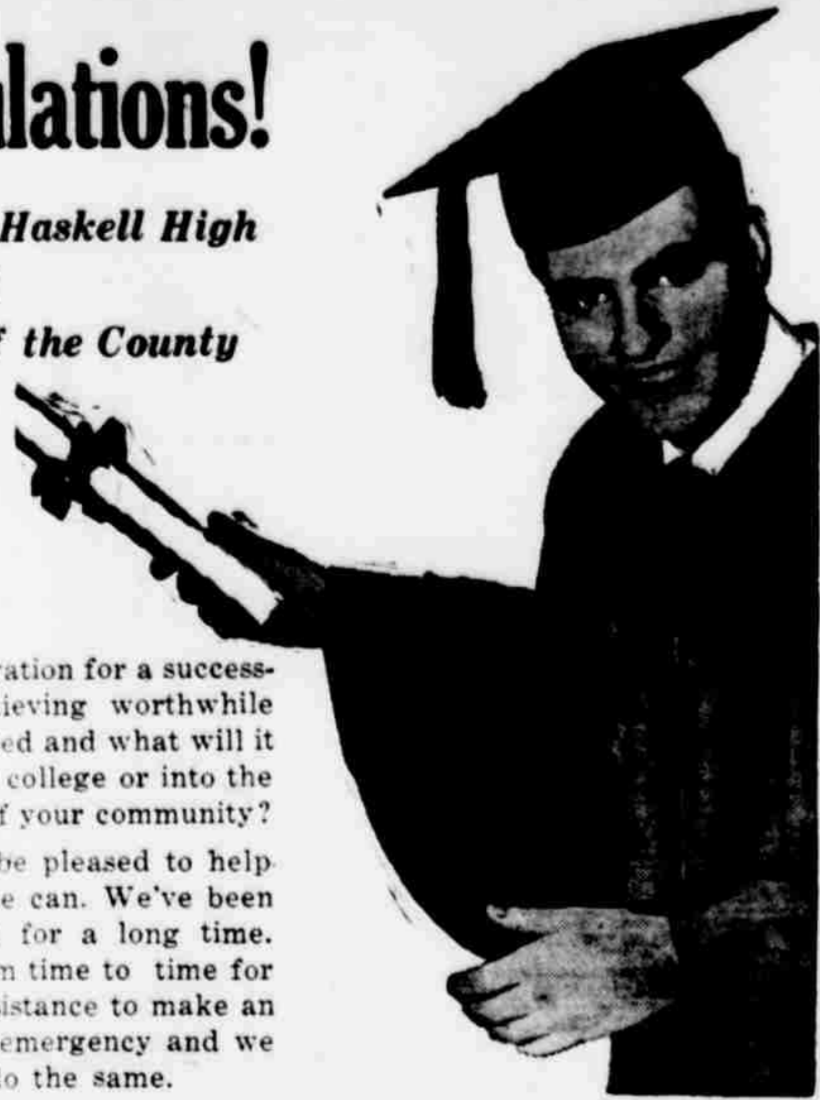

Five Year Terms For Trio Charged With Burglary

Three men were convicted of burglary charges and sentenced to five years in each case in 39th District Court Thursday. The five year terms are to be served concurrently and began on the date of arrest.

The men who were convicted of robbing Haskell County farm homes and service stations are Julien Lambert, Jr., Lueders; James Conway, Roscoe; and Frank Sanchez, Knox City.

Lambert was convicted on four separate charges of burglary. Conway was convicted in three charges, companion cases to the ones of the Lueders man. They pleaded guilty to burglarizing the farm home of Howard Overby, Albert Hise and Tom Smith in November, 1955. In addition, Lambert was convicted of breaking and entering the home of Roy Clark, Stamford. A similar charge was made against Conway, but was dismissed for insufficient evidence. The two men have been transported to the State Penitentiary in Huntsville.

Sanchez also pleaded guilty to the charges that he broke into the service stations of D. O. Griffith, Rochester and O. S. Covey, O'Brien. He was also convicted of theft of property of more than \$50 value in connection with a carburetor, radiator and battery taken from the Lloyd Stephens farm near O'Brien. The burglaries occurred in February of this year. Sanchez has been taken to Benjamin in Knox County where other charges against him are pending.

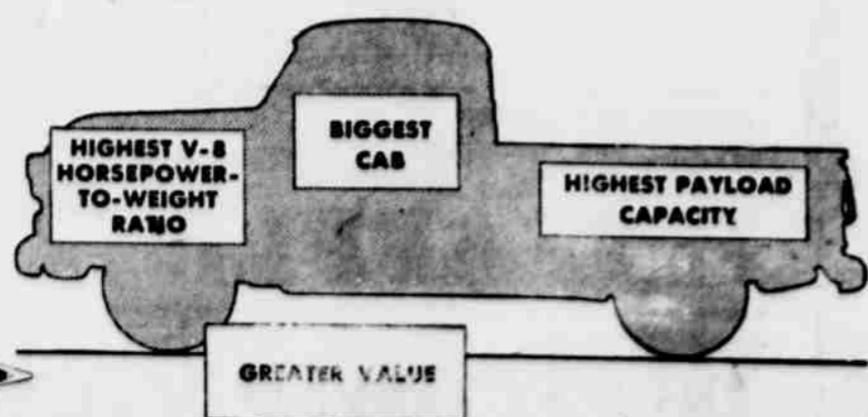

Junior High, and Thurman, Jr., 8, in the Second Grade in Haskell Elementary School.

The children are the ones really thrilled over having a telephone and they have the number, 464K1, memorized perfectly. Mrs. Howeth laughingly remarked:

"I'm sure glad to get a telephone," was Howeth's comment. He recalled that about two years ago while living on the Ratliff farm, a large tool and implement shed caught fire. There was no telephone service in the area and a neighbor had to drive to Haskell to summon firemen and equipment to keep the blaze from spreading to the Howeth home.

"A telephone then would have saved me some mighty uneasy moments," he declared.

In addition to Mayor Walling, telephone company representatives on hand for installation of the first rural telephone were J. A. McCrum, Jr., Seymour, district manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest, and E. W. Pruett, installation and service man in the Haskell exchange.

After connecting the Howeth telephone Friday, crewmen are completing installations for about 30 patrons in the southwest section of the project. They expect to have all these telephones in service by the end of this week barring any unforeseen delays, a company official said.

Three construction crews are also at work on the remaining sections of the project, which when completed will provide telephone service to a large rural area surrounding Haskell.
