SP-4 J. R. (Jay) STANLEY, Jr. RECEIVES DISCHARGE TODAY

BAIRD — SP4 J. R. Stanley Jr., better known as "Jay" to his friends here, will be discharged from the Army on July 18. He entered the Army in July, 1967, and after basic and advanced infantry training at Ft. Polk, La., he was assigned to Vietnam.

Stanley was a rifleman and later a machine-gunner with the mechanized infantry, 9th Infantry Division in Vietnam. In recent ceremonies at Ft. Hood, Texas, Stanley was awarded the Bronze Star medal with "V" Device and the citation reads as follows:

"For heroism in connection with military actions involving conflict with an armed hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam: Private First Class Stanley distinguished himself by valorous actions on the afternoon of May 9, 1969, while serving as a rifleman with Company B, 2nd Battalion, 47th Infantry, 9th Infantry Division, on a reconnaissance in force mission near Saigon, Vietnam. When one of his comrades was wounded as he assaulted a hostile bunker, Private Stanley immediately placed his personal safety aside and crawled 40 meters through hostile fire to aid his friend. When he reached the casualty, it became obvious that the wound was too severe to move him. At this point, Private Stanley brought such intense fire to bear on the enemy

Young Edwards served as State President of Texas Beta Clubs, and played basketball, placing two times on all district, all area and all region teams with a 27 point scoring average.

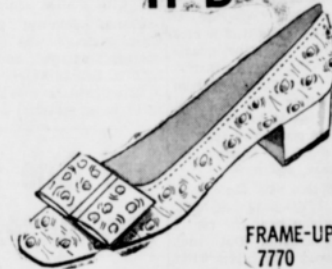

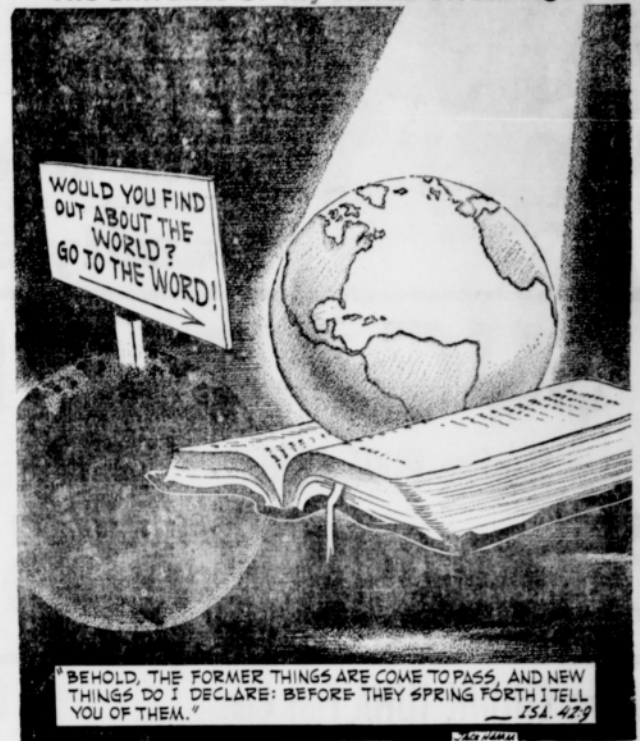

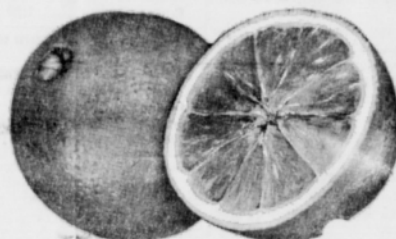

Louise Isenhower spent a few days visiting Mr. and Mrs. Bill

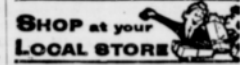
