Students and teachers will have a holiday Monday as classes will be dismissed in observance of Labor Day. School will resume at 8:25 a. m. Tuesday, Sept. 2.

DOVE SEASON OPENS MONDAY SEPTEMBER 1 THROUGH OCT. 30

BAIRD — Mourning dove season opens Monday, Sept. 1 and continues through October 30. Shooting hours will be from 12 noon DST until sunset, giving hunters an additional hour of hunting daily because of Daylight Savings Time.

Last year dove hunters could

start blasting away at 12 noon Central Standard Time, or 1 p. m. Daylight Savings Time. This was eliminated from the Federal guidelines this year, and in effect, dove hunters can begin shooting an hour earlier.

Daily bag limit is 10 and the possession limit is 20.

Hunting doves with rifles is prohibited. Doves must be hunted with a shotgun, and it must be plugged to a three shell capacity, including the shell in the chamber. The shotgun must not be larger than a ten gauge.

A person hunting any wild bird or wild animal outside the county of his residence must purchase a hunting license from the Parks and Wildlife Dept. or one of its authorized agents. A person who leases out land for hunting purposes must buy a shooting preserve license. A shooting preserve is any premises leased for hunting purposes, which is a separate, unconnected and distinct tract of land with a continuous and unbroken boundary.

No hunting is permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves or within corporate city limits. Season is closed on all public roads. It is unlawful to discharge any firearm in, on, along, or across any public road.

Also closed to hunting during the dove season is an area in the South Zone of Texas south and west of a line extending along U. S. Highway 83 from the Starr-Zapata County Line to Mission, and from Mission to the north city limits of Hidalgo via FM 1016 and FM 1926.

The Parks and Wildlife Dept. encourages everyone to understand and abide by the game and fish laws of the State of Texas.

Callahan County Bond Sales Reach 32 Percent of 69 Goal

BAIRD — July 1969 sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Callahan County totaled \$3,402, according to a report from Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee. January through July sales totaled \$40,960 and this is 32 per cent of the 1969 goal of \$130,000.

"Bond holders should be aware of two facts and give consideration before redeeming for non-emergency or planned purposes," Chairman Farmer stated.

"One - accrued interest on bonds must be declared on Federal Income Tax returns in the year Bonds are cashed, and, two, The Department of the Treasury has proposed to Congress a new higher rate of 5 per cent on both E and H Bonds retroactive to June 1, 1969. The 5 per cent rate would also apply to all outstanding bonds," Mr. Farmer said.

"People should remember, too that Savings Bonds are sold to be redeemed so there's a steady rate of redemptions at all times for emergencies, planned expenditures, and education and retirement purposes. In addition the unique tax advantages of

U. S. Savings Bonds make them especially attractive when fully understood by the bond saver.

"The \$52 billion outstanding is a major brake on inflationary forces and represents 23 per cent of the publicly-held portion of the Federal debt," Mr. Farmer said.

Texas sales during the first seven months of 1969 totaled \$104,261,845 -- a decrease of 2.4 per cent from 1968 when sales were \$106,830,122. Sales during the month totaled \$15,058,788 compared to \$15,862,130 during the same period of 1968.

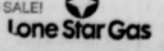

CHAIRMEN, SALE DATES FOR CATTLEMEN'S ROUNDUP SET

ABILENE — The appointment of area chairmen for the 1969 Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children has been announced by Charlie Morris of Abilene, who is serving his eighth year as general chairman of the annual event.

Officials are hoping that the Round-Up will raise more than \$75,000 for the non-profit West Texas Rehabilitation Center this year.

The cattle auction, the first and largest phase of the Round-Up, is set for September 29 at Ranchers and Farmers Livestock Auction, Abilene.

The annual horse sale, or second phase, will be held October 4 at Abilene Livestock Auction, while the final phase, the sheep and goat sale, will be held October 6 at the Coleman Auction, Morris said.

Morris noted that most of the area chairmen he appointed have been supporters of the Round-Up for many years. They will act as the chief link between the Round-Up and stockmen who wish to donate a calf or pen of calves to the WTRC for the sale.

Local chairmen are S. W. Lilly, Hugh Ross, Wendell Smith and James Snyder.

Operation of the Round-Up is simple -- ranchers and stockmen pick out a calf or pen of calves and designate them as his pledge to the 1969 Round-Up. Contacting his area chairman, he makes arrangements for free transportation to the auction site.

When the cattle go on the auction block, the donor is mentioned, so that the Round-Up has become an event publicizing

not only the generosity of stockmen, but the quality of their stock.

In operation for more than 16 years now, the WTRC has seen the demand for its services grow in overwhelming proportions -- and the services had also increased.

Its purpose is to serve all handicapped in various rehabilitation services, and patients come from far and near, many settling in Abilene or the surrounding area simply to be near the outstanding facilities.

Providing treatment to all handicapped without regard to race, creed, age or financial circumstances, the Center offers the following services to all patients referred by a licensed physician or some other accredited referral agency: physical, occupational, speech, educational therapy; audiology, psychology and pre-vocational evaluation.

The WTRC also offers six special diagnostic and evaluation clinics in physical medicine, general neurology, pediatric neurology, learning disorders, otology and orthopedic disorders.

None of the English translations of the Bible since the King James Version have it. It appears only once in the King James, in Acts 12:4, where it is given as a translation of the Greek word "pascha" (passover). It appears 2 times in the New Testament and is translated "passover" everywhere but here.
The word "Easter" is of pagan origin. It is derived from the word "Oestra" or "Oestre", the goddess of Spring.
The New Testament authorizes no annual day, nor season, in which to celebrate the resurrection of Christ. It does warn man, however, "Ye observe days, and month, and times, and years. I am afraid of you, lest I have bestowed upon you labour in vain." Gal. 4:10-11.
