Ramsey Muniz (Raza Unida), and two for McDonnell (American). Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls easily won the 30th District State Senate race with Knox County voters giving him 1018 to his Republican

opponent, Mary Kirchoff's 101. He carried all 29 counties in his district. The lawyer-businessman, 41, will replace State Senator Jack Hightower, who in turn whipped U.S. Rep. Bob Price of Pampa in his race for the U.S. House of Representatives. Knox County is no longer in District 13, but was included in District 17 where U.S. Rep. Omar Burlison was unopposed in his bid for re-election.

Bobby died at 5:00 p.m. Wednesday, October 30, in the Knox County Hospital after a two-year illness.

Born in Knox City on June 17, 1953, he had lived here all of his life. He attended all twelve years in Knox City Schools where he was active in all organizations and a popular student among his classmates and teachers.

Bobby was senior class president, senior class favorite, was chosen Best All Around Boy his senior year and received the award for Best Physical Fit Boy in KCHS. He was named Friendliest Boy in KCHS both his junior and senior years, served as

junior class president, and was named honorable mention on the all district football team. He was a member of the band, Future Farmers of America, and Future Teachers of America for four years.

Bobby married Carol Speck August 7, 1971, in Knox City. During his school years, he helped his father part-time at Lewis Body Shop and after graduation, assumed assistant manager duties until illness forced him to retire in 1973.

Bobby was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Carol; his parents, Mrs. Elaine Lewis and Sterling Lewis; a sister, Patricia Deering; four brothers, Danny, Troy, Todd, and Shane; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Ida Mae Vaden and maternal great-grandmother, Mrs. Oma Vaden, both of Seymour.

For KC-Aspermont Clash

Largest Crowd Ever Expected Friday Night

Friday night the Greyhounds will face another challenge as they meet the Aspermont Hornets at Greyhound Stadium at 7:30 p.m.

If Knox City Supt. W.R. Baker's predictions prove true, the game should draw the largest crowd ever to attend a football game in Greyhound Stadium. Additional bleachers are being moved in, the concession stand will be ready with ample refreshments on hand, and gates will open earlier than usual to accommodate the fans.

In last week's ratings, the Abilene area poll lists the Hounds as No. 2, and statewide, the Harris ratings list KC as No. 7, while the Associated Press gives us No. 8 on the list of Class A schools.

The Hounds and Hornets both have 8-0 records for the season and have equally fine credentials. The Greyhounds have racked up 294 points on the season while giving up 39 and Aspermont has tallied 288 points while allowing only 38.

The Greyhounds got revenge last Friday night as they defeated the Paducah Dragons 58-8 in a district 7-A game.

The Hounds got on the scoreboard first on a 41-yard run by Jerry Stamps in the first quarter, but the attempt for two extra points failed.

Charlie Flye scored before the quarter ended on an 18-yard run and Joey Swain booted the extra point.

Al Bateman returned a punt 65 yards for another touchdown in the second quarter and Swain again kicked the extra point.

Paducah's only score came in the second quarter on a 20-yard pass from Danny Garrett to Lindy Jordan.

Garett added two extra points, making the score at halftime 21-8.

Knox City came back in the third quarter with another touchdown, this time on a 50-yard run by Bateman. Donald Swearinger caught a pass from Swain for the two extra points.

In the final quarter Stamps scored on a 15-yard run, but the PAT failed. Then Flye caught a 68-yard touchdown pass from Swain and Dale Bloxham added the two extra points.

Swain added another three points when he booted a 22-yard field goal.

Bloxham scored again on a three-yard run and Swain kicked the extra point.

Bateman scored the final touchdown on a 20-yard pass from Swain. Swain again kicked the extra point.

In other 7-A action last Friday, Crowell slipped past Haskell 13-7 and Aspermont slaughtered Munday 68-12.

Following the morning worship service on Sunday, a covered dish luncheon is planned. Members and visitors will join for the meal and fellowship period to meet the evangelist.

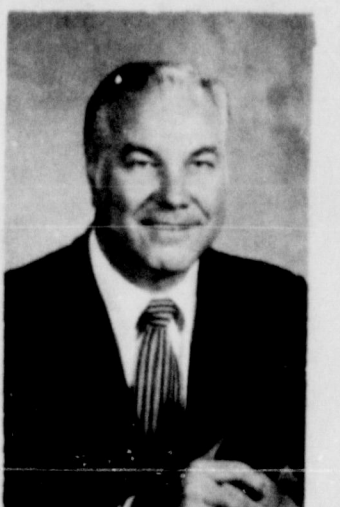

Before beginning his full life and career as an evangelist, Jack had an exciting life as a state winner in drama and oratory, a disc jockey, coach, and official, golfer, and private pilot. He is a 32nd degree Mason, an Eagle Scout, and Wood Badge Scoutmaster.

Rev. Gray is particularly interested in reaching children and youth. For this reason, he will spend part of his time each evening before the service talking to these groups. At the end of the week's services, he will host a special party for this group.

During the week that he is in Knox City, Bro. Jack is expected to speak to the students of Knox City High School and to the local Lions Club.

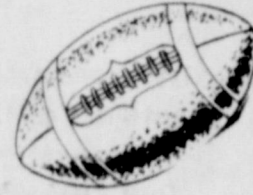
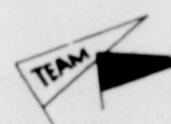

President Troy Gauntt, principal of Munday High School, introduced Barbara Ratliff, First Vice-President, who in turn introduced the entertainment for the evening. Four girls from Goree provided the music. The Businesswoman's Association of Munday presented a unique fashion show which will be long remembered by all present.

Names for the committee to nominate officers for the 1975-76 year were approved by the members. The committee consists of Dan Sloan of Munday, Dottie Lowrey of
