All-Time High Hit In Oil Production In '69

Knox County's petroleum industry produces 2,017,146 barrels of crude oil valued at \$6,473,515 and 194,103 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$26,592 for an annual economic value of \$6,500,107.

These figures, just released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, show the county ranked 119th among state counties in oil and gas production during 1969.

Texas production which has registered an increase over each previous year during the past decade hit another all-time high in 1969 with 1,151,775,000 barrels, according to U. S. Bureau of Mines statistics. This is a production increase of 24.2% since 1960.

"Production from Knox County helped meet this record demand," says Kenneth E. Montague, Association President. "We are now calling on it

and the rest of Texas to meet an even greater demand as events in the Middle East have again forced us to dip into our declining reserves. Unfortunately, the price for Texas oil is inadequate to stimulate enough exploratory drilling to replace reserves."

Knox County landowners and others with mineral interests received \$812,513 in royalty payments last year. Texas received \$297,782 from crude oil production taxes and \$1,888 from gas production taxes.





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

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of October, according to Sergeant J. W. Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$26,115.00. The rural accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1970 shows a total of 52 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 16 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$61,345.00. Traffic wise, November and December are noted as dangerous months for pedestrians. During November and December of 1969 in Texas, there were 86 pedestrians killed and 885 injured in collisions with motor vehicles. Texas Draft Is 489 Men

Austin - The December draft call for Texas is 489, and local boards will fill the call with men with random sequence numbers 1 through 160, insofar as possible. Colonel Charles M. Duncan, acting state Selective Service director, said Monday. He stated, however, that this does not mean that registrants with numbers higher than 160 may not be needed by some local boards. Colonel Duncan stressed that under the new Executive Order signed by the President September 21, 1970, all men in 1-A, 1-A-1, or 1-B on December 31, 1970, with numbers lower than the high number reached this calendar year by their own local boards will be assigned to the Extended Priority Selection Group to be called during the first quarter of 1971. FARM-CITY WEEK IMPORTANT TO ALL
The period from November 20-28 is National Farm-City Week and every citizen has a stake in its observance. Nowhere else in the world, points out Chas. K. Baker, Extension economist, do so many depend on so few for their food and fiber needs. The 5 per cent of our population engaged in agricultural production gives the other 95 per cent benefits unsurpassed anywhere, says Baker. In 1969 we spent only 16.5 per cent of our incomes for food as compared with 24 per cent some 20 years ago and this despite the fact the producer is getting about 9 cents less out of every food dollar than he received 20 years ago. Production expenses have continued to rise, thus, keeping the cost-price squeeze a major problem for agricultural producers. Our producers, says Baker, are continually searching for better and more efficient ways to keep the food and fiber supply lines filled. Today the U. S. farmer produces enough food and fiber for 45 people, about 39 at home and 6 abroad. A decade ago he supplied the agricultural needs of only 24 people. Other problems of common interest to farm and city residents are also cited by President Nixon in his Farm-City Week proclamation. He said, "With two-thirds of our population crowded into only two per cent of the land, many of our people are denied economic opportunities, adequate living space, health, cultural fulfillment, and those spiritual values without which no nation can achieve greatness. The time for action is at hand - for careful plans to be formulated, and for decisions to be made at local governmental levels, to foster the improved distribution of population and accompanying economic activity needed during the decade of the 1970's and beyond. The government can provide assistance, but the effort will succeed only as Americans take part in developing a policy of sound national growth. "In this effort, city dwellers and rural people alike have reason to work together toward common goals. The well-being of urban America and the welfare of rural America will increasingly intertwine as our total population expands. Better living in the one depends on better living in the other. "I request that leaders of agricultural organizations, business groups, labor unions, youth and women's clubs, civic and fraternal asso-

ciations, schools and others join in noting not only the interdependent roles of the producers and consumers of America's agricultural abundance but also their opportunities for cooperation in building for the future."
Farm-City Week observances in Texas will follow no set pattern but the objective of all will be the same - to help rural and urban residents understand each other's problems and further develop the appreciation each should have for the other. In other words, we just couldn't get along without each other.

"3.76 in '70"

Also to improve the power and performance of Texas agricultural products in the market place and bring greater confidence in the future to the state's farmers and ranchers.

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

Are you getting ready to retire?

Wayne Klipping, social security manager in Vernon, has some tips that may help save you time and trouble when you apply for your social security benefits.

A telephone call to the social security office is a good first step. Someone there can answer your questions and tell you how to apply and when to do it.

When you apply, bring your social security card or a record of your social security number, proof of your age, and your last year's income tax return and evidence of payment of the self-employment contribution if you are self-employed.

If your wife also is applying for benefits, she should bring evidence of her age and her social security card or a record of her number if she has one. The best evidence of your age is a birth or baptismal certificate made within 5 years of your birth. However, if these are not available, other documents may be used. Generally, the older the document the better. If you have children under 18 - or youngsters between 18 and 22 who are full-time students - bring their birth certificates and records of their social security numbers.

It's generally a good idea to apply about 3 months before you retire. The people in the social security office will be glad to help you get the necessary information.

If you are housebound and unable to come to the office, your application can be completed by telephone or by mail. If necessary, someone can come to your home. Just let the social security office know. "Remember," Klipping concluded, "the people in the social security office are there to help you."

Tax Man Sam Sez:

April 15 is the deadline for filing your income tax return. If you owe additional taxes, waiting until April 15 might be good business. However, on January 1 about 2/3 of the taxpayers have a refund coming to them from Internal Revenue. The taxpayer can't file until January 1 and Internal Revenue can't send out his refund until they get his tax return, Form 1040. The taxpayer must also wait until he receives his Form W-2 from his employer. It is usually good business for all taxpayers to gather their records and figure their income tax as soon as possible after January 1. Even if you owe money and don't have the money to pay, you need to know. If

you know on January 1 that you will owe a lot of money on April 15 you can come a lot nearer raising the extra taxes owed than the fellow who waits until 11:59 p.m. on April 15 to figure his tax. It is always good business to find out where you stand as soon as possible.

Uncle Sam Selective Service

(Editor's Note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards regarding recent changes in the lottery system. The answers are by Lt. Colonel Charles M. Duncan, Acting State Selective Service Director, 200 W. 9th St., Austin, Texas.)

Q - My random sequence number is 185 and my local board reached number 187 in 1970. I was classified in class II-B on February 1, 1970 and remain in that classification. What will be my situation in 1971 when my II-B expires?

A - You will go into the First Priority Selection Group for 1971 when you are no longer in a deferred status.

Q - My number is 175 and I am in class I-A. My local board reached number 152 during 1970. What is my situation for 1971?

A - On January 1, 1971, you will be placed in the Second Priority Selection Group because your number was not reached.

Q - My number is 146 and I'm in I-A. My local board reached number 154 during the year. What is my situation for

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
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
