## Church Leaders Oppose Liquor-By-The-Drink

Church leaders have voiced strong opposition to Liquor-By-The-Drink, according to the "Christian Crusader," publication of Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education.

The semi-monthly publication quotes Dr. T. A. Patterson, Executive Secretary of the 1.8 million-member Baptist General Convention of Texas as saying that Liquor-By-The-Drink would increase drinking with a corresponding increase in crime and traffic accidents, deaths, and alcoholism.

A statement by five Texas Methodist bishops says, "Liquor-By-The-Drink is a 'quick drink' and brings alcohol closer to the steering wheel. We believe the 'quick drink' can be the most dangerous enemy to safe driving we have yet faced."

Church of the Nazarene leaders issued a statement saying, "We join with the concerned people of Texas in urging our people to stand opposed to the Liquor-By-The-Drink and Race Track Gambling referendums to be presented to the people of Texas on May 4th."

Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education (TANE) is a non-profit educational organization supported by Texas churches of several denominations.

## Latin American's Viewpoint Presented To KC Lions Club

"We did not wake up to the real potential of Latin America until our own nation was endangered severely by Cuba a few years ago. More recently have we seen riots by Puerto Ricans in Chicago and New York City. I hope and pray we shall see no more of that." These words were spoken by Lazaro Garcia of Ballinger as he addressed the Knox City Lions Club luncheon on Wednesday of last week.

Mr. Garcia was in Knox City helping with the School of Missions held last week at The First Baptist Church.

Born and reared in Raymondville, Texas, he was licensed to preach at the age of 16. He began pastoring as a sophomore in high school and has been pastoring for 22 years. He attended the University of Corpus Christi and Wayland Baptist College at Plainview. He received the B. A. degree from the University of Corpus Christi with a major in Bible and minor in Spanish. He has preached crusades in New Mexico, Old Mexico, Bolivia in South America, Panama, and Puerto Rico, as well as Texas since 1948. Mr. Garcia is presently working for the First Baptist Church in Ballinger.

Speaking to the Lions on "Latin America As I See It", the text of his speech is related here.

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"Fifteen years ago I spent

30 days in Mexico preaching from El Paso, Texas, all across Mexico to Mexico City staying in that city the last 5 days of my monthlong tour. Three years ago I spent 3 weeks in the heart of South America in the country of Bolivia. That same year I went to preach 8 days in Panama residing that time in Panama City. Two years ago I preached in Puerto Rico, which is a commonwealth. I shall speak to you from experience basing myself on 3 C's.

My first C is Crisis. There is economical crisis in Latin America. We do not wonder at this when 25 countries South of the Border have over 300 million population; Brazil alone has more than 80 million, is the 8th largest country in the world, the second in the Western hemisphere, the United States

being first. Bolivia is the poorest country of South America. I shall give you an example. In Bolivia the water is turned on every other day at 4:30 in the morning for one hour and water has to be collected in containers and receptacles for 2 days' use.

In our country we have over 30 million who speak Spanish; Texas alone has more than 3 million; and to sum it up, many people and not enough work for all creates unemployment and poverty. In Mexico, the average per working man per year is \$100.00 in American money while in Bolivia it is much less and it is the 5th in size in South America. In Texas many families earn less than \$3000.00 a year, and I worked with a Latin American family not too long ago in which the mother had given birth to 27 children. A man and his older children have a hard time supporting a family of this size.

There is also a political crisis in Latin America. One of the greatest factors is Communism. The Communist Youth Movement is very strong; you know what is happening in Panama today in relation with our flag, we have lost Cuba, we are about to lose Guatemala, and Communists have their universities in many parts of South America. I saw their destruction of the glass windows in the college of science of the University of Mexico, one of the most modern buildings in the Western hemisphere. I, per-

sonally, toured a communist university in Bolivia.

The Latin American feels the effect of domination while the Communist offers freedom and idealism which are unreal and Latin America is taking it in. In Texas the Latin American is surviving from the results of political unrest. I will say nothing about politics in our state and nation.

There is, also, a moral crisis in Latin America. Morals are low but conditions are conducive to it.

The worst of all, there is a spiritual crisis in Latin America. Latin Americans are grasping for something that satisfies. They are desperate. This condition is due to superstition and to ignorance of the truth among many other factors.

There is hope — in Texas the Latin American is no longer one who will continue to work for others. Now he is educated even through sacrifice. We have doctors, lawyers, teachers, professional and business people, and even women doctors. Baptist of our hemisphere are launching in 1969 the Crusade of the Americas to offer Christ to the masses. The purpose will not be to use force nor make anyone change his or her religion. It simply will be to offer the very One who made us and is the only One qualified to change our heart.

In closing, Christ is the only hope for Latin America; He is the only hope for our hemisphere or we shall be wiped out beyond a shadow of a doubt in 3 to 5 years if we pass Him by and heed not to Him."

## Farm Fly-In Proposes Better Solutions

Edward Smith and Lyle Stodghill were among 130 members of a Farmers Union Young Farmers "Legislative Fly-In" which completed four days in Washington urging attention to problems of agriculture, particularly those of the younger generation of farmers.

Members of the Fly-In group visited with government officials and called at House and Senate offices explaining the "better solutions" offered by Farmers Union to some of the major farm problems of the day.

The young men, from the states of Texas, Minnesota, Wisconsin and South Dakota, emphasized the need for major farm legislation such as the permanent extension of the Agriculture Act of 1965, extension of the Food for Peace program and legislation to give farmers more effective farm bargaining power.

The Farmers Union group registered its views in favor of improvement of the crop insurance program and also urged adoption of the Metcalf bill to prohibit non-farmers from using farm operating losses to reduce their income tax liability on other income.

The final event of the four day schedule was an intensive two-hour tour of the Gillette Research Institute in Washington, D. C. and the men saw research on 100% cotton goods. Also blends in the way they are treated for wash and wear and perma-press.

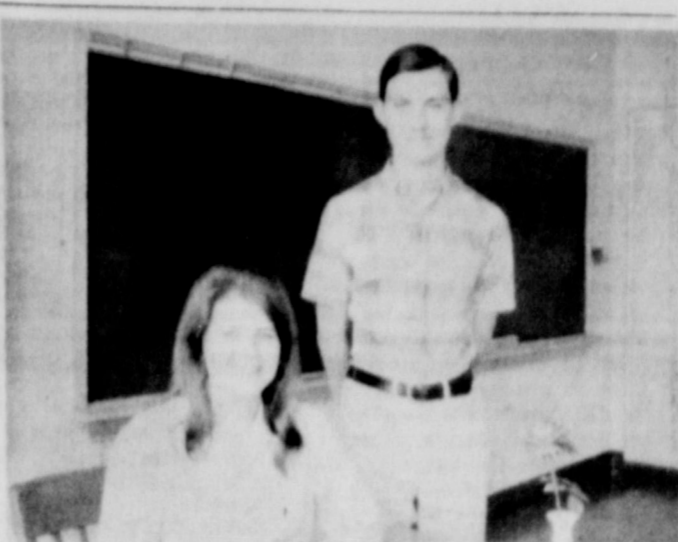
**Tornado Season Is Approaching**

C. O. Layne, State Coordinator of Defense and Disaster Relief for the Texas Department of Public Safety, is reminding Texans that the peak tornado season is approaching.

"Statistics from the United States Weather Bureau's State Climatologist indicate that Texas again led the nation in total tornadoes last year, with an all time record of 232," Layne said. The 1967 figure compares with the 77 twisters confirmed in the State during 1966.

Only two months in 1967, January and November, were free from tornadoes. September accounted for more than half with a total of 124. Of the September tornadoes, 115 occurred in connection with Hurricane Beulah. There were two twisters in February, 11 in March, 17 in April, 34 in May, and 22 in June. Other totals includes July with 10; August, five; October, two; and December, five.

A circular of tornado safety rules has been prepared by the Department of Public Safety, and is available.

## Farm and Ranch News

### ESSAYS FOR REGISTERED GILT DUE APRIL 26

Knox County boys or girls interested in swine production are encouraged to check on the 4-H Sears Roebuck Foundation registered gilt program.

The eligibility age is 9 years to the junior class in high school.

An agreement form should be obtained from the County Agent. A short essay is to be written 75 to 300 words and submitted to the county agent by April 26, 1968.

The weaning age registered Duroc gilts are to be distributed at a date to be set early in May.

### PEACH INSECT CONTROL

There's really no secret to producing peaches which are worm-free at harvest time. But if you want them that way, now is the time to take action.

The insects which produce the worms can be controlled if a good spray program is carried out. Once the insects get a start and worms get into the peaches nothing can be done.

To do an effective job of controlling peach insects, trees should be sprayed when 75 percent of the petals have fallen from the blooms. Then 10 days later when the shuck splits, three more spray applications at two-week intervals should follow the chuck-split stage spraying, making a total of five spray applications.

As for the spray, the county agent suggests using either methoxychlor or malathion. These materials are readily available from feed and seed stores, drug stores or other firms which handle insecticides. Combinations of insecticides and fungicides may be used on fruit trees and make excellent sprays for use on peaches.

A control program for one tree in the backyard or many in an orchard is not only feasible but very practical. He invites persons interested in such a program to contact his office for detailed information on spray formulas. He further cautions that all insecticides should be used in accordance with label

instructions and with care.

### RECOMMENDATIONS FOR WEED CONTROL

The 1968 revision of recommendations for weed control in Texas is now available.

Good weed control, he adds, can increase yields, provide better quality crops, and reduce weeds by preventing weed seed production. Herbicides can provide cheaper weed control than hand labor. In test plots, it was found that preplant or preemergence herbicides cost from \$2.50 to \$8.00 per acre, while hand labor averaged between \$12 and \$14 for hoeing. The herbicides protected the crops from weed competition during emergence and early growth, while the untreated fields were weedy all season.

One test of postemergence treatment with herbicides applied to control small careless weeds in grain sorghum showed an increase of 880 pounds of grain per acre. The income from the extra grain paid all costs and gave a nice net profit.

Certain mixtures of herbicides are available as pre-emergence treatments in grain sorghum, peanuts, and soybeans in 1968.

The bulletin, B-1209, "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chemicals", is available from the County Agents office. It is a joint Texas Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Station publication.

The recommendations of the 35-page bulletin also include suggestions for spray equipment, information on herbicide application on non-crop site and cropland in fallow and ponds and lakes.

### Gas Milage Increases For Family Car

Sixty miles per gallon in the old family bus? Sound impossible?

Not according to Bob Cahill and Bob Checkley, Chrysler engineers, who are heading up Chrysler-Plymouth's effort in the 3000-mile 1968 Mobil Economy Run which begins April 2 at Disneyland and ends in New York City, April 7.

"I don't recommend it as a daily practice," said Cahill, veteran Economy Run driver and four-time class winner in the event since 1961. "But, in an emergency, when your gas gauge is on empty and not a station in sight, it might be just the thing you need to keep the car going until a gas station is found."

"And the technique certainly won't be used on the Economy Run," offered Checkley, who drove a 1967 Plymouth Valiant to over-all run honors last year with a 24.57 miles-per-gallon average.

"Let's assume you're off the freeway on open highway," said Cahill, painting a verbal picture. "Your gauge is on empty and you're sweating out that next station. Immediately start cruising at 30 miles per hour. Turn off the ignition switch, put the car in neutral, and coast the car till it reaches 20 miles per hour. Start the car again with the ignition switch, put in drive and accelerate to 30 miles per hour. Put in neutral, turn off ignition, and coast to 20 again. Keep repeating

this procedure until you find that gas station."

"If this technique is repeated for a long period of time," said Checkley, "there's no doubt your car - assuming it's in the popular-priced category - would be averaging 60 or more miles per gallon."

"Contrary to what most drivers believe," Cahill said, "best fuel economy in the popular-priced car is achieved in the 25 to 30 miles-per-hour range. For example, a 1968 Plymouth Valiant Six with manual transmission has the capability of 30 miles per gallon or better at 30 mph steady speed with a careful driver."

"Most Economy Run entries achieve excellent mileage," Cahill said, "but the average driver could take his own comparable family car and achieve even better mileage if he really was willing to work at it."

He said greater economy mileage could be obtained in several ways:

"Thirty pounds pressure in all tires is one of the easiest and simplest ways to improve mileage," Cahill pointed out. "If it's fuel economy you're after, keep optional power accessories at a minimum."

"New car break-in is very important," Cahill said. "Economy Run cars are allowed only 1,500 miles break-in time. The average owner can break in his car 3,000 or 4,000 miles and this will certainly result eventually in greater fuel savings."

Cahill will drive a 1968 Plymouth Valiant V-100 in this year's event while Checkley handles a Valiant Signet V-8. They are shooting for a 12th consecutive class victory for the Plymouth nameplate. Other Plymouth entries include: Plymouth Barracuda Six, Plymouth Satellite Six, Plymouth Satellite Eight, Plymouth Fury 111 Eight, Chrysler Newport and Chrysler New Yorker.

Overnight stops on the Run include: Grand Canyon, Arizona; Colorado Springs, Colorado; Kansas City, Missouri; Indianapolis, Indiana, and Washington, D. C.

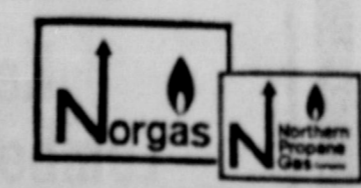

## Knox Co. Bond Sales For Feb. Show \$22,359

During the month of February the sale of United States Savings Bonds and Savings Notes in Knox County totaled \$22,359, according to a report received today from Mr. W. E. Braly, Chairman of the Knox County Savings Bonds Committee. The January-February sales totaled \$33,957 and 21 per cent of the 1968 goal of \$160,000 has been achieved.

Texans purchased \$15,461,584 in Savings Bonds during February which is an achievement of 8.4 per cent over the same period of 1967. Year-to-date sales in Texas totaled \$31,804,412 and this is 17 per cent of the state's goal of 185.4 million.

## Doctors Bill For Medicare Ins. Increases

The premium for the doctor bill insurance part of medicare increases from \$3 to \$4 in April, Edwin Draughon, social security manager, today reminded older people in the 5 county area serviced by the Vernon office.

Persons 65 and over who are enrolled for the supplementary medical insurance and receiving monthly social security benefits will find the checks delivered to them April 3rd a dollar less than last month's payment, Mr. Draughon said. For an elderly couple receiving a combined benefit check, the reduction will be \$1 each, or a total of \$2.

All social security benefit check amounts were changed last month, he noted, as a 13 percent benefit increase became effective. The amount of the increase in benefits was considerably more than the \$1 by which the medical insurance premium is increased.

The Government will continue to match the increased premium, so the doctor bill insurance will continue to be worth twice the amount of the premium paid by the individual older person.

The medicare law provides for the periodic review of the costs of the medical insurance program, Mr. Draughon said, and for any necessary adjustments in the premium rate.

The following elements accounted for the \$1 increase in the rate, beginning with April: About 20 cents to finance the program at the level of the past 18 months, recent estimates indicate that the protection provided by the program was worth \$6.40 per month during the past period, and the premium rate therefore should have been \$3.20.

About 23 cents for the increased benefit protection provided by the 1967 amendments. About 27 cents to cover the expected increase of about 5 percent per year in physicians' fees.

About 11 cents because it is expected that people under medicare will use more ser-

April is Cancer Control Month in Texas. Governor John Connally signed this official proclamation in special ceremonies at the State Capitol recently. On hand for the occasion were the President of the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society, Dr. Robert V. Walker of Dallas, and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Pardee of Bryan. In his proclamation, Governor Connally called cancer one of the most urgent health problems faced by mankind. He noted that cancer will claim more than 15,000 Texans this year, but that 1,500,000 Americans are alive today, cured of cancer. Governor Connally saluted the volunteers of the American Cancer Society for their work. He

said the Society's programs are necessary for the final conquest of cancer. Bryan resident, Jack Pardee, representing one of the 1,500,000 Americans who have been cured of cancer, was present for the signing. Mrs. Pardee, who accompanied her husband to Austin, is an officer in the Brazos County Unit, and is the first Lifetime Pledge of the American Cancer Society. She said her reason for volunteering as a Lifetime Pledge is very simple: "I work for the American Cancer Society because I feel it is the only way I can contribute to finding a cure for cancer."

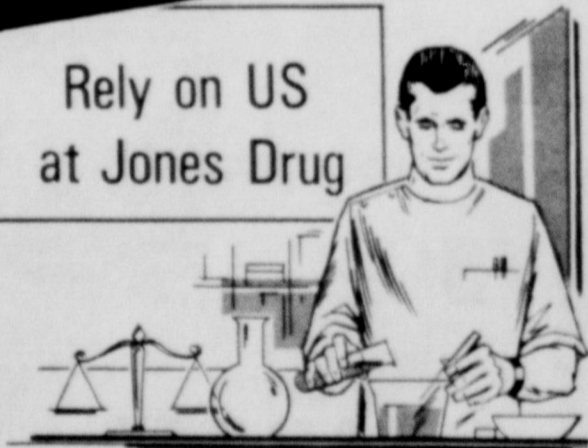
