Cornerstone Dedication Begins Sunday With Registration; Program At 2:30

The dedication of the old cornerstone of the first permanent Knox County Courthouse will be held Sunday, October 8 at Benjamin.

According to Mrs. C. C. Hoge, chairman of the Knox County Historical Survey Committee, registration will begin at 2 p.m. in the Assembly Room of the Courthouse, and refreshments will be served.

At 2:30 p.m. the program will begin in the District Courtroom of the Courthouse. The dedication ceremony and the unveiling of the historical marker

will be at the site of the marker at the south entrance of the Courthouse.

Thumbnail Sketches Of County's First Officials

In 1885 a few families had settled in the area where Benjamin now stands.

Hilliary Bedford had bought a section of land and was ranching on the section in addition to a lot of land which was open country in the north part of the area. In the early part of 1885, Mr. Bedford and some of the other ranchers decided to organize a county and name it Knox in honor of General Knox of George Washington's cabinet. Until this time, Knox County was attached to Baylor County for judicial purposes.

The first Knox County officers to serve were J. J. Truscott, Judge; J. W. Oxford, T.

The group ordered lumber and built a two-room box and stripped house and this was known as the "Courthouse". This soon proved to be too small, and another two rooms were added. The population had increased so by 1891 the citizens decided to build a permanent courthouse.

Native stone was found to be plentiful in the county south and west of Benjamin and this was quarried and used in the building. It was the pride and joy of the early settlers.

Officials serving in 1891 included J. J. Truscott, Judge; W. H. Benedict, T. P. Reeder, J. A. Spinks, G. B. Stewart, Commissioners; and T. D. Isbell, Sheriff. These names were engraved on the corner stone which was taken out and left on a vacant lot after 1935 when the present Courthouse was built.

City, County Participated In Library

Announcement is made this week by Mayor J. E. Reeves of Munday and County Judge, Sam Clonts, that the City of Munday and the County will support the City County Library in Munday and that each has set up an equal amount in their budgets to pay a salary and office rent for this much needed project which will serve the entire County.

The Munday United Fund has included the Library in their budget for the last several years and has provided the library with new books. They have also included the Library in their 1968 budget again this year. This money is to be used only for the purchase and repair of books.

The Munday Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture is coordinating this program and are assisting the Mayor and County Judge in creating a new Library Board of Directors who will have full authority over the Library and its functions.

The Chamber will soon select a new office which will house the Library and share rent on the building, however the Library will be a separate unit with a competent person to supervise the Library's activities.

Adequate shelving will be available for the 4875 volumes now on hand with additional space provided for its growth.

Since April 1st, this year, 2,678 books have been checked from the Library. During the school term, students and teachers from area schools use the Library extensively. More than 6,500 volumes are checked out annually.

The Library is a very important part of any community, and has been recognized as such by the officials of each of the supporting and participating agencies.

Through this joint effort they have expressed their desire to see the Library serve a greater number of people as well as to offer increased library services to the entire county.

The Munday Chamber will continue to give their support to this project and is very elated over the development of the library since they have been responsible for its activities for many years.

James Hopkins Finishes Active Duty Training

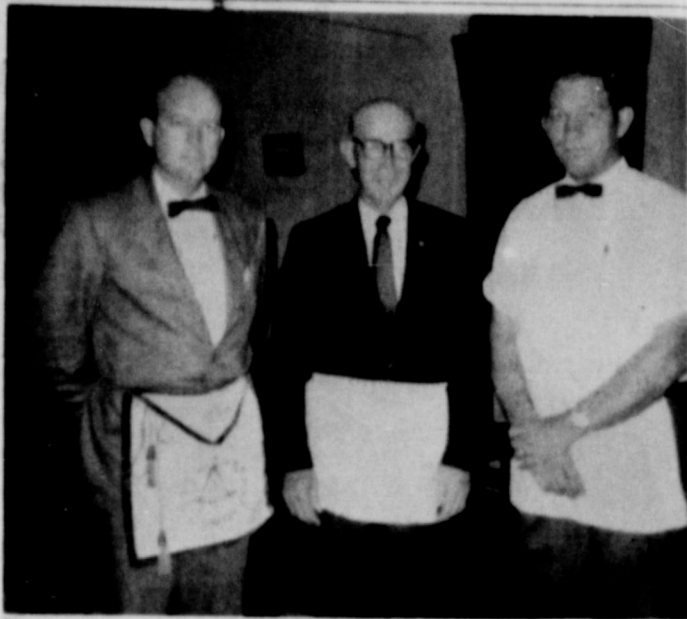

Emergency Power Plant Donated To Hospital

Lyndol Cypert, Administrator of the Knox County Hospital announced this week that an emergency electrical power plant has been donated to the hospital by Roy A. Baker of Ruidoso, N. M. Mr. Baker is a former resident of Knox City, and while here on a visit earlier, in the year, learned that the hospital was without adequate emergency power facilities and offered to donate a 5 kilowatt plant that he no longer needed.

County Commissioner George Nix went to Ruidoso and picked up the plant, and it is now in the basement of the hospital. An engineer from the

West Texas Utilities Co. and K. C. electrical contractor, Doyle Graham, are working out plans to hook up the emergency plant into the present wiring of the hospital in order to get maximum benefit from its power.

The emergency power plant was built for the U. S. Army in 1944. When Mr. Baker acquired it some years back, it was still crated for overseas shipment and had never been run. It is still in almost new condition, having run only a few hours. It is powered by a 4 cylinder gasoline engine and is a compact self-contained unit only weighing about 600 pounds. The estimated value of a new unit such as this one purchased today is about \$1250.00.

The Hospital Board members and the citizens of this area are deeply grateful to Mr. Baker for this timely gift.

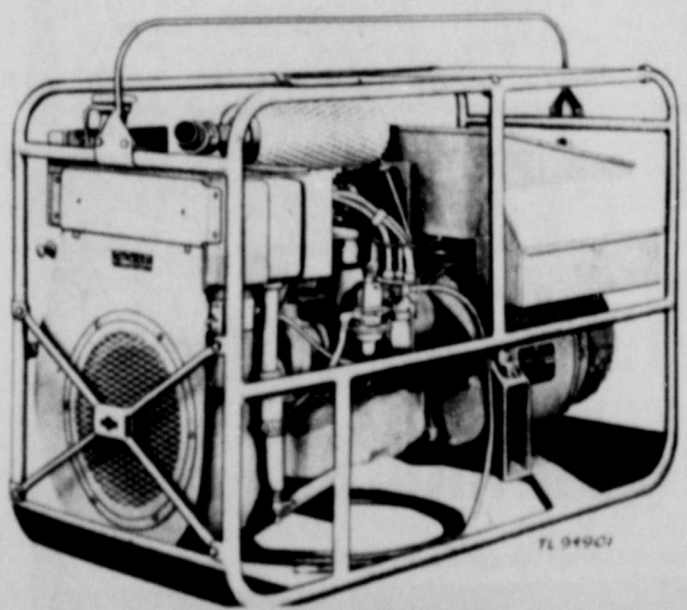


DIAGRAM OF POWER UNIT

PFC. David A. Gentry Killed In Vietnam Friday

Word was received here Sunday night of the death of Pfc. David A. Gentry, who was killed in combat Friday, September 29, in Vietnam. Details as to where and how he was killed are unknown at this time.

David was born December 21, 1945, in Shawnee, Okla., and moved to Knox City with his parents eight years ago. He married Miss Janis Hall of Benjamin on July 25, 1964.

His parents are Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Gentry, who reside on East 4th St. here. Mr. Gentry is associated with Cities Service Oil Co.

David began school in Wynona, Oklahoma. He attended the Knox City Schools and was a 1964 graduate of the Benjamin High School.

He entered service on March 28, 1966, and took his basic training at Fort Bliss, Texas. He later trained at Fort Benning, Ga., Fort Gordon, Ga., and Fort Bragg, N. C.

David went to Vietnam on May 20, 1967, as a member of the Special Forces, Green Beret. He was wounded on June 8 and was returned home July 15 for a 30-day leave. He returned to Vietnam on August 8, 1967. He served with the 101st, Screaming Eagles, Airborne Division of the United States Army.

Survivors include the wife of Benjamin; one daughter, Kimberley Shawn, 2, of Benjamin; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gentry of Knox City; one brother, Jackson Lee of Knox City; a sister, Mrs. Marva Sue Vincent of Arlington, Texas; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Ora Brogdon of Oklahoma City; his paternal grandfather, S. J. Gentry of Seminole, Oklahoma; and several aunts and uncles.

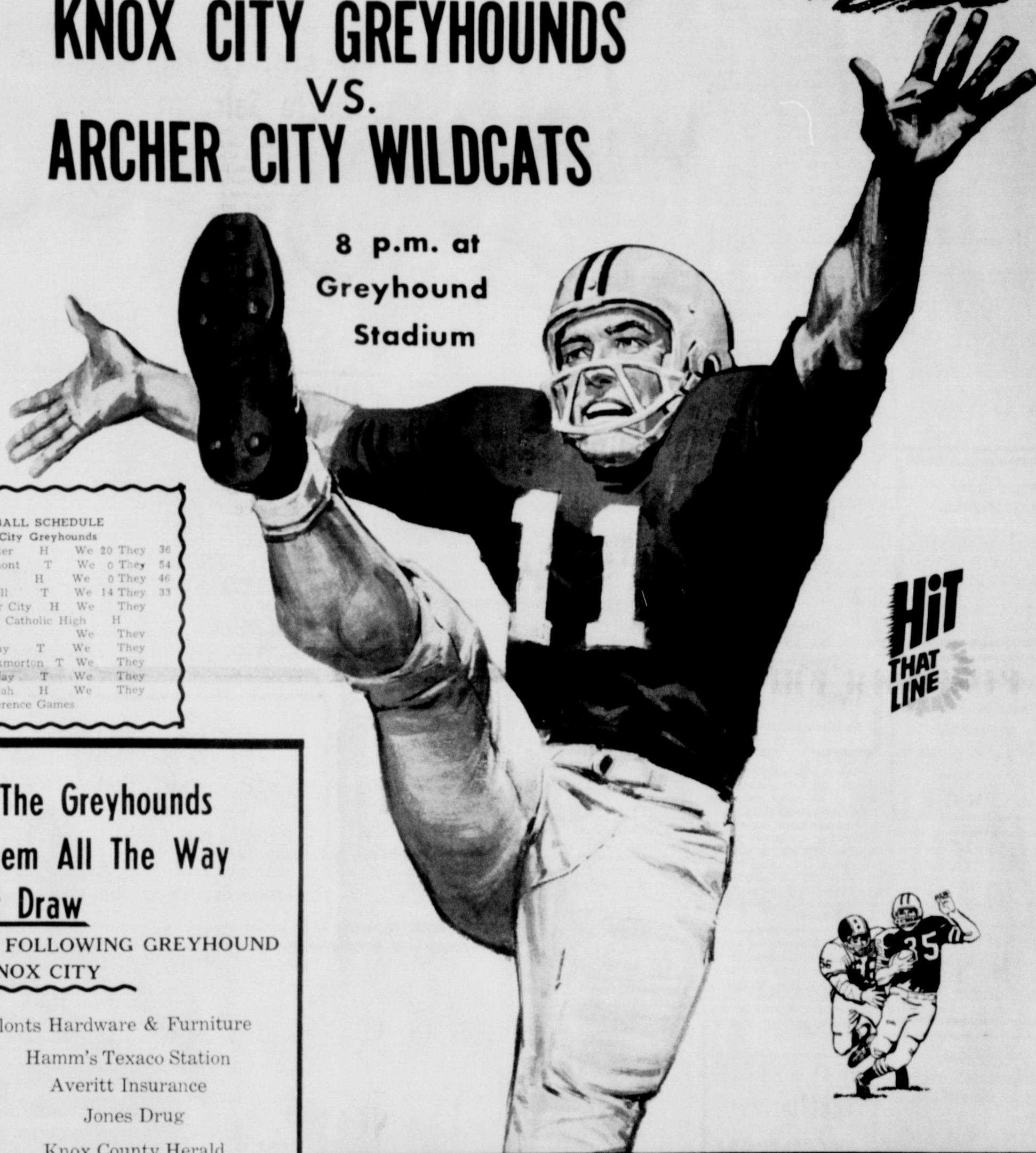

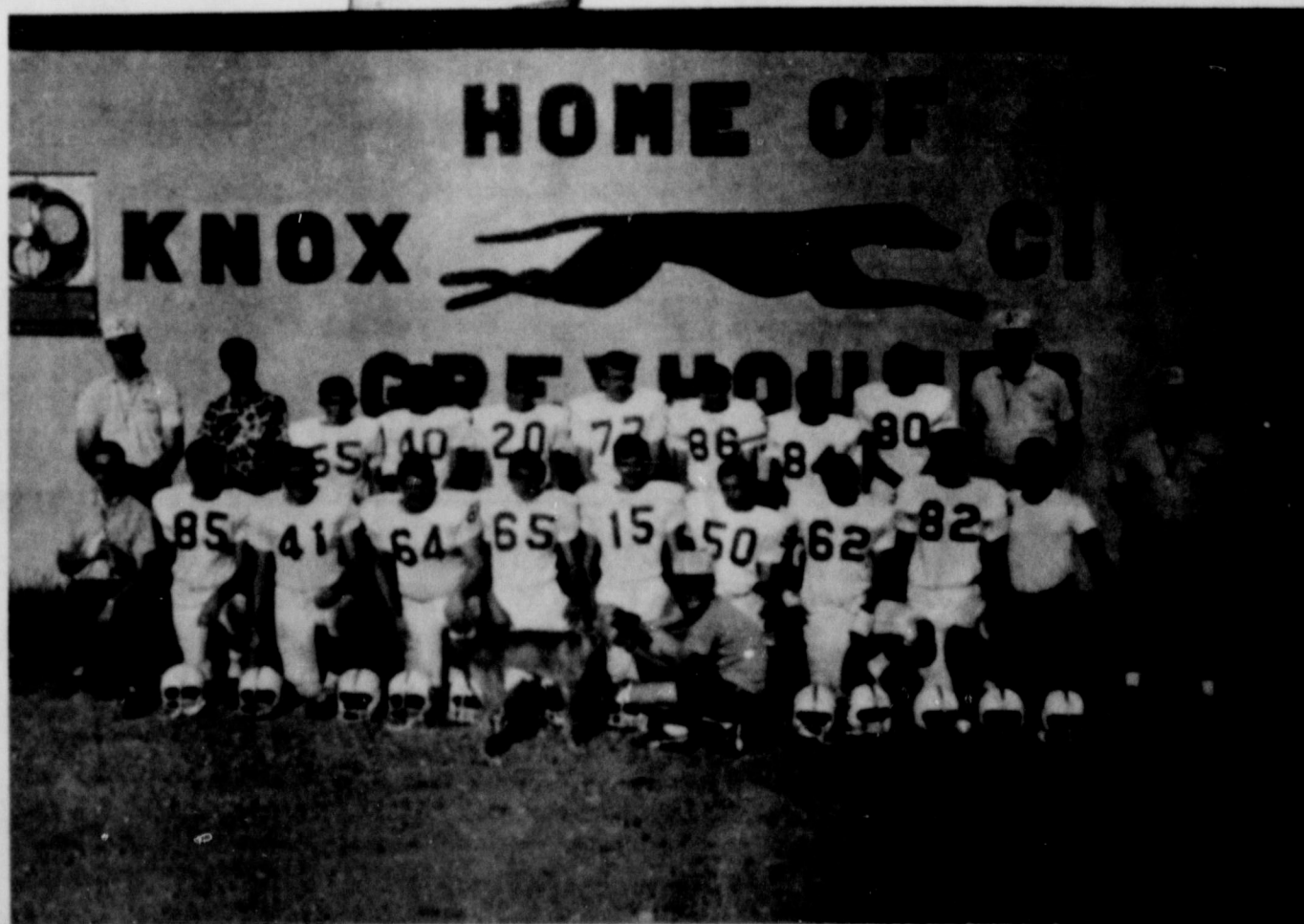

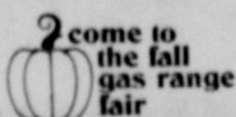

mittes set about to have the old Corner Stone repaired as none of the names were completely legible. It was first taken to Lueders, and after the firm decided they could not engrave it satisfactorily, it was taken to Austin. The firm there could not restore it, either, and it was then the committee decided on the next best thing, to use a plaque and set the corner stone at the base of it.

It is through the financial help of M. J. Spinks of Dallas, son of the late J. A. Spinks, that the committee will be able to dedicate the Marker Sunday in honor of the early officers who moulded our county into the fine one that it has become.

The wording on the marker reads as follows:

Original Old Rock Courthouse Cornerstone Erected in Benjamin in 1891, When the Officials of Knox County Were: J. J. Truscott - Judge W. H. Benedict, T. P. Reeder, J. A. Spinks, G. B. Stewart, Commissioners T. D. Isbell - Sheriff Rock Structure, Replacing Wooden Courthouse of 1886, Was in Use Until 1935. Incised in base. PRESENTED BY M. J. SPINKS, DALLAS, (1967).



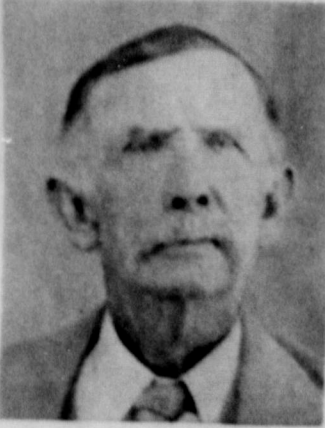
J. A. SPINKS, Commissioner

J. A. Spinks and his wife, Nancy came to Knox County from Mississippi in 1881. He had served in the Alabama infantry as a private during the Civil War. They were among the first settlers in the Cottonwood community.

They built a home out of hewn logs from hackberry and cottonwood trees in the area. They fenced their garden with buffalo bones after selling all they could to buy supplies. They helped to change a wilderness into a land of plenty. They were charter members of the Seymour Methodist Church.

Mr. Spinks served as Commissioner from 1886 to 1892. They were the parents of nine children. One of their children, M. J. Spinks of Dallas is responsible for the erection

of the Historical Marker.



W. H. BENEDICT, Commissioner

W. H. Benedict was a native of Little Rock, Arkansas. He moved to Knox County in 1886 and settled near the community of Hefner and was the first person to try to cultivate land in the county. Later he established a small store and by wagon freight from Seymour he supplied the few settlers with their needs. He married Miss Allie Florence Bennett in Arkansas and moved to Knox City when the town was organized. Mr. Benedict helped to organize the first bank in Knox City. They were the parents of six children of whom three survive. They are Grady Benedict and Mrs. Mabel Pysatt, both of Knox City, and Mrs. Ruth Kelly of Austin.

He served as Commissioner from 1887 to 1891.

G. B. STEWART (No Picture Available) G. B. Stewart was born on a plantation in Mississippi in 1855. He moved with his family by wagon train to Texas, first to Grayson County in 1884, then to Baylor County, and on to Knox County in 1885. He was one of the founders of Benjamin. He helped to organize the Christian Church in Benjamin. He was serving as Commissioner when the old Rock Courthouse was built, in 1891.

He was a brother of the late Mrs. J. J. Perry.

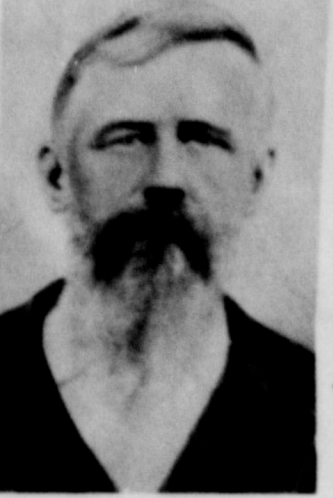


T. P. REEDER, Commissioner

T. P. Reeder and his family moved to Knox City from Baylor County in 1886. He bought a section of land south and west of Knox City. When the town was organized, Mr. Reeder gave 50 acres to the townsite. He was a native of South Carolina

and came to Texas when he was 24 years old. He taught school in Young County before moving to Baylor County. He married Miss Artemesia Scott in Seymour in 1880. They were the parents of four sons, all deceased. Two daughters survive. They are Mrs. Mary Vaughan of Knox City and Mrs. Pearl Sawyers of Edna, Texas.

Mr. Reeder served as Commissioner from 1887 to 1891.



T. D. ISBELL, First Sheriff

T. D. Isbell was the first sheriff of Knox County, serving from 1886 to 1894. He moved to Knox County from Tarrant County, Texas, with his wife and four daughters, Ann, Ellen, Maud and Fannie. Maud is the only one now living, and is a patient in the Knox County Hospital.

After moving to Benjamin, he built a home near the old rock jail. Here a son, Tom was born. He, too, is deceased. In 1888 Mr. Isbell laid off the Courthouse Square. He served as sheriff from 1886 to 1894. The family lived in Munday for a number of years.

Lee Isbell of Munday is a nephew.

J. J. TRUSCOTT (No Picture Available)

J. J. Truscott was the first County Judge. At the first meeting of the Commissioners' Court, he was ordered to buy the necessary books to keep the records of the new county. Mr. Truscott moved to the north part of the county and began to take an active part in the settlement. He dug the first water well in the area and several families hauled water from it. Water has always played a large part in this part of Texas. He moved to Knox County in 1882 and served as Judge from 1882 until 1892. The town of Truscott was named for him.

Farm And Ranch News

RECOMMENDED DESICCANTS FOR COTTON

Cotton Producers planning to harvest with a mechanical stripper have two desiccants to consider using this year. Other chemicals which may be considered are not approved by label for this purpose.

Perhaps producers who have not applied desiccant to cotton may want to check on results of early applications to decide which to use.

The two materials approved by label and rates approved for use are: (a) Arsenic acid, usually 75% has been effective. From 3/4 quart to 1 1/2 quarts per acre depending on the size of the cotton.

(b) Paraquat, from ortho, has label approval this year. One to two pints per acre.

Cotton should be fully matured and if possible 80% to 90% open when desiccant is applied.

Safety directions should always be read on all chemicals, and in case of arsenic acid there are many precautions to take. Both human and livestock damage or death may result from failure to follow directions.

COTTON STALK DESTRUCTION RECOMMENDED

Boll weevil populations remain heavy in many fields in Knox County. County Agent Herman H. Collier advises that stalk destruction soon after harvest, along with plowing under the debris will reduce the number of boll weevils entering diapause.

By cutting off the food supply of the boll weevil, this insect is not able to build up sufficient fat reserves to enter diapause or will enter diapause in a condition whereby it will be unable to survive the winter. To be most effective the program should cover a wide area.

In some areas where arsenic acid or phosphate types desiccants or defoliants are used because of early maturity of the cotton, the addition of 0.5 lb methyl parathion of 0.25 lb of Guthion per acre to the defoliant will be helpful in reducing boll weevil populations. Care should be taken not to add these insecticides to chlorate defoliant.

Stalk destruction as soon as possible after harvest will destroy the source of food for the boll weevil. In situations where there are still squares and small bolls left on the cotton plants, flail type shredders will kill a high percentage of the

larva and pupae of the boll weevil that are in the squares and bolls. Plowing under will kill even more of the larvae. Even though arsenic acid is very dangerous, there has been a false report circulating about listing acid use on bale tagging. A few producers have heard this false report and thought this would automatically cut the price of their cotton. This cotton will still be sold by its grade rather than being tagged separately.

Producers should keep in mind excessive amounts of any chemical may be a reason for grades to be damaged.

Individual producers may want to test both these materials, taking into consideration, safety, cost and possible grade differences.

As all mechanical picker harvesting producers know these materials are not used for this type of harvesting. Materials such as the organic phosphorus compounds DEF and Folex and also chlorates are often used as true defoliants in preparation for harvesting.

In case of heavy leaf growth many times light application is used to thin out enough to allow more sunlight in large cotton.

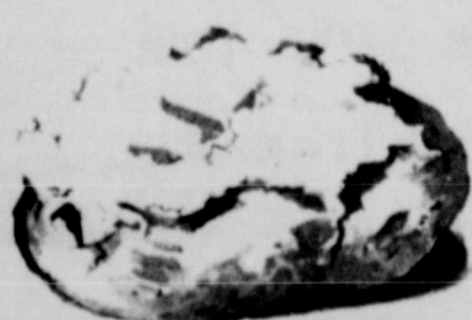

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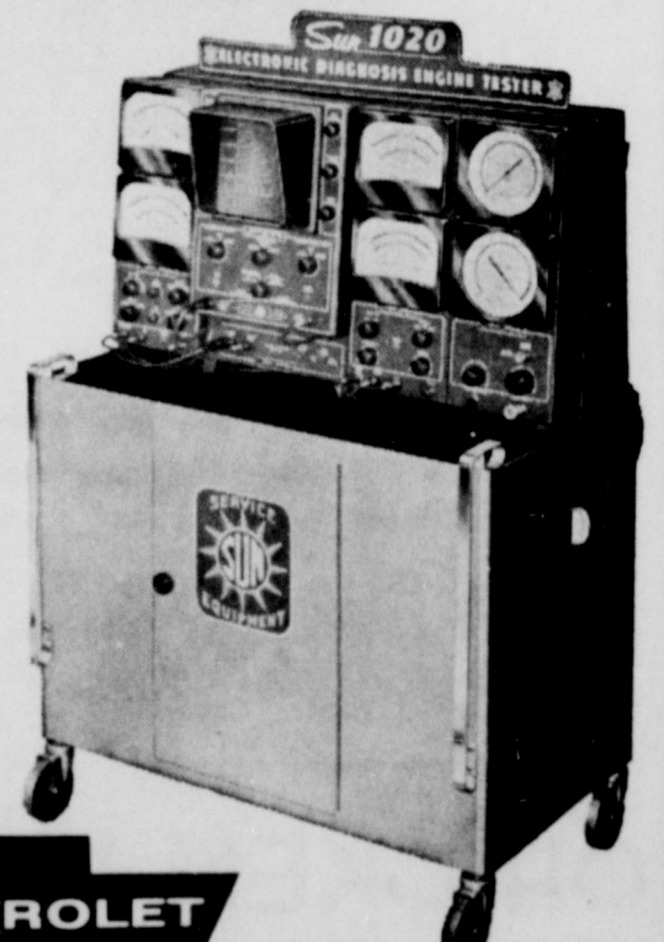
