Absentee Voting Begins April 13

BAIRD — Any qualified voter of this state who expects to be absent from the county of his residence the day of the election, or who because of sickness, physical disability or religious belief cannot appear at the polling place in the election precinct of his residence on the day of election, may cast his vote, either by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office or by voting by mail.

A qualified voter who because of sickness or physical disability, or because of religious beliefs, cannot appear at the polling place on the day of the election may make application for an absentee ballot by mail. If the voter expects to be absent from the county on the day of election, he may vote at the County Clerk's office beginning on the 13th of April, and ending on the 28th of April.

A voter must request a ballot to be mailed out of the county and to be voted out of county if they expect to be out of the county on the day of the election, and cannot vote at the Clerk's office.

ELECTION RESULTS FOR AREA

BAIRD

Incumbents Jimmy Godfrey and Jerry Loper defeated Jon Hardwick to retain their positions in the City Council election held Saturday. Godfrey received 156 votes, Loper 169, and Hardwick 105. Mayor J. L. Ault was re-elected mayor. Unopposed, he received 228 votes out of the total cast of 231.

School Board

Three positions were filled in Baird Independent School Board election. Bruce Williams received 171, Jimmy Cauthen 146 and Mrs. Randal Ivy 145. Mrs. Ivy and Williams were incumbents. Bill Cason was defeated by a very narrow margin - receiving

142 votes and Jack D. Harris got 166. There were several write-in votes: J. W. Evans 2, Tommy Holland 7, Terrell Williams 2, and Charles Reeves 1. In the race for County School Trustee, Ben Russell unopposed received 85 votes.

CLYDE

All incumbents were unopposed and re-elected to the Clyde City Council and School Board Saturday. In the School Board election 92 votes were cast. Weldon Edwards received 89, Lyston Blanks 89, and Leo Chrane 88.

In the City Council election, 52 votes were cast. A. G. Black received 51, M. M. Tabor 51 and Ed Craig 51.

EULA

Incumbents Hilton Tarrant, with 33 votes, and Melvin Faircloth with 44, won the two places in the School Trustee election, over Bill Johnson, who received 29 votes.

For County School Trustee, Ben Russell, running unopposed received 29 votes.

CROSS PLAINS

Two incumbents, Tommie Harris with 163 votes, and Dr. Carl J. Sohns with 147 votes, were re-elected to the School Board, defeating R. C. Merryman with 78 votes. The total vote was 202. In the County Trustee vote, J. H. Cox was unopposed and he received 178 votes.

In the City Council election,

Mayor Doyle Birchfield was re-elected with 104 votes out of 125 cast. Incumbents won in the Council election over V. L. Hobdy's 66 votes. Raymond DeBusk received 89 votes and T. T. Nichol got 78 votes.

MORAN

In the Moran City Election, Jay Baughman, W. J. Porter and Raymond Thornton were elected. Out of 52 votes cast, Baughman had 42, Porter 44 and Thornton 45.

In the School Trustee election, Clovis McCollum was elected with 60 votes, Robert Tonne had 81 and Joe Branham got 68. Don Boyette was defeated with 56 votes. There was one write-in vote and 92 votes cast in all.

Callahan TV Cable Service Co. Begins Hooking Up Cable in Baird

BAIRD — Callahan TV Cable Service will begin connecting up TV cable in Baird Thursday, April 9th.

April 15 is the deadline for free installation. Effective April 15, the Company will start charging \$7.50 installation fee. If you desire additional outlets in your home, the cost of installation is \$4.50, thereafter the monthly charge is \$1.50 per month. Service charge is \$6.00 per month for first outlet.

If you have one outlet, the charge for the first month will be \$7.50 for installation fee and \$6.00 for the service charge, bringing the total bill for the first month to \$13.50. After the first month he bill will only be the \$6.00 service charge.

If you have two outlets, the service charge for the first outlet will be \$6.00, plus an additional charge of \$1.50 for the second outlet, bringing the total to \$7.50.

The lines are up in the area

west of the Court House, and these will be the first ones hooked up. No homes north of Interstate 20 can be hooked up at this time, because permission to put a line across IH 20 has not yet been received.

Student Transfer Deadline June 1st

CLYDE — Superintendent L. F. Newton is now receiving requests for transfers of students who are not residents of the Clyde Independent School District. Requests for transfer of students is made to the school to which the student is transferred and not to the County Superintendent. This request must be made by the parent or guardian and must be made in person at the office of the superintendent.

Deadline for parental request for transfer this year will be June 1. No extension to this date will be allowed except in extreme emergency. State law establishes this deadline date and no local exception may be made.

Parents of any child who attends school in a district outside of their resident district must make this request for transfer even if they attended school in the receiving district the previous year.

ALBANY — Arthur Kay Lidia, 70, died at 12:05 p. m. Thursday in Shackelford County Hospital after a lengthy illness.

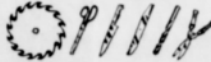

THERE IS UNITY IN CHRIST

Two can be united without having unity. This is evident in many marriages. A man and woman are united, but they are far from having unity. One could tie the tails of two cats together and have them united, but it would not result in unity.

Religious unity cannot be attained merely by uniting religious groups in common causes and upon the basis of agreements among men. True Christian unity can be attained only in Christ.

Ephesians 4:3-6 gives us the scriptural basis for unity in Christ. It cannot be attained in diversity of organization. The Bible says, "There is one body." (verse 4). This one body is the church of Christ Paul said (Eph. 1:22,23). So to attain the unity which God intended, and which Paul teaches, one must be added to the church which the Lord himself established (Acts 2:47). If he belongs to any other, he separates from the very union which he needs (being a part of the body of Christ).

The basis for unity in Christ is the recognition of the one Spirit (verse 4) by which God's will has been revealed unto us (John 16:13). Unity is to be attained in one hope (verse 4).

Verse 5 tells us that unity is to be had by recognizing "one Lord," holding to "one faith" and practicing only "one baptism." The one Lord is Jesus Christ (2 Pet. 3:18). There is no other head of the church (Col. 1:18). The one faith is the ancient "faith one delivered unto the saints" (Jude 3). Anything not as old as the New Testament cannot result in true unity in Christ. Anything that has been introduced into worship or practice since the Apostles causes division. The one baptism is "for remission of sins" (Acts 2:28), and is a burial in water (Col. 2:12). Any other baptism cannot unite men in Christ.

Men do not object to the idea of only one church of Christ. It is the denominational idea of many churches which causes division. Following the teaching of the one Spirit of God brings unity; it is adding to, subtracting from and substituting in the place of these teachings that brings division. It is the teaching of many "faiths" and the practice of many "baptisms" that brings division; not the preaching of the faith delivered to the saints, nor the practice of the one God-given, Bible-commended baptism.

On September 1, of last year, the Texas Legislature adopted a year-round inspection program thereby making future deadlines due one year after the current month of inspection and establishing an anniversary month for each vehicle.

New inspection stickers are placed on the left hand side of the windshield, with the number of the current month of inspection appearing on each sticker.
