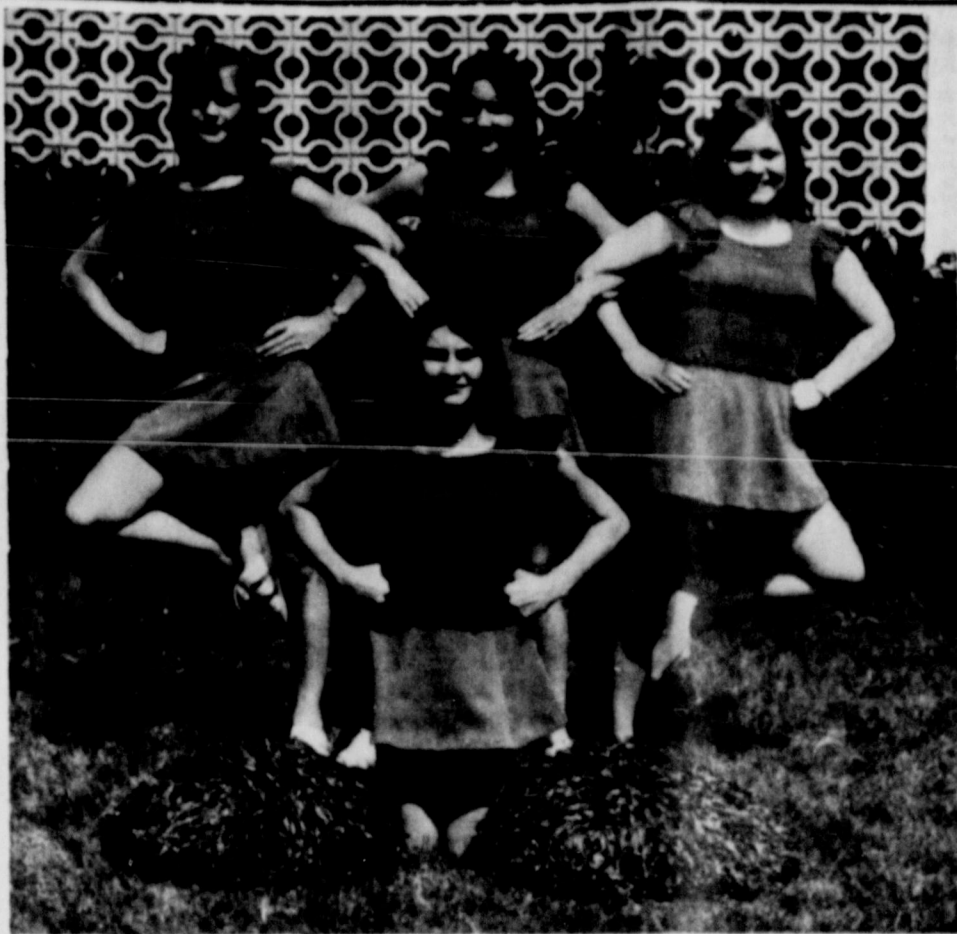
According to head majorette Pam Skiles, the group received special instruction in the areas of UIL ensemble routines, dance routines, struts, fanfares and tricks.

**Disabled Children Eligible For SSI**

Benefits payments to disabled children under the Supplemental Security Income program administered by the Social Security Administration may not be understood by the general public, particularly the parents or guardians of such children, according to Carl R. Beisner of the Vernon Social Security office. Children of any age, even infants, may qualify for monthly disability checks under a federal program referred to as SSI. This program replaced the State public assistance programs providing assistance to the aged, blind, and disabled.

In order to qualify for such benefits the child must meet the definition of disability as stated in the law and must have little or no income or resources. All SSI payments are based on need and the eligibility of children under 18 can be affected by the income and resources of their parents regardless of how severely disabled the child may be. The law assumes that a child shares in the income and resources of his parents. The amount of income, as well as the size of the family, would determine how much, if any, of the income or resources would have to be considered as belonging to the disabled child. The basic amount of the monthly Supplemental Security Income payment for one person is \$157.70 per month, but can be less depending on other income the individual might have. In the case of a disabled child, any income he might have as well as that of his parents could affect the amount of the monthly payment. Once the disabled child reaches the age of 18, or 21 if they are in school, the income of his parents is no longer considered in determining the amount of payments.

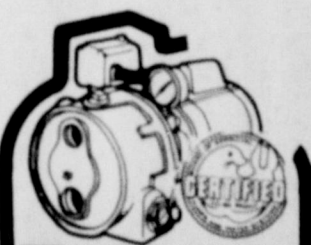

## Use Of Yard Light Is Discouraged

DALLAS-Natural gas companies are being urged by the Federal Energy Administration to voluntarily stop promotion of the energy-wasting gas lamps used to decorate lawns across the nation.

"A decorative gas lamp burns 18,000 cubic feet of natural gas a year, or as much energy as is needed to provide an average family with hot water for six months," notes Delbert M. Fowler of Dallas, FEA regional administrator.

Fowler said generating and delivering electricity for a 60-watt electric bulb for 24 hours requires less than 17,000 BTU's of fuel energy. The equivalent gas light uses three times that much.

Two other factors pointed out by Fowler are that the electric light can easily be switched off when not needed, while most gas lamps burn 24 hours per day. Thus, if a light is used five hours an evening, the net energy saving is almost 14 to 1 in favor of the bulb.

Replacing gas lamps with electric bulbs could save an estimated 32,000 barrels of oil daily, enough to heat 600,000 homes for a year.

"This doesn't seem like a tremendous amount of saving, but with the shortage of natural gas every little bit of saving is important," Fowler said.

It is estimated there are four million decorative gas lamps in the United States.

spirit that is so prevalent indicates to me that the fault lies not with the people of Knox County but with the administering agency; namely yours truly, for lack of education and proper explanation of what the Blood Program is and how it functions.

The Knox County Chapter must meet all blood needs of all persons living in Knox County.

All blood is donated voluntarily without compensation. Blood is neither purchased nor sold. Neither a hospital nor a physician can sell blood or blood products. In essence your hospital furnishes blood and blood products free of charge. We must pass on certain fees which are enumerated as follows:

**Blood Processing Fee--**  
(1) The blood is processed to see that it is free of harmful pathogens or in other words to see that it is free of bacterial or viral disease.

**Crossmatching Fee--**  
(2) The blood is crossmatched, in other words the collected blood is tested to see that it is compatible with the blood of the person who is to be transfused.

**Administration Fee--**  
(3) A sterile, disposable package of equipment used to infuse the blood from container to patient, which can be used only once.

Blood has a short storage life--only 21 days, and to compound the problem there are eight different types of blood. Unfortunately, we never know how much or what type of blood the patient will need. Since there is no computer linked to a crystal ball, it becomes necessary to use population and past usage figures. Based on this information we need 82 pints donated on Wednesday, July 23.

The patient, whether a loved one, friend, or stranger, whose life hangs in the balance depending on blood being available doesn't make the choice as to the timing of his or her need. The need may occur during planting season, during irrigation season, during harvest time, during a holiday season, or any other time and all too often it becomes too convenient to find it inconvenient to take the time to donate a pint of blood.

Please support your community by making the time to donate a pint of blood and while enroute to the blood-mobile pick up at least one neighbor and see that he or she donates a pint of blood.

I'll see you Wednesday, July 23, at the First United Methodist Church between 1:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. We can make our quota.

# About Your Social Security

Quarterly wage reports and social security contributions for household workers are due by July 31, according to Carl R. Beisner of the Vernon social security office.

"People who pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in any three month quarter must send a report of the wages, along with the social security contribution, to the Internal Revenue Service within one month after the end of the quarter."

Quarters are January-February-March, April-May-June, July-August-September, and October-November-December. Wages Reports and social security contributions for the second quarter of 1975 are due by July 31, Mr. Beisner said.

People who employ household workers may file the wage report on a form available at any Internal Revenue Service Office--"Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees (for Social Security)." The social security contribution for a household employee is 5.85 percent of covered wages, and the employer pays a matching amount.

Social security contributions help build retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare protection for workers and their families. People who employ household workers can get a free copy of the leaflet, "Social Security and Your Household Employee," at the Vernon social security office at 1701 Cumberland.

# John Taylor Named Top Press Official

To unify the Texas Press Association as a more viable force for protection of the free enterprise system in Texas is one of the hopes of new TPA president, John C. Taylor.

During installation of Texas' top press post at an El Paso convention, Taylor, publisher of The Seguin Gazette, told attendants:

"Newspapers historically have provided the visual evidence of the power of our free enterprise system.

"Today, newspapers are faced with the ever-increasing challenge of protecting that same system."

The new TPA president has been publisher of The Seguin Gazette for the past 20 years. During that time, he expanded The Gazette into the Trans-Texas Publishing Company, the first central printing plant south of the Dallas area. It publishes a large number of other newspapers and printing pieces. The Gazette was also the first newspaper in South Texas to convert to the rotary press offset method of printing in 1960.

A native of Gonzales, Taylor was a high-scoring star in basketball and foot-

ball at Gonzales High School and the San Marcos Academy. He was offered a chance to play football at Texas A&M University, but entered the U.S. Marines to serve during World War II.

Reading newspapers during his extensive travels with the Marines, Taylor became interested in newspapers and decided that here was the place to acquire a writing know-how, something in which he had been interested for many years.

Taylor has been very active in Rotary Club, Boys'

Club, Seguin Youth Center, American Legion, Seguin Elks Lodge, Chamber of Commerce and Jaycees.

The new Texas Press boss has been a director of the huge and expanding Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority for several years, having been first appointed by Governor Preston Smith. Recently Governor Dolph Briscoe re-appointed him to a six-year term extending to 1979.

Taylor's wife, Juanita, holds a very active part in publication of The Gazette and in operation of the publishing company.

She also is executive director of the franchised "Miss South Texas," "Miss San Antonio" and "Miss Austin" scholarship programs. This makes her representative of the "Miss America" program in Central Texas.

Taylor has six children - Nancy is now Mrs. Ron Watts, of Dumas; Beth, living in Munich, Germany; Kay, who works for a newspaper in New Mexico; and Johnny, Marilyn and Lisa, all of whom are attending school in New Mexico.

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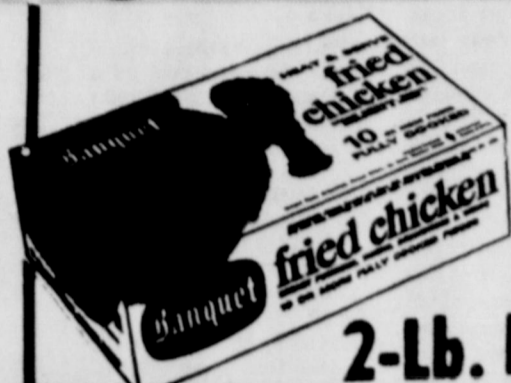

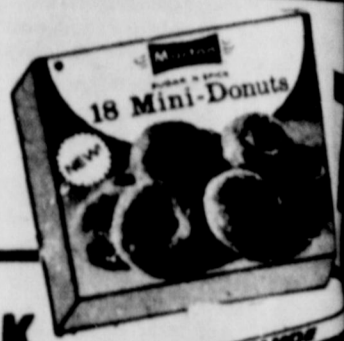
