OUTLINE OF PLAN OF PROPOSED OIL POOL SYNDICATE NOW BEING PROMOTED BY LOCAL PARTIES

So many inquiries have been made concerning the pooling plan for a test oil well here, that the promoters have requested us to explain the plan so that every one will be familiar with it before the meeting which is to be held in the opera house Saturday at 2:30 to discuss the feasibility of organizing. In the first place it is to be a home company financed if possible by home capital. The block of land as planned will be 25,000 acres and will represent \$1.00 per acre as capital and an additional sum of \$100,000 cash stock will be sold to home people as far as possible, and to others if necessary. That will bring the capital stock to \$75,000. All dividends to be in proportion to whatever interest a member may have acquired in the company, either by land or cash.

GARNER OPINES AT PROPOSED DEBT SETTLEMENT

"The world do many" and the politicians have a hand keeping their feet from slipping from under them. Just now Representative Garner has shied at the administration plan of handling the allied loan, which now amounts to about twelve billions of dollars. He claims the present plan is the first step in giving the big loan to Europe. And that is just probably the kind of settlement desired by the big business interests of this country. If they could get this stupendous sum refunded to Europe they would enjoy a revival of commerce at once, a procedure that would bring millions to them. What they want is a chance to handle the world's products and change a big commission for doing so. They care nothing for giving away twelve billions of the tax payers money. But the tax payers would rather endorse business for a while until Europe can recuperate her lost fortune in some other way than a gift from the United States. It might create a more ready market for American products, but it would be a false prosperity indeed, to give Europe money with which to buy our goods so we can enter a big commercial war. For shelter, they were turned out again into the mountains and the bitter winter, because there was no room for them and only sufficient supplies left for the 10,000 orphans in that section. How many of them later died from exposure, no one knows."

Burial Most Common Practice.
 There are two ideas of the proper disposal of the body when its spirit has fled—one that it shall be preserved so long as possible, the other that it shall be destroyed by the natural process of decay or by fire. The word funeral, meaning "drawn out" in the Latin from which it is derived, marks a universal tendency in its ceremonial.

Egyptian Embalming.
 Among the ancient Egyptians, whose civilization was the earliest we know about, embalming was practiced by all who could afford it for their dead. It required some ninety days, the body being steeped in natron 70 days, then washed inside and out, and treated with cedar oil, after which it was enveloped in linen bandages—of a cost of about \$2,500. A cheaper method cost \$200. How effective mummies in many cases are after thousands of years.

Legends Ascribe Slaying of... of the Rhine to Heroic... Christian Maiden.

One of the most conspicuous mountains near the Rhine is the historic Drachenfels, or Dragon's rock, named from that legendary monster of the Rhine, which was both the scourge and terror of the region. The legend of the hero, Siegfried, who slew the monster, and became invulnerable by bathing in its blood, has been immortalized in song and story. Another myth, however, makes the slayer of the dragon a young woman.

According to this tradition the beast came down the mountain daily, seeking whom it might devour. The Romans decided to curb it by taking a prisoner to the dragon's cave daily. One day a girl, so pretty that two centuries resolved to fight to see who would claim her, was taken prisoner. The Roman general interfered and decided that to settle the affair neither should get her, but that she should be given to the dragon. This was considered in the army as a decision ranking with the judgment of Solomon.

The girl, a Christian, was taken to the cave, and the monster soon appeared. The beast howled, smacked his lips and rattled its scales like rattlesnakes. The girl drew forth a crucifix, which she displayed to the beast. It stood still, petrified with horror, then with a roar that made the mountain tremble, fell back down the cliffs and was dashed to pieces on the rocks below.

Bird Tacticians.
 The bobwhite (commonly called quail) is a notable tactician in deception. The bird is physically helpless in the face of danger, possessing no weapons. POLO PLAYED FOR CENTURIES

Game is Known to Have Been in Existence for More Than Two Thousand Years.

During its existence of more than two thousand years there have been twelve varieties of the game of polo. The earliest form known was primitive, consisting of foats of horsemanship and skill. The early Persian form described in Shamma was a highly organized game with rules, played by four on each side. In Persia, in the sixteenth century, the grounds were 300 by 170 yards, and the play resembled the rough football of the same period in England. This game became more highly organized in the next century.

The Byzantine form played at Constantinople in the Twelfth century used a leather ball the size of an apple and a racquet. The Chinese game, in vogue about 600 A. D., was played with a light wooden ball. The Japanese form, popular in feudal times, still survives under the name of dakin, or ball match.

In an ancient Indian variety the sides are ranged up on opposite ends of the grounds and the ball is thrown in. This is probably the form of the game which reached India from Persia and is represented today by Manipur and Gligit polo, though these forms are rougher than the old Indian game.
