## Emergency Feed Requirements Not Changed, Gilpin Says

J. T. Gilpin, supervisor of the Knox County PMA office, said Wednesday that present indications are that orders for emergency feed will not have to be reprocessed, as it appeared earlier this week.

Directives from Washington had set forth strict requirements for the relief feed, specifying that an applicant must have less than a 30-day supply of feed on hand and must not have the financial ability to remain in business unless he could purchase the low-cost feed.

While Gilpin and other PMA men were at a meeting in Childress Wednesday afternoon, however, a telegram was received apparently relaxing the requirements and leaving the program about like it was.

The earlier orders had drawn a howl of protest from stockmen all over the state.

So far the local PMA office has delivered seven carloads of cake, Gilpin said, and three cars of cake and three cars of oats are on order. One carload of corn and a carload of cottonseed meal will probably be ordered within the next few days, he added.

Gilpin believes the good rain here last week will ease Knox County stockmen's need for government aid.

The Knox City area got its rain Saturday—a 4.87 inch gully-washer that flooded the streets, entered several homes, washed out roads and bridges—and put cotton and feed crops in good shape.

Gently-falling showers Thursday and Friday had added up to .78 inch, and Saturday's downpour brought the week's total up to 5.65 inches, and the total for the year to 14.82.

The rain began in the early morning and continued until noon. Bar ditches were soon overflowing and streets and highways were flooded. Many automobiles—mostly people out to revel in the rain—were drowned out in the bumper-deep water.

The water pouring in from the south edge of town washed down some cement-block fences and flooded several homes.

All over the area, roads and bridges were washed out. West of town, where the rain was reported to be between six and seven inches, stock tanks—dry for many months—filled to overflowing and several ranchers reported broken dams.

The west approach to the new Brazos River bridge, which was scheduled to be completed this week, was cut through by a ten-foot-deep washout. The old bridge was made almost impassable by washed out approaches.

At Union Grove, where the rain was more than six inches, the creek ran over the bridge and broke the pavement at the east end, but the break was quickly repaired.

Northeast of town, near the Jobie Denton place, mail carrier C. E. Williams drove his car into an innocent-looking water hole that proved to be a deep wash-out. The sandy road continued to wash under the car and the water continued to rise, and Williams had to abandon the vehicle. The water level soon rose to above the seats in the car.

The rains Saturday covered an area about 75 miles wide and 200 miles long, bounded roughly by Stephenville on the east, Benjamin on the north, Jayton on the west and Brownwood on the south.

The heavy rain just missed the Benjamin Lake watershed, and the lake caught little water. In Benjamin, the rain measured 1.75 inches.

Despite the washed-out tank dams, broken terraces and a few washed fields, the rain was of untold benefit to farmers and stockmen in this section. Many farmers believe the area is assured a good cotton and feed crop.

Ranges will also be benefitted greatly, but according to soil conservation technicians, good management and more rains are necessary to put the grassland back in good shape.

### Bond Assumption Election Scheduled Here Saturday

Voters in the Knox City school district were reminded this week of the Bond Assumption election to be held in the Egenbacher Implement building Saturday, July 25.

The proposition before the voters will be whether or not the Knox City district will assume a \$23,102.30 share of the bonded indebtedness of the Munday and Sunset districts, which have been consolidated.

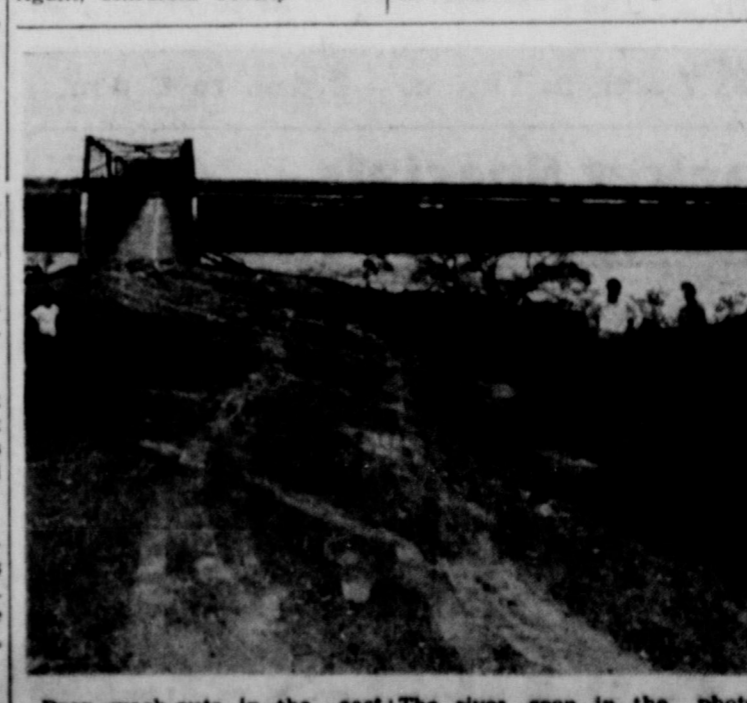
School officials pointed out that the proposition must carry if Knox City is to keep the 6,567 acres of the Munday district that was annexed to the local district in April.

To be held in conjunction with the bond assumption election is a Tax Equalization election, to spread the Knox City district's \$1.50 tax rate over the annexed territory. Officials pointed out that this is also a matter of form and the proposition should carry. While the district only assesses and collects \$1.25, the \$1.50 maximum rate has been approved for several years.

C. C. Hoge was appointed judge for both elections, and clerks are E. R. Carpenter, Roy Baker and C. J. Bohannon.
