

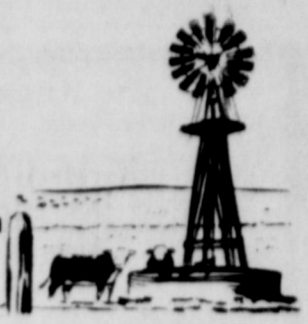

Resurfacing Begins Here On Several City Street Blocks

Knox City residents will note this week that work on some of the city streets has begun. According to City Secretary Charles Lankford, the city council approved the plan calling for the resurfacing, or seal coating to some 31 city blocks at a cost of approximately

\$7,000.00.

Contract has been awarded B & L Construction Company of Aspermont and work is to begin immediately. Some city streets were resurfaced two years ago and plans call for some improvements each year.

This year work includes the

resurfacing of eight blocks on Waco, more familiarly known as Canal Street which carries the bulk of water through town; also on East First Street, three and one-half blocks; one block on the street running parallel to the high school building; on East Fourth Street, the 600 block; on East Fifth Street, blocks 100, 200, 500, 600, and 1100; on East Sixth Street, blocks 100, 200, 300, 400, 900, and 1100; on East Seventh Street, blocks 700 and 800; on East Eighth Street, blocks 800, 900, and 1100, and on McAuley Street, one block from the Monday Highway south to East Fifth Street.

Mr. Lankford said that these improvements are being made possible by the additional revenue to be received shortly after October 1 as the result of the City's one percent sales tax voted on here last December 16 by residents. He explained that improvements were being made to the streets most in need of repair at this time and as mentioned above, annual repairs are being planned for,

According to the high school principal, Ward Cooksey, registration for the high school students will begin at 9:30 a.m. Friday, August 30.

The schedule is as follows: Seniors, 9:30 to 10:30; Juniors, 10:30 to 11:30; Sophomores, 1:00 to 2:00; Freshmen, 2:00 to 3:00.

The local area chairman for the eighth annual Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children has been appointed by Charlie Morris of Abilene, general chairman.

Named to correlate the work of stockmen of this area in meeting the goals of the Round-Up is Lee Smith.

The Round-Up, to be held September 30 at Abilene's Ranchers and Farmers Livestock Commission, annually raises approximately 1/3 of the non-profit Center's annual budget of some \$370,000.

Morris pointed out that WTRC officials are looking forward to a particularly good Round-Up this year to "take up some of the slack in our belts."

"We stockmen like to think that the WTRC is here for our convenience, because we care enough to support it. The stockmen of the Southwest haven't ever let us down yet, and we don't expect them to this year."

He noted that construction is now under way on a new \$107,000

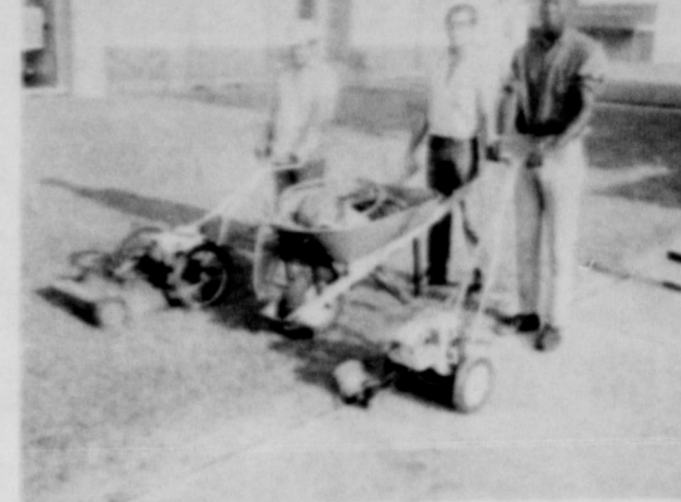

Dove Season Opens Sunday

Hunters - remember the starting hour for shooting that first dove will be at 1 p.m. Daylight Saving Time, when dove season opens Sunday, September 1. This starting time will continue until reversion to Central Standard Time on October 27 when it will start at 12:00 noon. Hunting hours close at sunset. Dove season lasts through Oct. 30.

The dove population is reported to be good this year and there seems to be adequate food to hold the birds in this area until you get a chance to shoot them. The dove limit is 12 per day and 24 in possession. The best time to hunt usually is in the late afternoon and grain fields.

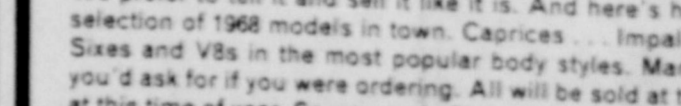

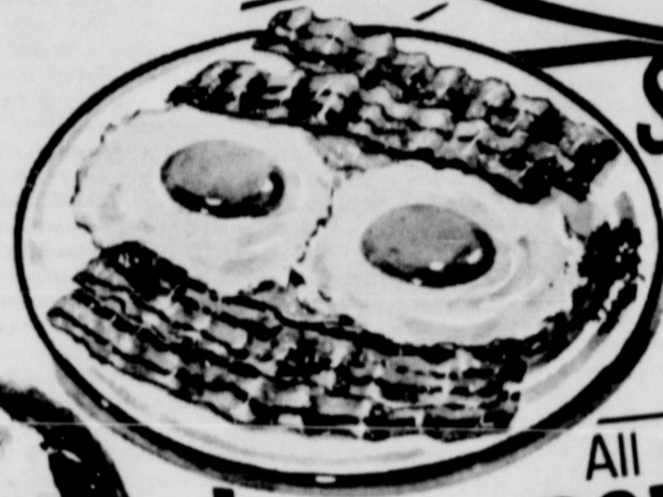
