About 40 percent of married women now work in jobs covered by social security compared to 30 percent in 1960, according to Carl R. Beisner, social security representative for Knox County. Almost 19 million married women have jobs outside their homes compared to 12 1/2 million in 1960, according to the U.S. Department of Labor. Nine out of 10 jobs are covered by social security.

Working women build social security disability, survivors, retirement, and Medicare protection for themselves and their families. More married women work now than in 1960 because families are smaller and there are more jobs for women and more day care facilities for children.

Monthly social security benefits can be paid to a wife on her work record even if her husband keeps working, and if a woman has worked long enough under social security and retires, becomes disabled, or dies, her children can be paid benefits on her record until they're 18-or until 22 if they're full-time students and remain unmarried.

Half of all retired women get monthly social security retirement payments on their own record, according to Beisner.

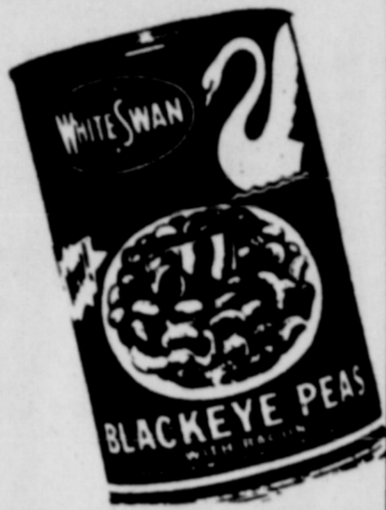

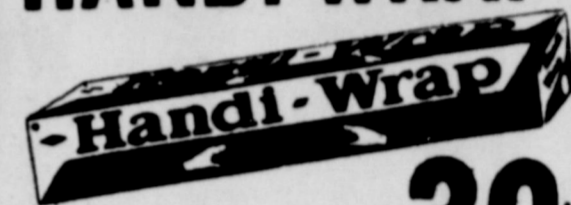
