Wheat Harvest Is Near End, Prize-Range Outlook Good

Wheat and guar were planted this spring. Most of the cotton is up and growing rapidly, and the farmers' only concerns are a hail storm, a washing rain, or insect infestations.

Area stock farmers and ranchers report that the native and sudan pastures are as good as anyone could ask for, the water is plentiful, they are satisfied with the price on cattle, and their only complaint is the below average prices on oats and wheat.

City Grain reported a yield of 49 to 50 bushels per acre, with a moisture content of 13.05 to 13.15 percent. The average market price on wheat this week was \$1.18 per bushel, a decrease of 10 cents as compared with a year ago.

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Second Annual Knox County Cotton Queen Pageant Slated

Knox City - Mrs. Doris Crownover, manager of the Knox County Chamber of Commerce announced Tuesday that the second annual Knox County Cotton Queen Pageant will be held here on Thursday, July 31 in the school auditorium.

Mrs. Crownover said that official entry blanks may be picked up at her office in the City Hall, in the Munday Chamber office, or any gin office within Knox County will have them on hand. To be eligible, one must have been a junior or senior student in high school during the 1968-69 school term, a Knox County resident, and unmarried. Last year one of the requirements was that each entrant must be the daughter of a farmer. This year, however, this stipulation is no longer one of the rules, and any girl who meets the other requirements of eligibility may enter.

Three judges will score the contestants according to appearance, 40 points; poise, 20 points; and personality, 40 points. Entries will be judged first in a sports outfit while presenting a two-minute talk on cotton (any phase). They will be judged in formal attire as well.






Dinner Party Is Hosted In Campbell Home Saturday Eve

Well, my friends, I've finally contracted that tropical disease - "Polynesian Paralysis". It's that state of health which strikes nearly all individuals who either journey to these Islands or live here. The symptoms include an intense desire to spend many hours just lazing around in the sun, an irresistible temptation to put off until tomorrow what one should do today, and a definite tendency to take one's time while doing first one thing and then another.

It has taken Island workers ten years of work to finish building the new multi-million dollar state capital edifice in Honolulu which will replace the ancient Iolani Palace as the center of Hawaii's state government. Highway workers have been laboring for several years on the six-lane "H-1 Freeway", extending from east of Honolulu to Makaha, on the western side of the Island of Oahu - a distance of about forty-five miles of asphalt. Only about a half of it is finished, and there are still several more years of work ahead.

Hawaiians hardly ever get in a hurry, at least not where work is involved. They are not really lazy, it's just that they like to take their time in getting things done. In explaining how the scent is extracted from island flowers, such as pikake, plumeria, or ginger, a young perfume factory employee will go through each step in the process very carefully, making sure that each wide-eyed tourist understands enough to go out and buy a couple of bottles of the fragrance.

The local people even talk slowly, they have to. Pronouncing a word like "humuhumunukunukuapuaa" would take some time and effort. Once they get it pronounced, they forget what it means! (Don't know its meaning either).

Traffic moves slowly here, also. Oahuans must begin the short trip to their downtown Honolulu office at 6:30 a.m. in order to make it to their 8:00 jobs. It seems as if every person on the island has a car, and drives it to work and back every day. Traffic gradually builds up until the cars are moving along at a snail's pace. There's lots of time to get a last-minute shave with a portable electric razor, or to give that final touch to a hairdo.

I bought a radio here at the local Navy Exchange during the last part of February, but discovered that it would not operate correctly. After having the set sent back to Honolulu for repairs I discovered how really slow these people are. The radio was returned during the first part of April, having taken the repairman five and a half weeks

to put my radio in worse shape than it was when it was sent to them! . . . Polynesian Paralysis - perpetual spring fever. Oahu's motels, hotels, and apartment houses are braced for the summer coed season - the arrival of 200 plus coeds from Mainland colleges and universities. They will arrive by the jet-load - Midwest farmers' daughters, New York society debs, and Southern belles - all coming to Hawaii for different reasons. Most of them will attend the summer session at the University of Hawaii; others come to find a summer job, while some want to get a lasting tan (rich kids). Finding a Hawaiian boy friend is the purpose of some of the coeds' visits, and others just want to be able to say that they've spent the summer in Hawaii. . . . With only 840 dormitory rooms on the UH campus, sleeping space will be so rare that many wahines will have to form low-cost communal living homes, or else sleep out on the beaches at night. . . . Hmmm. . . . That's pau for now. . . . Aloha. . . . Bobby Robinson
