

The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and he ability to learn a language.

your last year's earnings with you when you do so. Your social security payments are based on your average earnings. To be sure that the Social Security Administration has the most current information, it is important to take your income tax return, or Form W-2 with you when you

apply. The information on these records will help your social security representative not only advise you on your social security payments, but also figure your payment with the most current information available. Other documents and information you should have with you include your social security card, evidence of your age, and information about your dependent family members.

The more completely you assemble and bring this information with you when you apply, the more readily your social security representative can act on your claim. This will avoid delays and insure prompt and accurate payment to you when you are counting on it.

Kahunas were also the wise men of the islands with purported knowledge of astronomy, medicine, and natural phenomena - knowledge which they carefully guarded and passed on exclusively to the next hierarchy kahuna.

There were many types of kahunas, each with his particular specialty. One, called kahuna lapaau, was an expert on drugs with extensive knowledge of herbs, plants, grasses, seaweed, salt, and clays, Another, the kahuna haha did nothing but




