

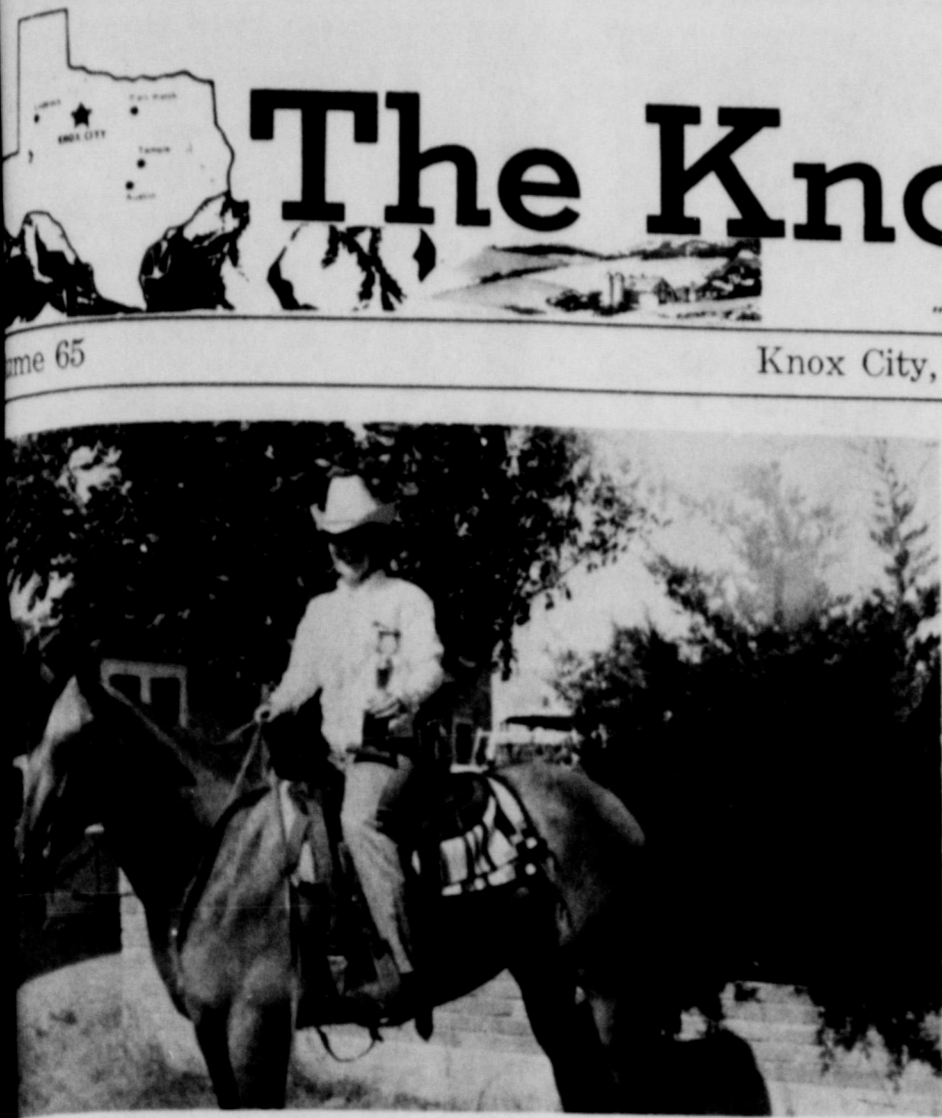

## Cypert Attends Hospital Program In San Antonio

Lyndol Cypert, administrator of the local hospital returns tomorrow from Trinity University in San Antonio where he was among 30 representatives from Texas, Kansas, Montana, Arkansas, New Jersey, Indiana, Illinois, Florida, Tennessee, Wisconsin, and West Virginia to participate in a health care administration program conducted on the university campus July 7 through 18. Purpose of the program was to provide a broad understanding of the principles of health services administration, to increase the administrator's decision-making skills, and to acquaint the administrator with the related areas and concepts of finance, communication theory, law, contemporary problems and trends in health care, and group dynamics. The course was partially financed by a grant from the Kellogg Foundation - through the Hospital Research and Educational Trust of the American Hospital Association - and by Trinity. Tuition also was charged. Assistant Professor of hospital administration Wallace L. Duvall directed the program. In addition to continuing education programs and health care seminars, a two-year accredited graduate program in hospital administration is offered at Trinity, now celebrating its 100th anniversary. Requirements for the master's degree in hospital administration include a year of graduate academic work and an additional year of administrative residency. Director of the Trinity graduate program in hospital administration is Professor Sam A. Edwards. \*\*\*\*\*

## Tom Crane Of TV 3 To Emcee Cotton Pageant

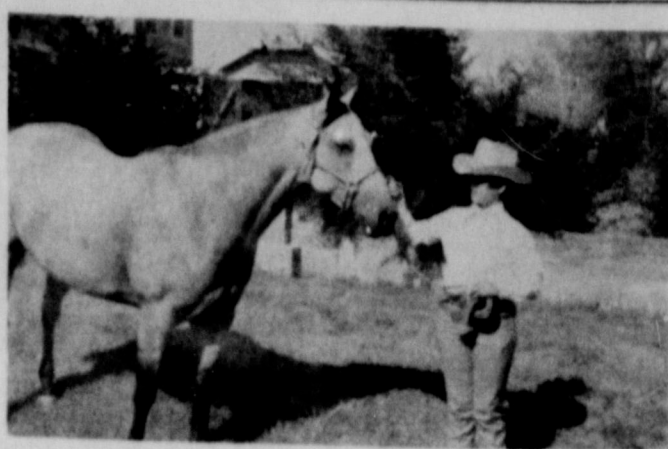

**The Cook's Corner**

**RAISIN SPICE CAKE**  
2 cups cold water  
2 cups sugar (white)  
2 cups raisins  
1 teas. cinnamon  
1/2 teas. cloves  
1 cup shortening or oleo  
1 teas. nutmeg  
2 teas. baking powder  
3 cups flour  
1 cup nuts (optional)  
2 eggs (optional)

Put water, sugar, shortening, raisins, spices, and 1 teaspoon soda in saucepan, let come to a good boil. Allow to cool.

Sift flour with baking powder and add to cooled raisin mixture, mix well and add nuts and eggs if desired. Bake in a 9x13 inch greased and floured pan in a 350 degree oven for about 45 minutes or until done. May be baked in a tube pan for 1 hour.

**FROSTING**  
Combine in saucepan: 6 table-spoons sugar (brown or white)  
3 T. cream or  
2 T. butter  
Bring to a boil and boil one or two minutes, until butter is melted and sugar is dissolved. Add enough powdered sugar to achieve spreading consistency. Beat until smooth, adding a few drops of cream if stiff.

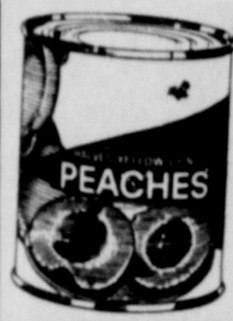
