

Clyde Board of Trustees Adopts Budget for 1971-72 School Year

CLYDE — The budget for the 1971-72 school year was adopted by the Board of Trustees of Clyde Independent School District, at the special meeting held August 19. This budget shows record receipts and expenditures for Clyde Public Schools.

Receipts for the school year were estimated to be \$475,278.00 as follows:

This budget does not include pupil transportation which is controlled by the County School Board. It is estimated that the cost of pupil transportation will be \$16,000, which will be paid from state funds not included in the above revenue estimate.

The tax rate for the 1971-72 school year was set at \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. This is an increase of 15 percent over the previous year's tax rate. This increase was necessary to pay for the new building to house the primary grades, which was constructed during the summer. This is the first increase in the tax rate in eleven years for the Clyde district.

156 Boys in Football Action in Clyde

CLYDE — The Clyde schools have 156 boys out for football at the opening of the training season. 83 boys from high school are working hard, promising fans a good season.

The Junior High boys are working equally as hard - the 8th grade has 30 boys out, while the 7th grade has 43 boys.

Raiders Win Own Tournament; Play At Fort Worth Friday Night

CLYDE — The Clyde Raiders were successful in their first invitational tournament, as they won the championship Monday night by defeating the Merkel Raiders 4-3, in the 15th and final game. This was the third time in the tournament the two teams had met. Clyde had progressed through the four day meet undefeated until the Merkel band of Raiders beat them 11-2 Sunday night, as they hit four home runs and scored 8 runs in the 3rd inning.

In the deciding game Monday, Kenneth Rogers had a no-hitter going until the last inning when the Merkel team scored 3 runs on a single, walk and home run by Bill Whisenhunt after two were out. Clyde led 4-0 until that time.

Voted best hitter and receiving a trophy was Danny Doan of Merkel, who had 10 hits out of 20 times at bat, including three home runs. Most valuable player was Tally Windham of Clyde whose two home runs Saturday night against the Abilene Aces and Merkel won both of those games as they drove in the winning run each time. In the championship game Monday night, he batted in what proved to be the tying run and later scored what was to be the winning run. Following closely for this award was Merkel's Monk Withrow, who had beaten Clyde on the mound Sunday night, after his two home runs Sunday afternoon had put them in the finals. He was also a star on defense, robbing Clyde hitters of two sure home runs.

Kenneth Rogers was named the best pitcher in the tournament, as he was the only pitcher to win two games. He pitched 14 innings (two complete games), gave up a total of only four hits, walked three and had 18 strikeouts.

The Raiders will wrap up the season by competing in the State TAAF Tournament this weekend in Fort Worth. They will play the Fort Worth Warriors Friday night, at 8 p. m. at Diamond No. 2 in Rockwood Park.

Clyde Schools Enroll 907 Students Opening Day, Highest Since 1965

Time To Purchase Hunting & Fishing Licenses for New Game Seasons

AUSTIN — Time to polish up the old smoothbore, dig out the hunting vest and oh yes, buy a new hunting license.

Texas hunting licenses expire each year on August 31, so hunters should make the purchase of a license part of their regular preparations.

Anglers also need to pick up new fishing licenses - which expire at the same time - before heading for the lake on an autumn bass campaign.

A heavy rush is expected at the state's outlets for license sales as the annual dove season approaches. Each year, more than 800,000 hunting licenses and 1,500,000 fishing licenses are purchased in the state.

A resident hunting license costs \$3.25, while the non-resident charge is \$25. Fishing licenses are \$2.15. Exempt hunting licenses, for those under 17 years of age or over 65, are 25 cents.

A resident of this state may hunt any species of wildlife during any open season, except deer and turkey, in the county where he resides, without a hunting license.

One new requirement makes the purchase of a special \$3 white-winged dove stamp mandatory for hunting that species.

Licenses are available from authorized license deputies throughout the state - at sport-

ing goods stores and other retail outlets as well as department offices.

Hunting licenses include a mule deer buck tag, two deer tags and a bonus antlerless deer tag for use in counties where doe harvest is authorized.

If you plan to hunt waterfowl, and you are 16 years of age or older, a federal waterfowl stamp is needed.

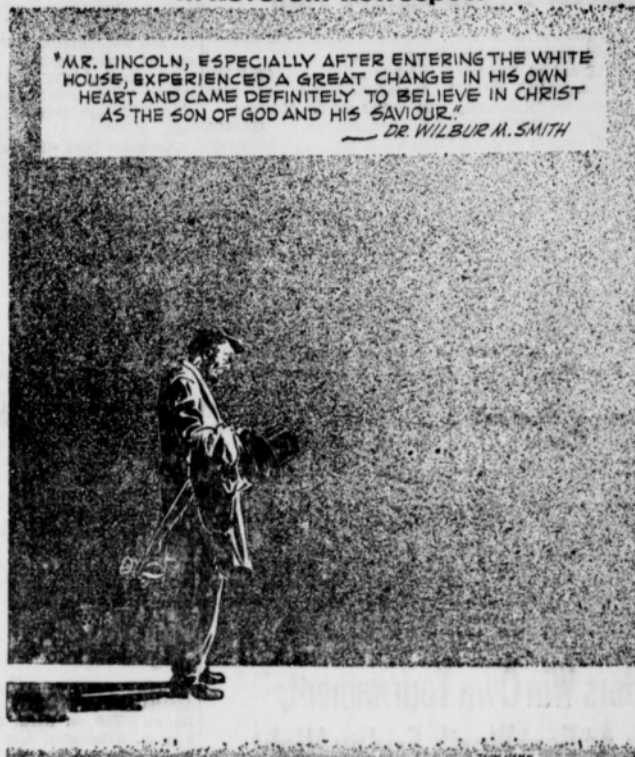

CAN YOU RECOMMEND YOUR RELIGION? (Continued)

The Bible gives man a very stern warning against adding anything or taking away anything from what God has commanded and taught in His word. (Rev. 22:18,19) We should never recommend to others that for which there is no divine authority in matters of religion. Such would jeopardize both our soul and theirs.

Can you recommend the way you worship in the light of what the Scriptures teach? Do the Scriptures specifically authorize what you do in worship to God?

I can recommend prayer in worship upon this basis because I find it practiced with Apostolic sanction in the church in Jerusalem (Acts 2:42). I can recommend study of God's word in worship upon the basis and by authority of the same Scripture.

I have no fear in recommending weekly observance of the Lord's Supper on the first day of the week, for I find Apostolic example and sanction for it in the Scriptures (Acts 20:7). I cannot recommend having the Lord's Supper quarterly, nor annually, nor on any day of the week other than Sunday. To do so would violate the warning given in Rev. 22:18,19.

I can recommend to you a capella (without instrumental accompaniment) singing in worship to God. I find this specifically set forth in plain instructions in the Scriptures (Eph. 5:19, Col. 3:16). To recommend instrumental music accompaniment, choirs, solos, etc., in worship to God is done solely on the authority of man, not the authorization of the Scriptures. Can you recommend it?

I can recommend free-will offerings upon the first day of the week in worship to God. This is specifically commanded by Apostolic authority (1 Cor. 16:1,2). This is to be done by every Christian according to God's blessings and "according as he purposeth in his heart" (2 Cor. 9:7). I cannot recommend bazaars, sales, pie-suppers, cake-walks and other fund raising schemes as acceptable to God. For the same reasons I cannot recommend dues, assessments, etc., as worship to God in this offering. Can you recommend the way you worship God in these acts?

FACTS CONCERNING RE-RECORDING OF BRANDS IN TEXAS

All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be rerecorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971, according to a new law passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature. Producers will be given a six-month period, August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972, in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the right, during this six-month period, to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number of brand and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or rerecorded as provided by the new law. 35-6-c

SLOW MOVING VEHICLES GET NEW SAFETY IMAGE - FANNY FLAG

BAIRD — Farmers have known for years that moving farm equipment on highways is a dangerous practice. Nevertheless, it's a practice they can't always avoid.

To attract attention they have used lights, flags, reflectors and numerous other gadgets. But attracting attention is only half the job. Something was needed to tell the motorist approaching from the rear that that's a slow moving vehicle up ahead.

Now they have it—a Fanny Flag!

The Fanny Flag is especially designed for vehicles that travel at speeds of 25 miles per hour or less.

The Fanny Flag is showing up on more and more tractors, combines and other farm equipment. One reason is that farmers don't relish the idea of

As a result, day and night the Fanny Flag gives the message, "Slow Moving Vehicle."
