

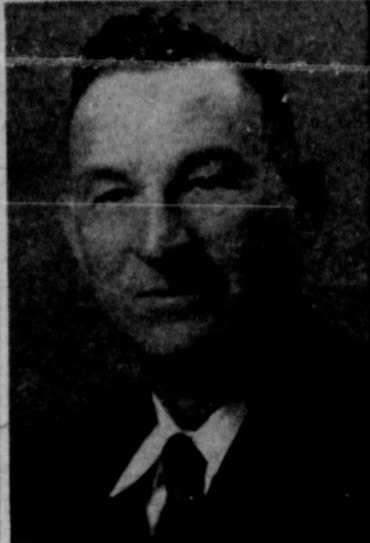

## S. N. Reed Elected Head of National Ginners Ass'n.



S. N. Reed was elected president of the National Cotton Ginners Association at the group's annual convention in Atlanta, Ga., Monday.

Mr. Reed is well known throughout the South as a ginner and cotton grower. He has been manager of the O'Brien Cooperative Gin since 1935, is part owner and sales manager of Northern Star Seed Farms, is chairman of the board of directors of the Citizens State Bank, and has extensive farming interests. He is also active in civic and church affairs.

Reed, who is outgoing vice president of the national association, has been called on in the past by the secretary of agriculture to help work out problems concerning the cotton farmer. Among other things he has helped work out labor agreements between the United States and Mexico.

Miss Warren, who had been a resident of Merkel since 1912, died Tuesday.

Besides her brothers in Knox City Miss Warren is survived by two other brothers, T. A. Warren of Waco and W. B. Warren of Anson, and a sister, Jonnie Warren of Merkel.

## Grade School Boys Win Benjamin Basketball Tourney

The Benjamin and Knox City grade school teams battled it out in the finals of the invitational basketball tournament at Benjamin last week, with the Knox City boys and Benjamin girls winning championship honors.

Goree won both consolation titles by default from Megargel.

In the first round of the boys' division, Benjamin defeated Goree 29-16. Knox City defeated Megargel 36-10, and Vera drew a bye. Benjamin beat Vera in the second round, 28-16.

In the championship finals, Knox City boys edged their hosts 27-20.

Benjamin girls beat Goree 18-12 in the first round, and Knox City topped Megargel 38-36. Scores in the championship game were Benjamin 19, Knox City 13.

## Benjamin Voters OK Water Plan

Benjamin residents took one more step Saturday toward obtaining a good municipal water supply when they approved—by an overwhelming 82-3 vote—a contract between the City of Benjamin and Knox County Water District No. 1.

Under terms of the contract the water district, which encompasses the Benjamin School District, will sell water to the city for 30 cents a thousand gallons.

On March 5, citizens of the district will vote on a \$130,000 bond issue to finance facilities for getting the water to Benjamin.

Wells which will furnish the water will be drilled about eight miles southeast of Benjamin, across the Brazos River. A test well there produces about 600 gallons of water per minute.

Proposed water rates to pay off the bonds will be a \$3 minimum for the first 2,000 gallons, 75 cents a thousand for the next 8,000 gallons, 60 cents a thousand for the next 10,000 gallons, and 50 cents for the next 20,000 gallons.

The Benjamin school will get a special rate of 12 cents a thousand for all over 40,000 gallons.

Water rates were worked out by an engineering firm hired by the city to study the water problem and make recommendations toward a solution.

Silk was notified by Homer Smith, clerk of the court, that the court acted on the motion Feb. 11.

In January the court rendered a decision favoring Knox City in the case, which stems from the annexation of part of the old Sunset school district to the Knox City district.

Roberts' opponent tonight will be Sixto San Miguel of San Antonio. Both boys weigh 127.

## O'Brien FFA Boys Enter Northern Star Cotton Contest

Most members of the O'Brien FFA Chapter are expected to enter a cotton contest sponsored by Northern Star Seed Farms John Edwards, vocational agriculture teacher, said this week.

Northern Star is offering \$100 to the member of the chapter producing the most cotton per acre on dry land, and the same amount to the boy producing the most cotton per acre on irrigated or sub-irrigated land.

Rules of the contest are:

1. Must have 5 acres of cotton, measured by vocational agriculture teacher.
2. Must plant Northern Star seed.
3. Must state whether dry land or irrigated or sub-irrigated.
4. Must do all the work himself with exception of harvesting.
5. Must keep accurate records of expense and income.

Sixty-seven FHA members, mothers and guests attended.

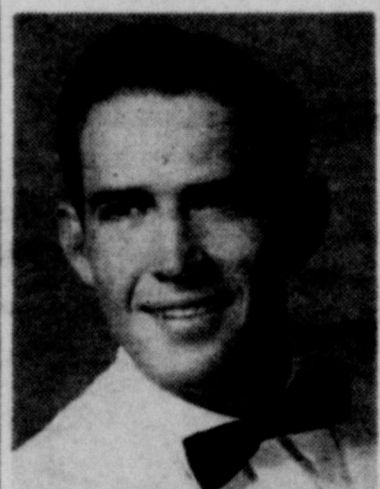
Members drew names for the exchange of valentines and each selected a special Valentine for her mother or guest.

## Grand Jury Returns 11 Indictments

Eleven true bills were returned Monday by the Knox County Grand Jury, February term, which included the first women ever to serve on a jury in Knox County.

Indictments included five for swindling by check, one for forgery and passing, one for burglary, one for removal of mortgaged property and three for fondling.

The three fondling charges were against Lee Roy Whisenhunt. Others indicted were William Toles, forgery and passing; Walter J. Rogers, removal of mortgaged property; Aniseto Rodriguez, burglary; and Mrs. O. B. Smith, J. M. Anderson, Zane Franklin, Mrs. O. T. Laurence and W. L. Hendrix, swindling by check.

The jury passed a resolution commending Sheriff Homer T. Melton on his efforts to keep crime at a minimum in the county and his efficient handling of investigations. The resolution also suggested that the county judge have a county financial statement published once each quarter.

## Johnston Scores 43 In Final High School Basketball Game

Dwayne Johnston, O'Brien basketball star who has been mentioned as a candidate for all-state honors, wound up a brilliant four-year career Monday night by scoring 43 points in the Bulldogs' 69-46 victory over Rochester.

The 5-10 Johnston made 21 field goals and one free throw. He tallied 20 of O'Brien's 22 points in the fourth quarter, including four straight long shots.

O'Brien finished third in District 14-B with a 10-4 record.

Their hopes for second place and a play-off with the top team, Weinert, were blasted Friday night by Paint Creek. Up to that point, the two teams were tied for second place.

Scores in the Paint Creek game were 57-48. Johnston, with two men sticking to him like burrs, accounted for 28 points to take scoring honors over Rudy Raughton of Paint Creek, who made 26.

Raughton made all his points on 13 free throws.

The O'Brien girls knocked the Paint Creek girls out of second place spot in the district with a 44-41 upset. Monday night the Rochester girls, district champions, won a thrilling 59-58 overtime thriller from the O'Brien girls. The regulation game ended 54-54. Jeanette McAda of O'Brien was high scorer with 28 points.

## Changes Made in Social Security Earnings Tests

The earnings test for retired people who are employed has been made the same as the test for self-employed retired people by the recent change in the social security law, according to Erton P. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls District Office.

After January 1, 1955, a retired person's earnings will be judged on a yearly basis whether he is employed or self-employed, and whether his work is under social security or not. Under the old law, employed people who were receiving their retirement benefits had their earnings judged on a monthly basis.

The new amount which may be earned under the law without loss of social security payments is \$1,200 in a year.
