Earnings Tests

The earnings test for retired scople who are employed has seen made the same as the test for self-employed retired people by the recent change in the social security law, according to Erton P. Tate, manager of the Wichits Pails District Office.

After January I. 1985, a retired serson's carnings will be judged on a yearly basis whether he is employed or self-employed, and whether his work is under social security or not. Under the old law, employed people who were receiving their retirement benefits had their earnings judged on a monthly basis.


The new amount which may be carned under the law without loss of social security payments is \$1.200 in a vear
