## Knox County Farm Bureau Re-Elects Waldrip President

Ancel Waldrip was re-elected president of the Knox County Farm Bureau at the annual business meeting held in the assembly room of the court house at Benjamin Tuesday night.

Also re-elected was J. C. McGee, vice president. W. M. Ford of Vera was elected secretary-treasurer, replacing Paul Fitzgerald.

Directors named for the coming year were C. C. Browning of Truscott, Omar Cure of Gilliland, Harold Jones of Goree, Frank Cerveny of Rhineland and Lee Smith of Knox City.

Members present voted to send Waldrip and Cure to the State Convention in Houston next week.

Members voted for the delegates to support several resolutions at the State Convention. Included were resolutions asking that maize be declared a basic crop and parity raised to 90 per cent; that the child labor law be amended; and that the law governing Mexican National laborers be amended so that it will be profitable for the small farmer to secure their help during the harvest season.

### KNOX COUNTIANS OKAY TWO AMENDMENTS

Knox County voters turned thumbs down on three of the five proposed constitutional amendments in Tuesday's special election, and gave their nod of approval to two.

The county vote on each amendment was as follows:

County Employees' Pensions, 103 for, 350 against; University Permanent Fund, 141 for, 282 against; Rural Fire Prevention Districts, 132 for, 320 against; Veterans Land Bill, 307 for, 153 against; State Welfare, 242 for, 236 against.

The amendment to the State Welfare Law, however, was turned down by voters over the state as a whole, and the increase in the Veterans Land Fund will be the only change in the Texas constitution this year.

## Bi-District Game Set for Tonight At Patton Springs

The Knox City Greyhounds will travel to Patton Springs tonight (Thursday) to play the bi-district championship game.

The 'Hounds wound up district play with a clean slate—six wins, no losses and no ties.

Patton Springs is said to have one of the strongest six-man teams in West Texas, but the 'Hounds are in top shape and are expected to play their best game of the season, according to Coaches David Slaughter and Henry White.

School officials urged fans to follow the boys to the bi-district game tonight, because any team will play better with strong support.

The Greyhounds defeated the Benjamin Mustangs last Friday night 40-20, to close the 1951 district season. Scoring for the Greyhounds were Jim Jones with eight points; John Ed Smith, two points; Wallace May, six points; and Jerry Wilson, eighteen points.

Scoring for Benjamin were Nail, with fourteen points, and Escobar, with six points.

The Knox City reserves played the entire last half, but were unable to score against the Mustangs.

Reburial services for Pfc. Billy Jack Lusk will be held from the Knox City Church of Christ at 2:00 o'clock Saturday afternoon, November 17. H. L. Matheny of the Rochester Church of Christ will officiate, assisted by Stanley Shipp.

Billy Jack was killed in action in Korea May 28, 1951. He was born October 5, 1930, west of O'Brien, and attended the O'Brien schools. He was living in Murfreesboro, Ark. when he enlisted in the armed forces in December, 1948.

He received training as a paratrooper at Ft. Sill, Okla., and Fort Benning, Ga. He was transferred from Fort Benning to Camp Campbell, Ky., and shipped overseas in August, 1950.

According to a telegram dated November 10 from the commanding general of Fort Mason, San Francisco, Calif., the soldier's body left Oakland, Calif., Tuesday, Nov. 13, and is scheduled to arrive at Mansell and Smith Funeral Home, Rochester, at 6:59 p. m. tomorrow (Friday). The body will be escorted by Sgt. Falcon S. Davis.

Funeral arrangements were made by Mansell and Smith, funeral directors. The Knox City American Legion, Teague-Carpenter Post No. 229, will have charge of military honors.

Survivors are the mother and step-father, Mr. and Mrs. Buster Hodges of O'Brien; the father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Lusk of Knox City; four half-brothers, Tommy Lusk of Knox City and Jerry, Taylor and Ronnie Hodges of O'Brien; one half-sister, Jo Anne Hodges of O'Brien; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Lusk of Knox City and Mrs. J. S. Teague of Sweetwater.

Burial will be in the Knox City Cemetery.

### Oil Notes--

Humble Oil & Refining Co. is completing what promises to be the best well on the Bateman Ranch, and possibly the best in this entire area.

The well, the Bateman No. 73, is in the Bateman East Field, latest portion of the ranch to be developed.

Operators drilled to 5,291 feet, in an unidentified reef formation, and tested 13 feet of open hole. They reported gas to the surface in 5 minutes and oil flowing into tanks in 15 minutes, at an estimated rate of 100 barrels per hour. Flowing pressure was 1700 pounds and bottom hole pressure, shut-in, was 2,300 pounds.

Casing was set and cemented, and operators are waiting on cement to harden.

The Ellenberger was topped at 6,075 feet in the Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 Myrtle White, a mile east of town. The well was drilled to 6,175, and on a drillstem test at that depth recovery was 1,000 feet of salt and sulphur water, with tool open 3 hours. Bottom hole pressure, shut in, was 2,300 pounds. Operator conditioned the hole and ran a Schlumberger log Wednesday night, and contractor is waiting on orders. When released from this location, the Yeatman Drilling Co. rig will be moved to Stanolind's No. 1 Egenbacher, in the North Knox City field, where roads have been built and pits dug.

The Stanolind No. 1 Messer is drilling below 1,000 feet. Sunray Oil Company's No. 2 Snelson is drilling at about 1,600 feet.

The Horace Coon, Jr., No. 1 C. C. Hutchinson was at 6,109 feet this morning. Operators planned to drill to 6,111 feet and run a Schlumberger log. No substantial shows have been reported in this wildcat.

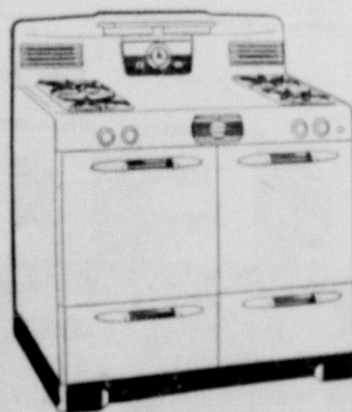

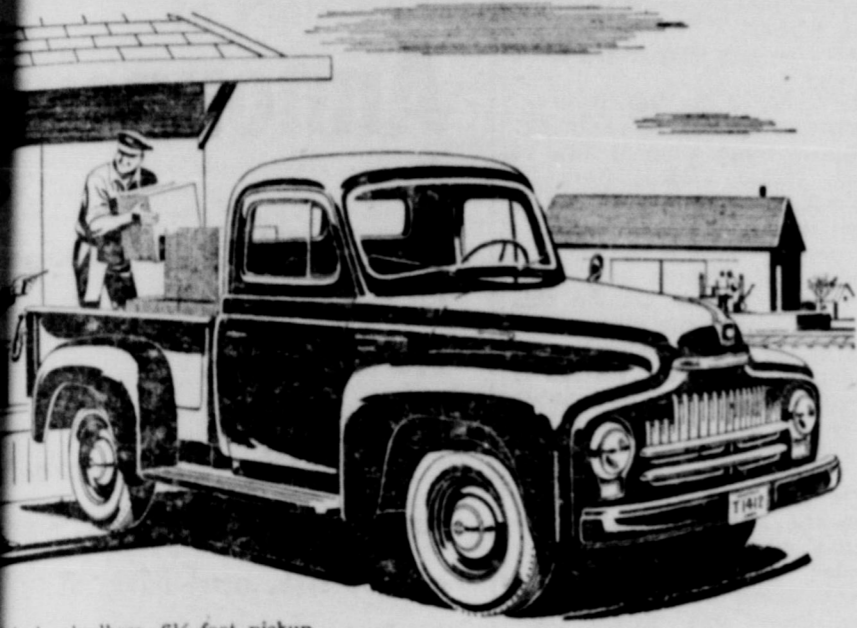

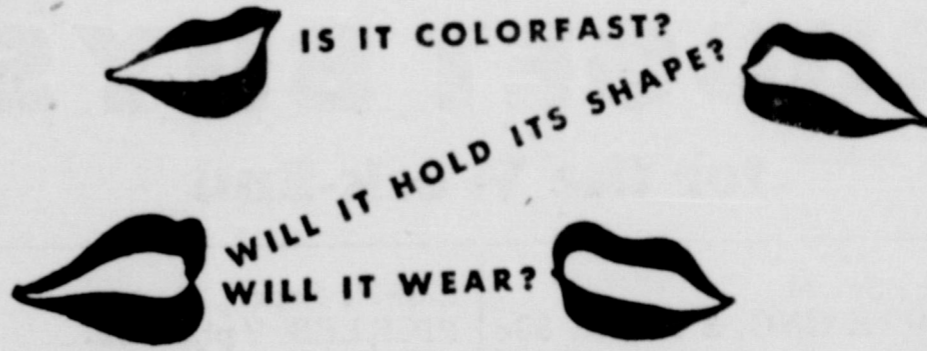
