

## BEEF CATTLE SHORTCOURSE HELD NOVEMBER 22-23

BAIRD — A two night beef cattle shortcourse will be held in Baird at the District Courtroom on November 22 and 23. Starting time will be 7:00 p.m. each night. The shortcourse will cover several different topics of interest to all beef cattle producers in the area.

The program for the first night will be on beef cattle nutrition by Bill McCullough of Fort Collins, Colorado who is Western Area Beef Specialist for Moorman's Mfg Co. McCullough, former head of the beef research department at Quincy, Illinois has worked in numerous areas including feedlot management and dry-lot cow calf operations. He has also been instrumental in developing new ration techniques for range as well as feedlot operations.

Tuesday night's program will be presented by L. A. Maddox, beef cattle specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Maddox is well known in this area and other parts of Texas for his work in performance testing and beef cattle crossbreeding. His topic will be crossbreeding and he will discuss some of the new breeds of beef cattle that have recently been of concern to many ranchers.

## NOVEMBER 15-21 TEXAS FOOD, FIBER ABUNDANCE WEEK

BAIRD — County Agricultural Agent Greg Gerngross invites the citizens of Callahan County to pause during the week before Thanksgiving and reflect on the bountiful supply of food and fiber that is available to them.

The week of November 15-21 has been designated as "Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week" to pay tribute to the state's agricultural industry.

"The people of this county, state and nation have the highest standard of living in the entire world," points out Gerngross. "This is due to our country's valuable natural resources and the hard work and dedication of today's agricultural producers."

"The next time you help yourself to that extra helping of potatoes and gravy or reach for another piece of chicken, think about this great land and the hard-working people who produce all of your favorite foods," suggests the agent.

Today, food and fiber products continue to be one of the best bargains at the marketplace, points out Gerngross. There are two reasons for this: consumer incomes have risen faster than food prices, and agricultural producers continue to become more efficient.

Consumers spend only 16.5 percent of their disposable income for food, the lowest in any country. Ten years ago this figure stood at 19 percent. The present-day agricultural producer provides for himself and 46 others about 10 of these being in foreign countries. Last year Texas ranked fourth among agricultural exporting states. It led in cotton exports and was second in rice.

"Farming is an honorable occupation which has a direct effect on the livelihood of each of us," contends Gerngross. "Let's give our agricultural producers an extra pat on the back during Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week."

## UNDERSTANDING THE SCRIPTURES

(continued from last week)

That denominations are not members of the true vine in the Lord's teaching in John 15:1-6 is proven by another passage in the Bible. Christ said, "I am the vine." So we are talking about being members of Christ. Paul said, "There are many members, yet but one body." (1 Cor. 12:20) Individuals are the members. Different bodies of people do not comprise the body of Christ, but individuals who are in Christ (Gal. 3:27).

One can be a member of the body of Christ, a branch of the true vine, without being a member of any denomination. Much misunderstanding of the Scriptures would disappear if people were seeking how to become members of Christ rather than trying to determine which denomination they should join. A great blessing of such an attitude would be the fulfilling of the Lord's prayer that "they all may be one in us" (John 17:21). People could then be together in Christ as was said of the disciples in Jerusalem; "All that believed were together..." (Acts 2:44).

There is unity in Christ. "There is one body (His church—Eph. 1:22,23), and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith (not 250 different faiths), one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all, and through all," and in all." (Eph. 4:4-6) Denominationalism divides; Christ unites. Christ came to unite all men "in one body unto God through the cross, having slain the enmity there" by." (Eph. 2:16) He did not come so that men might "Join the church of their choice." He came to die for His church that He might "purchase it with his own blood." (Acts 20:28)

## OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

BY VERN SANFORD

Often the squirrel has been called "the little teacher." That's about as apt a nickname as any.

Fortunately, most Texas youngsters get their first taste of hunting in the squirrel woods.

Show me someone who is proficient at hunting squirrels and I'll show you a hunter who can hold his own with any kind of game. A person who can sit statue-still on a stand or slip silently on light feet through the woods to beguile a squirrel

can certainly do the same with deer. The squirrel is no push-over. No sir, not by long shot.

The squirrel has one weakness, however. Its eyes are adapted to movement and it can be fooled by something which does not move. The hunter who steals into the sullen woods just at daybreak, finds himself a comfortable spot to sit down and stays put is going to see squirrels if there are any around.

It isn't difficult to pinpoint these arboreal critters. Squirrels just can't seem to keep their big mouths shut. They rush around in the treetops making all sorts of commotion. But when there is a hint of danger, one can spraddle flat on a limb and be all but invisible to probing eyes.

Squirrel hunting teaches the fledgling hunter many important things about outwitting game. It teaches him to be still and quiet to have roving, sharp eyes to detect any unnatural movement, to be able to accurately judge range and to set the squirrel up for a fatal shot.

A good weapon for the beginning squirrel hunter is a Marlin Model 24, the standard model with a .22 rimfire in one barrel, 410 shotgun in the other. It holds only one of each kind of ammo. This way there is less chance of an accident. With the shotgun, the youngster is ready for the shot or moving shots;

the .22 rimfire takes care of Medium-range shooting.

Although the opening of the squirrel season is heralded with much fanfare in parts of the state, particularly East Texas, in many other counties it is open the year around. One of the best times to seek the diminutive bushytails is during early fall, in a grove of oak or pecan trees, when the nuts are ripening and the critters are out and feeding.

Texas has a sizable population of both species of squirrels, the reddish-colored fox squirrel and the grayish gray squirrel. The gray squirrel is most abundant in East Texas. The larger fox squirrel is found predominately through the Hill Country in the heart of the state.

Hunting squirrels is the same no matter what locale or the particular species of bushytail you might be after. It is a quiet and slow game of wits . . . with the hunter trying to see the squirrel before revealing his presence. Once a squirrel is spooked it is doubly hard to get it in the skillet.

One of the squirrels most annoying habits is its tactical withdrawal to the opposite side of the tree the hunter is circling. A bit of its tail — constantly just out of range — slowly and enticingly lures the mad-dened hunter in a merry-go-round chase as the squirrel in question retreats one step ahead of his pursuer.

According to the lore of old Texas squirrel hunters. There is only one sure way for a single hunter (without dog) to outfox such a maneuver. Make sure the squirrel isn't peeking, then hang your hunting jacket on a branch where you are standing. Retreat carefully to the background then slowly circle the tree from a considerable distance. Supposedly the squirrel will continue to regard your jacket as his prime enemy and focus his attention accordingly. Meanwhile you sneak up on its blind side.

The next meeting will be held December 15, in the home of Mrs. A. E. Dyer, Sr., with Mrs. Sam Gilliland as co-hostess.


