Scout Attains Highest Rank

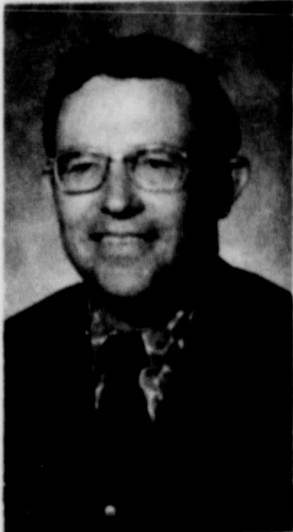

W. R. Baker Given Special Recognition

Knox City school superintendent W. R. Baker was given special recognition and awarded a plaque by Region IX Council of Exceptional Children Friday evening at Clark Student Center on the campus of Midwestern University in Wichita Falls during the banquet meeting.

Two hundred teachers and administrators attending the fifth annual conference of the council watched as Baker received the award for pioneering service as the first school administrator in the state to serve as fiscal agent for a "Plan A" rural cooperative. As a result of the pioneering efforts of Baker and cooperating school personnel in Haskell and Knox counties, the administrative patterns for establishing similar cooperatives state wide were laid down.

"Plan A" systems offer help to students who need more or different instructional resources than can be given in regular classrooms. Speech therapy, homebound or hospital services, resource rooms and some vocational settings

are provided. These are not available to smaller individual schools except through a cooperative arrangement such as that devised through the ten schools in Haskell and Knox counties.

Haskell-Knox Consortium and four large urban schools have served as models so that by 1976 all schools in the state

Elections Set Sat., April 6

The City of Knox City and the Knox City Independent School District Board have set Saturday, April 6, for the election of city councilmen and school board members. The election will be held at City Hall.

Filing deadline for candidates in the upcoming election is March 6. This is also the final day of registration for voters wishing to participate in the election.

Anyone wishing to file as a candidate in the city election should do so at City Hall. Those interested in filing in the School Board election are asked to go to the school superintendent's office.

Judge Race Develops

With the February 4 deadline past for statewide, district, county, and precinct offices, a race developed late Monday when incumbent Knox County Judge Sam E. Clonts drew an opponent, Clyde Boose of Munday.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Bobby Roberson of Benjamin has filed for re-election and will be opposed by P.H. Pierce of Benjamin.

Two incumbents are having to run against each other as a result of a new realignment of Justice of the Peace Precincts. Mrs. Billie J. Suttle of Munday and Jackie Beaty of Goree have both been justices of the peace, but Precincts 3 and 4 were combined and the two have to run against each other for the new Precinct 4.

County Democratic Chairman Collins Moorhouse will not run this year and M.L. Wiggins of Munday and Sam Leaverton of Benjamin have both filed for that post.

Unopposed incumbents in Knox County include Zena Waldron, county and district clerk; county treasurer J.T. Cypert; Commissioner Precinct 4 Lee G. Patterson; Justice of the Peace Precinct 2, W.C. Glenn; and Justice of the Peace Precinct 1, Guy Bradley.

Absentee voting by public appearance will begin on March 18. Gloria Webb and Faye Railsback are absentee ballot clerks for the city election, while Mary Beth Smith, at Knox City School Superintendent W.R. Baker's office, is absentee ballot clerk for the school board election.

Holdover city officials are Mayor C.C. "Buddy" Angle, Councilmen Carl Shelton and A.P. Denton.

Those whose terms expire this year are Celso Gonzales, L.V. Worley, and Dr. Ted Alexander. Dr. Alexander was appointed to serve the one-year term of Bobby Baker who moved to Fort Worth.

In the school board election, board members whose terms are expiring are Allen McGaughey, Oscar Mangis, and John Grindstaff Jr. All three have filed for reelection.

Holdover board members with one year remaining are John Crowover and Doug Meinzer. Jerry Benson and Henry J. Jones have two years remaining on their current terms.

No information was available at press time on plans for the Knox County Hospital District's election. According to hospital administrator Glen Rumley, this information will be released following the hospital board meeting later this month.

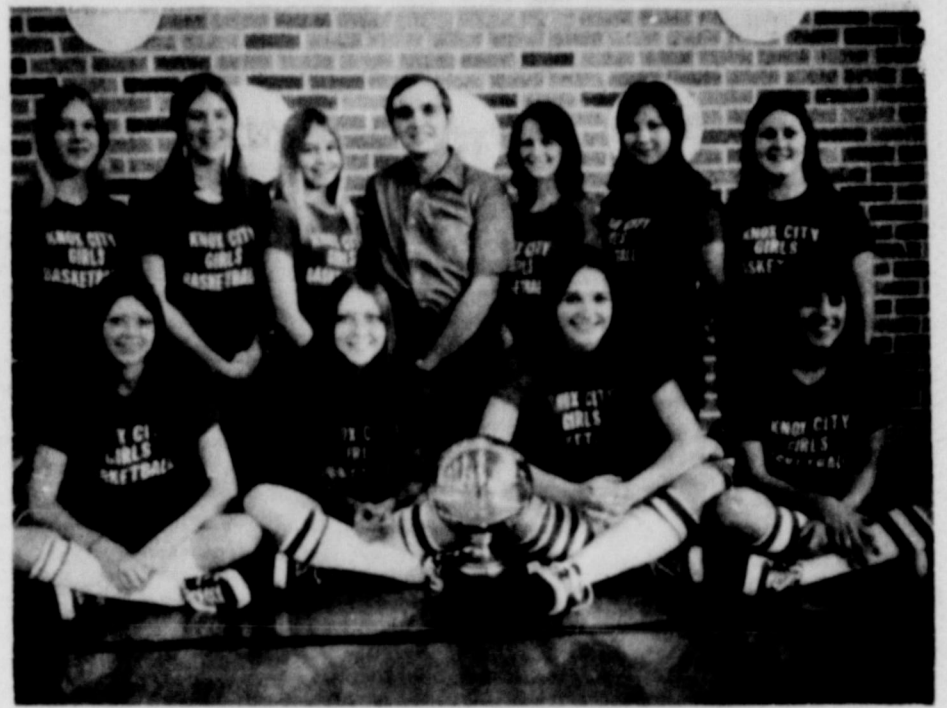
City coffee. Finnell has pledged to campaign in each of the 29 counties in the senatorial district in his campaign for the seat being vacated by Sen. Jack Hightower.

Chamber of Commerce officers and directors on hand Tuesday morning for the monthly breakfast at Sheila's Cafe heard president J.B. Tabor tell of plans for the upcoming banquet scheduled this year for Tuesday, March 19.

According to Mrs. Doris Crownover, secretary-manager, J. Fike Godfrey of Abilene, vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, has accepted an invitation to be guest speaker for the annual event. Other area chamber banquets coming up in the near future include Haskell's on February 8, Seymour's on February 14, and Munday's on March 12, Mrs. Crownover reported.

Tabor also reported on the Chamber's annual membership drive slated this year for the first part of April. In other business, it was voted to continue to participate in and support Brazos West Development for Haskell, Jones, Stonewall, and Knox counties.

Mrs. Crownover also reported that the Chamber plans to establish an employment office available both to applicants for various jobs and employers in need of help. Mrs. Crownover said that there has been a need of such a service locally for sometime and that she will assume the responsibility within her office.

Concluding the agenda was the discussion of the discontinuance of Sunday mail in this section of the Abilene area. Mrs. Crownover was to schedule a meeting with sectional authorities and invite interested persons from Haskell, Stamford, Anson, and any other towns in this area who might like to join in the inquiry.

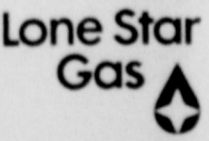

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Coaches' Comments

Two big wins over tough district opponents highlighted last week's play for the Houndettes. Tuesday night we had to come from behind to capture a 73-64 win over Archer City. We fell behind early in the contest and were down 18-6 at the end of the first quarter. During the second quarter, we trailed by as much as 20 points, at 26-6. Debbie Reese then came into the game, and things began to pick up. Debbie promptly sank two big baskets, and our momentum immediately speeded up. We trailed at half, though, by a score of 34-21.

There weren't many adjustments made at halftime, except in our mental attitude. We came back and scored 56 points in the second half, while holding Archer to 30. Temi Baker had her second big game against Archer, scoring 37 points.

Friday night had both some good and some bad moments. We emerged from the game with a 48-37 victory over Holliday. Overall, it was our finest defensive effort of the year. Holliday is an offensive club, with a lot of scoring potential, and our guards shut them off completely.

The Greyhounds came so close, but yet so far, from beating the Paducah Dragons. It seemed that the only time we were behind was at the final buzzer. The score was knotted at 14 all at the end of the first quarter. Then the Greyhounds held a 26-21 lead at half time and during the third quarter added to their lead with a 41-32 advantage. The fourth quarter was the killer as the Dragons exploded for 19 points to the Greyhounds 6. The Greyhounds stayed cool and handled the Paducah press well for all but a three minute span in that fourth quarter.

The thing that hurt us more than anything was our inability

to hit our freethrows in the second half. We had 4 of 5 in the first half and 1 of 7 in the second. In the fourth quarter, going down the stretch, we went to the line leading and failed to score a point at the line. Also 3 of those 4 times we missed the first of what were 1 and 1 situations.

I thought we played one of our best defensive games of the year in holding the Dragons to only 51 points. We knew this was what we had to do in slowing them down.

Actually we had a poor shooting night hitting 21 of 57 from the floor for 36.8% and 5 of 12 from the freethrow line for 41.6%. Paducah hit on 21 of 51 shots from the floor for 41.1% and 9 of 19 from the freethrow line for 47.3%. We committed half as many turnovers as we did in the previous Paducah game with 17 turnovers this time, which I felt wasn't bad against that quick a team.

I sure hated for the season to end for the Greyhounds, but the only thing left for us now is next year. Right now that isn't too helpful to think about, with a victory so close you could almost taste it, and then see it slip away in the closing seconds. But the Greyhounds played hard and gave a great effort, with only our mistakes hurting us, and the athlete, coach, official, or fan that doesn't make mistakes hasn't been born yet.

Guidelines To Being A Wise Sales Shopper

Sales, sales, sales! This is the time of year that consumers are bombarded with pre-inventory sales, inventory sales, and after-inventory sales.

The three keys for making the most of sales and bargains are planning, comparing, and judging.

Effective sales shopping begins with a purpose and plan in mind. Recognize the difference between the things you really need and those which simply attract your attention. Nothing is a bargain unless you need it.

"Consider shopping at both the start and close of a big sale. The best selection is most likely available the first day, but you may find further price reductions the last day.

Knowing the original prices of items helps in recognizing a reduced price. Be sure the sales price is an actual reduction. Watch for imperfect and damaged articles. Know store policies on sales—is sales merchandise returnable?

Certain standards have also been developed for businessmen in preparing their sales advertisements. Many reputable stores are using standardized terms in their ads to help customers know what sales prices mean. The consumer who understands these terms is better able to judge the value of a sale.

Words and phrases like "formerly," "manufacturers suggested retail price," "nationally advertised at" and "list" signify a comparison with the price of the identical item being sold in the principal retail outlets in the town and area. These terms are

not always a comparison with the store's own regular prices.

The phrases "comparable value," "compare at" and "similar to" refer to a comparison with a similar but not identical item of like quality and grade, which is being sold by principle retail outlets in the town or area.

Be careful of merchandise marked "as is" or "slightly damaged." Inspect the item carefully—these labels put full responsibility on consumers for determining the condition of an article.

Terms such as "imperfect," "irregular," and "manufacturer's seconds" means that the merchandise arrived from the factory faulty in some way. The terms include crooked seams and irregularities in color, weave, knit, or size. The faults may or may not affect service, use or appearance of the item. Often defects aren't noticeable and don't alter a good buy. But inspect faulty items very carefully before buying.

Knowing one's rights under the law can also help the consumer be more effective sales shopper. In Texas it's illegal for businesses to engage in any act or practice deceptive to the consumer, such as advertising goods and services without the intention of supplying a "reasonably expectable public demand." This type advertisement is legal, however, if it specifies a limited quantity.

It is also against the law for a store to make false or misleading statements of fact concerning price reductions. Nor can a store legally advertise goods or services with the

intention of not selling them as advertised. Falsely advertising a liquidation sale or a going-out-of-business sale is against the law, too.

Violations of advertising laws can be reported to either the Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's Office, Supreme Court Building, Austin, Texas 78711, or to the Consumer Credit Commissioner, P.O. Box 2107, Austin, Texas 78767, the specialist points out.
