Mr. Quintana, 28, died Sunday at 4:10 a.m. from a Manuel Solis of Wichita Falls. gunshot wound at the home of Luciano Quintanilla where he was visiting.

Investigating officers were Knox County Sheriff H.C. Stone, Deputy Sheriff James Redwine, Constable LeRoy Davis, and Justice of the Peace Guy Bradley.

Bradley ruled "self-inflicted accidental death" in the Sunday morning shooting.


