"For example, it is necessary to keep silt out of harbors, in addition to keeping topsoil on the land. We have long recognized that much of the choicest agricultural land was being diverted to other uses - subdivisions, factories, airports, housing developments. So we now classify soils for non-agricultural as well as agricultural uses," Williams says.

All of the proceeds from the bazaar each year are used for the church. The ladies have purchased church parlor furniture and had the church yard landscaped in prior years. Last year the group bought a new mimeograph for the church office.

The spokesman said that many of the articles would be ideal for Christmas giving.

ROTC Scholarship Applicants Get Extra CEEB Test Date

The last opportunity for potential ROTC (Reserve Officers' Training Corps) applicants to take the CEEB tests for scholarship consideration is December 28, according to Tolmer S. McKinley, chief of the education branch at Headquarters Fourth U. S. Army, Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas.

College Entrance Examination Board tests are part of the bases for selection of four-year ROTC scholarship winners. Other factors are academic records, extracurricular activities and personal interview.

A recent Department of the Army announcement lists three new colleges and a university that will have senior ROTC units in school year 1968-69. They are Arkansas Agricultural, Mechanical and Normal College at Pine Bluff; State College of Arkansas at Conway; Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches, Texas, and Eastern New Mexico University at Portales.

A fifth institution, Southeastern Louisiana College at Ham-

mond, has been selected to accept ROTC students in academic year 1969-70.

High school seniors anticipating enrollment at any of the 259 institutions offering the four-year ROTC program in the United States are eligible to apply for four-year ROTC scholarships. On a competitive basis, approximately 800 scholarships are awarded annually.

Depending on tuition at various schools, each scholarship may be valued between \$5,000 and \$9,000. A scholarship includes all tuition, books, fees, uniforms and \$50 monthly living allowance.

On graduation from college and successful completion of Army ROTC studies, students are required to accept Regular Army or Reserve commissions, whichever is offered, as second lieutenants, and to serve at least four years on active duty with the Army.

Application packets for scholarships are available now from the Commanding General, Fourth U. S. Army, ATTN: AKAAG-RR, Fort Sam Houston, Texas 78234. The packets must be postmarked by midnight January 15, 1968.

Special arrangements have been made for a CEEB test session Dec. 28 for potential scholarship applicants who have not already completed the tests. Appointments must be made by Dec. 21. Information may be obtained from education cen-

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Former Resident, Miss Sue Steakley To Marry Jan. 27

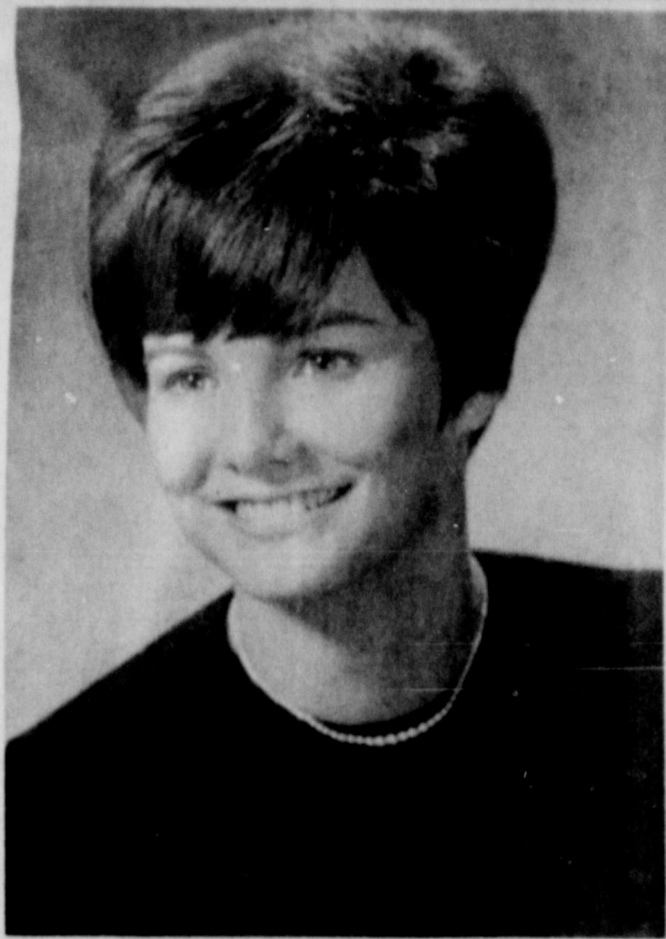

Benefits Help Those Over 65

For most people over 65, there are Medicare benefits available to help pay their doctor bills, according to Edwin Draughon, Manager of the Social Security Administration in Vernon.

There are two easy methods for claiming those benefits.

If the doctor and the patient both agree, then payment is made directly to the doctor. If the patient or his doctor prefers the other method, then payment can be made to the patient.

In that case the following is all a person has to do. At the

time a person enrolls for Medicare he is given a Medicare Handbook which contains the form to be used. Only three "Yes" or "No" answers are needed, plus a brief statement describing the illness and the patient's Medicare claim number from his Medicare card. Then, attach the itemized receipt bill(s) to the form and send to Medicare.

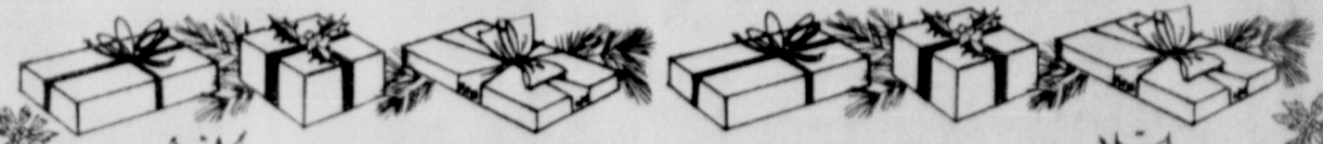

Farm and Ranch News

WHEAT PROSPECTS GOOD

Knox County wheat is progressing fairly well at this stage. Grazing amounts have varied from fair to light so far. Lack of moisture in the early fall kept most fields from producing enough early growth to furnish much grazing until recently.

Insects have done some damage, but in most cases not heavy enough to require treatment. Greenbug damage has shown up in several fields, but at a rather light infestation.

BARKEY COTTON ON LATE HARVEST

The Rolling Plains area has had a high percent of barkey cotton for the last two or three weeks. It is felt this has been worse in other counties than

here in Knox County.

Some causes of barkey cotton are stripping or mechanically picking when the plants are still wet, stripping after frost before plants are dead, or in some cases harvesting cotton which has been dead a long period of time.

Barkey cotton samples have cost farmers of the Rolling Plains area thousands of dollars.

If used carelessly, convenient and useful devices such as drills, saws, sanders and other electric handtools can be dangerous.

For safe use these electrical tools must be positively grounded because ordinary voltages that power them can be fatal. A tool's frame can be-

come charged, if ungrounded, and the current can go through the handlers' body to the grounded surface he happens to be standing on or touching.

Safety is worth taking the time to check electrical tools to make sure that the frames aren't charged. Causes of trouble can be carbon on motor brushes, broken or loose parts inside a motor case or water on the trigger switch. Loose cord connections, or worn defective cords can also be a potential source of trouble.

A three-pronged plug with a three-wired cord should be a part of every electric handtool used. A better path of the current is provided by the third wire instead of the operator's body. But this is useless if the outlet is not grounded because the ground wire remains unconnected, thus rendered dangerous.

The county agent has a leaflet, L-695 that shows how electric handtools should be wired.

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62)

authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KNOX CITY, TEXAS:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Knox City, Texas, on the 16th day of December, 1967, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said Knox City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City."

"Against adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said Knox City, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit: Polling Place - City Hall, Knox City, Texas.

Presiding Officers - Otis Harbert, Presiding Judge; and Mrs. Louise Graham, Alternate Presiding Judge.

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint two clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Knox City, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following: English

OFFICIAL BALLOT INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said CITY, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the CITY not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. Cotton Classing Office Reports

Rain halted cotton harvest the first of the week enabling the U. S. D. A. Cotton Classing Office in Munday to completely catch up on classing. Over 10,000 bales were classed for the week ending December 1, 1967, according to A. D. Peebles, Officer-in-charge. This brings the season classing total to 51,000 bales.

Grades were about the same as last week. Consumer and Marketing Service statistics show 9 percent graded Middling, 18 percent Strict Low Middling; 2 percent Low Middling; 51 percent Middling Light Spotted; 10 percent Strict Low Middling Light Spotted and 5 percent Middling Spotted. Five percent was reduced in grade because of grass or bark.

Staple lengths for the week were 16 percent 29/32, 50 percent 15/16; 22 percent 31/32; and 10 percent 1 inch or longer.

Micronaire readings were very good. Ninety-One percent read in the desirable 3.5 - 4.9 range. Six percent read 5.0 - 5.2 and 3 percent had readings lower than 3.5.

Prices were steady to slightly higher the list of the week, but some drops were reported the last of the week, especially in the longer staple.
