Here is the results for the first 12 months this has been in effect: October through December, 1973: \$110.49; January through March, 1974: \$156.34; April through June. 1974: \$159.78; and July through September, 1974: \$147.51. So you can see it all adds up a little faster than you think. The total for the 12 month period was 1574.12, which is not a lot but that is 1574.12 more than we would have had and no one realized the difference in their bills at the time. With this added income along with the Revenue Sharing that the City gets, which will average to about \$1350 a year, helps our little town a lot. If we can get some more of the people to move into O'Brien, or better we need some rent houses or houses to sell, we would see a change in things, I think.



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

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
