In the absence of Democratic chairman Sam Leaverton who recently underwent heart surgery, reported to the News that Charles Ray Smith filed Monday for County Commissioner of Precinct One creating a four-man race. Previously filing for Precinct One were C.C. (Buddy) Angle, Charles Lankford, and Billy Gene Johnston. Incumbent J.V. (Bud) Carver is not seeking re-election.

In the race for County Commissioner of Precinct Three, incumbent R.C. Daniel is opposed by Philip Homer.

Filing for Constable, Precinct Two was Leroy Davis; Joe Lain for Constable, Precinct Three; and Morris Nix, Constable, Precinct Four.

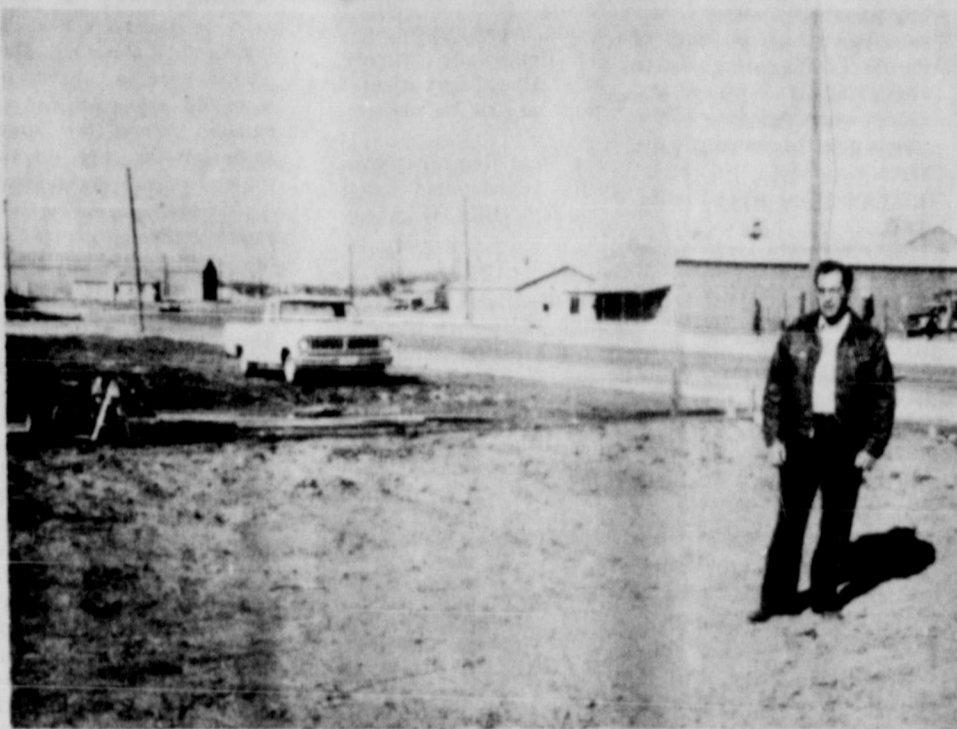

## KC Continues To Grow

Knox City's on the move! The news released last week on the amount of sales tax revenue for the various towns, appearing elsewhere this week in a separate news story, reflects a good business climate for our town. Not only does it reflect a good climate, it is an incentive for growth. The building going on in our town at the present time also is evidence that businessmen are expressing confidence in our community's growth by investing in new businesses.

Construction has begun on a building for Speedy's Oil Field Service on State Highway 222 west of Knox Builders Supply. The firm which opened in Knox City December 1, 1969, in the A.C. Humphrey rent building north of the former Ford Building, serves a wide area including Haskell, Stonewall, King, and Knox Counties, with transports, hot oil machines, and roustabouts. Nine persons are employed by Speedy's Oil Field Service, which is owned by Speedy Smith and his wife, the former Alma Almond, of Rule.

Also, Herbert Bellinghousen has purchased the land

just down the highway west of Speedy's from the Knox City Schools. The site was formerly owned by Paymaster Gins and was deeded over to the school about two years ago.

### Clean-Up Plans To Begin Tonight at 7

Every person who is interested in the clean up program for Knox City is asked to meet at the Community Center on Thursday, February 5 at 7 p.m.

The purpose is to make plans for the clean up and get suggestions for the best way to do the best job possible.

## Water Line Improvements Begin

Work began here Friday of last week on the water mains extensions and fire hydrant additions funded by the Community Development Block grant of \$100,000.00 and awarded to Bowles Construction Company of Burkburnett with a low bid of \$84,824.28.

The Burkburnett firm is busy this week putting the casing under State Highway 222 and under FM near the Knox County Hospital at South Fifth and Avenue F. The underground crossings were also made at Avenue C and Main near the Raymond White residence, Avenue F and Main near the Conoco Station, and Avenue I and Main near Guinn Sheet Metal and Plumbing.

According to city manager Mrs. Faye Railsback, approximately 32 blocks of six inch waterlines will tie into the 10" line of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority's, and should boost pressure in these areas. Mrs. Railsback explained that this is the first time in more than twenty years that new lines have been laid. The city voted \$45,000 in bonds in 1923 and another \$10,000, along with a larger bond issue, in 1954 for water works improvement.

Knox City was among seven cities last year who were invited to make application for the Community Block Development Grant, and received approval for \$100,000.00 for water works improvements.

Another pre-application by the City of Knox City was among 21 Housing and Urban Development "Pre-applications" approved by the West Central Texas Council of Governments in Abilene Wednesday of last week. Pre-applications were received from 19 cities and two counties in the region.

However, WCTCOG officials said the applications are somewhat like a "Christmas list" because only a few of the 35 total projects contained in the applications are likely to be funded.

Among pre-applications approved were Knox County, \$150,000-four sanitary landfills; purchase and operation of a countywide ambulance

service. Munday, \$105,000 - water system improvements. Knox City, \$100,000 - water line installation, four fire hydrants, street paving, construction and landscaping of neighborhood park. O'Brien, \$72,000 - new water system construction. Rochester, \$122,000 - new water system construction. Benjamin, \$106,000 - construction and replacement of water lines, street improvement, sewer main extensions. Mrs. Railsback explained that it is now necessary to submit a pre-application to HUD, and after all applications are reviewed, Knox City may be invited to make a full application for further water line improvements.

## Sales Tax Revenue Skyrockets Since '68

Knox City's revenue from the one per cent city sales tax has jumped almost 90 per cent in the eight years the city has been able to collect it, according to figures released last week by State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Bullock's figures showed that the City of Knox City received sales tax rebates totaling \$28,154.91 in 1975.

This is an 86 per cent increase over Knox City's first year sales tax receipts of \$15,121.72 in 1968, the first year Knox City collected the one per cent tax.

It was in 1967 when the Texas Legislature gave cities a right to levy a one per cent city sales tax, and they were first able to collect it in the first quarter of 1968.

"It shows what we've known all along," Bullock said, "that the city sales tax has become a cornerstone of the city hall budget." Realizing the importance of the sales tax to city budgets, Bullock, after entering office, began sending city sales tax dollars back to the cities on a monthly, rather than quarterly basis.

While he conceded that some of the increase is due to inflation, Bullock said, "No-body could read this story of mushrooming retail sales and conclude Texas has anything other than a prosperous business community."

Only 30 cities of the more than 800 collecting the sales tax in Texas showed decline in revenues. Seven hundred

and eighty cities showed increases ranging up to 1,539 per cent.

Rebates to participating cities during the year 1975 totaled \$264 million. This figure represents the cities' one per cent city sales tax, less the fees the state charges for handling the distribution.

Bullock explained that the state wound up with \$1.3 billion from its four per cent sales tax for use in funding various state programs, and

said undoubtedly, without the sales tax, Texas citizens would be paying higher taxes on real estate just to keep the level of city services they desire at a high level.

Area towns and a comparison of their first year and 1975 rebates include: Anson, first year-\$24,341.44, 1975-\$37,342.89, up 53 per cent;

## Carney Schools Revise School Lunch Program

The Carney Independent School District has recently received a mandate from the Texas Education Agency stating that the system must have a revised free and reduced lunch program in effect by March 1.

Carney School is now serving nutritious meals to students every school day for 55 cents, and extra milk for 10 cents, according to Ed Whiteley, superintendent of schools at O'Brien.

However, children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the scale shown here are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. If the children are eligible for free meals they are also eligible for free extra milk. The reduced price for lunch is 20 cents. If a family's income is greater than those shown, but the family has unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 per cent of its income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, their children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or

below the levels shown on the scale.

Supt. Whiteley said that applications had been furnished the students and that families may apply at any time during the year for the free meals and free milk or reduced-price meals by completing the application and returning it to the school. Within ten days after receiving the completed application, the school will let the families know whether or not their children are eligible. If there are those who do not agree with the school's decision, they have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Supt. Ed Whiteley, Box 2458, O'Brien, Texas 79539, 658-3731.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. For those who have foster children living with them and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, they are asked to notify the school or indicate such on the application.

Supt. Whiteley said that all children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or notional origin.

He explained that persons needing further assistance, or in the event their family size or income changed during the year, they may contact him.

**SCS Personnel Help Schools With Outdoor Classrooms**

Don't get alarmed if you see school children outdoors growing grass and shrubs, tending bird feeders, or collecting water samples from a miniature pond. They might be studying nature in an outdoor classroom—a new concept in environmental education.

Arche, Lieb, district conservationist for USDA Soil Conservation Service at Knox City, said personnel from his agency have helped Texas schools plan and install 487 outdoor classrooms and the number grows every week.

The Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District's Nature Trail and outdoor classroom is located about 2.5 miles west of Knox City on the Bush and Burnett ranch. The district with help from local Boy Scout Troop 161 of Knox City, FFA boys from Knox City Schools, and County Commissioners constructed the Nature Trail for use by all schools in the county and other interested groups. The area has been used extensively since it was completed in 1974.

Lieb said SCS assistance includes planning erosion control measures, helping layout nature trails, identifying plants, soils, animals and insects, and other technical help.

A recent survey showed that more than 1,800 individual schools in Texas are using, or will use, the 487 outdoor classrooms. Some 1,148 other groups also use the areas.

A total of 1,144 groups and organizations are helping schools install and maintain outdoor learning areas in Texas. These range from soil and water conservation districts to parent-teacher organizations.

Lieb said SCS first became

involved in outdoor learning areas by helping schools cure campus erosion problems. Then a few innovative teachers let the students help install some of the conservation measures as learning experience. From that came the idea that trees, grass, and shrubbery could be added to beautify the conservation measures or to attract wildlife. Eventually, the idea of installing complete outdoor classrooms evolved.

Students enjoy planning and installing the classrooms over a period of months or years, Lieb said. This also enhances the learning experience, helping students

gain a deeper appreciation of the interrelationship between man, plants, soil, water, animals, and sunshine.

Uses of outdoor classrooms depend upon the ingenuity of teachers, group leaders, and students. Some classes study pollution control, plant growth, and animal habitat. Some schools also install outdoor weather stations so pupils can predict weather.

For help in getting started on an outdoor learning area, SCS has a publication entitled "Outdoor Classrooms on School Sited". To get a free copy, persons may call the SCS office at Knox City, telephone 817 658-3351.

He explained that after proper hearings are held, some of these children are sent to supervision homes in Corsicana or Monahans, while other children with offenses more severe are sent to reform school at Gatesville by the juvenile judge.

As a parole officer, Fox is concerned with the care and treatment of juveniles after release from these supervisory schools.

Fox estimated there were 2,000 children under 17 years of age in state reform schools. They are sent to a school for no specified time and are released when they have made satisfactory progress in their behavior to warrant returning them to their communities, he said.

Approximately 80% of juvenile offenders have used drugs in some form. About 20% of juveniles return to a supervisory school for a second term.

Fox was complimentary of Knox City in saying that we have a very low delinquent children rate because the community sees that the children are kept busy and working. He also estimated that he handles three to one more boys than girls in juvenile cases. At the present time, he is working in 16 counties with about 40 children.

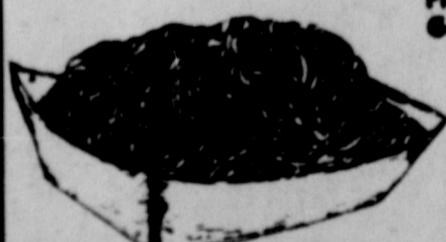
