That said election shall be held as provided by Chapter 25 of the General Laws, Regular

Session of the 39th Legislature, 1925, as amended, and shall be conducted as provided by law for holding general elections except as otherwise provided in said Chapter.
That at said election only qualified resident property tax-paying voters of such District shall be permitted to vote.

Farm & Ranch Notes

It is wheat planting time again and I would like to remind you that it is good insurance to treat your seed wheat before planting.

Treating your seed will control seed-borne stinking smut, reduces losses from seedling blight and root rot, and usually improves stands.

Ceresan is the standard treatment. You should use one-half ounce per bushel of seed.

I usually have trouble getting my 4-H boys to feed their livestock projects enough, but Chas. Todd of the Truscott Community had some very bad luck last week from over-feeding his sheep.
